## GENERAL EISENHOWER COMMENTS ON RED CROSS

"During the current Red Cross Fund Campaign, vast numbers of patriotic Americans have responded generously to the cause. In some communities the campaign is lagging, and I am surprised to learn that one of the reasons given is that complaints are being leveled at the organization's overseas operations by returning service men. These complaints are distressing to me since this policy of charging our forces for food and lodgings was adopted at the request of the Army so as to insure equitable distribution among all service personnel of Red Cross resources."

"Its services are as urgently needed today by our occupation troops, our men in hospitals, and our veterans as they were ever needed by our fighting forces in time of war. I hope to see its great peacetime campaign for funds promptly pushed across by over-subscription of its 1946 Fund Campaign."

Young men enlisting in the U. S. Regular Army for three years will be entitled to full educational benefits under the GI Bill of Rights.

## SOME DEVELOPMENTS AROUND BRONTE

**WATER WELL** — According to Alderman C. R. Smith, the new water well has now been completed. Located between the edge of the river and the old well, the new one is four feet in diameter and 23 feet deep. It has been tiled up and will be ready for use when needed.

"Clytus has really been working on the well," Mayor Pruitt noted, "and has done a mighty fine job."

**TRASH COLLECTION** — Thomas Reyes has been collecting trash around Bronte this week, and is expected to do so every two months. It must be sacked or bundled and ready to go, however, and if so prepared, will be collected and disposed of.

"I told some folks they'd have to sack their stuff," he said, "but when I went back later they'd still done nothing about it."

**SANITATION** — Conferences were scheduled Wednesday afternoon over the unsightly and unsanitary pool of stagnant water that extends from the West Apartments to the intersection near the laundry. Considered a distinct danger to health, it was believed that plans could be made to eliminate the eyesore. George Thomas, Alderman in charge of sanitation, told Mayor Pruitt that whatever he wanted to do about it was alright with him.

**WATER METERS** — City officials have been furnished with names of water users who have been tapping the water supply ahead of their meters and thereby using water that does not register through their meters. Water supply of such users is expected to be cut off with a high re-installation fee if put back into use. If intentionally done to avoid paying water bills a stiff fine may be levied.

## HOW ABOUT ARGENTINA

This South American country, the second largest of the continent, contains about 1,079,900 square miles, consisting mainly of lowlands. Among its manufactures are included foods, beverages, tobacco, cement, paper, tires, autos, glass, iron and steel, and textiles.

Its major export industry is agriculture, and principal exports include wheat, corn, and flaxseed; alfalfa, cotton, sugarcane, and potatoes are grown mainly for domestic consumption.

Argentina raises many cattle, sheep, goats, and hogs, and it is the world's largest exporter of meat. Its mineral production is not very important, except for petroleum, lead, and zinc. Coal and iron ore deposits are rather limited and of low quality.

Around 97% of the population of Argentina are estimated to be of European descent. Its official language is Spanish, and some 85 per cent of persons more than 18 years old are thought to be literate. Foreign trade is larger than that of any other country of Latin America. National income, it is said, was around 2½ billion dollars in 1943.

In the pre-war period, Argentina had the largest number of steamers and motorships in Latin America, and also the best railway system, consisting of 28,773 miles of track in 1941. Total highway mileage was 30,186 in 1942, with 37 per cent improved roads. At the end of 1943, Argentina had 217,200 passenger cars, 72,250 trucks, and 10,500 buses.

Airlines included four international and three local companies; and the local services operated 17 multi-engine aircraft over 4,551 route-miles of airways with 19 airports of Class III or larger, and 45 of Class II or smaller.

Expenditures of the Government in 1942 exceeded income by about 23 per cent. Its external debt was about 325 million dollars, and its internal debt amounted to \$1,742,000,000.

British investments are found mainly in the railways, and total about 1½ billion dollars. U. S. investments, on the other hand total around 570 millions.

From 1935-1941, the number of manufacturing establishments increased to 58,000, a percentage of 45. With a few exceptions of heavy industry, Argentine industrialization has been more completely developed than in any other country of Latin America.

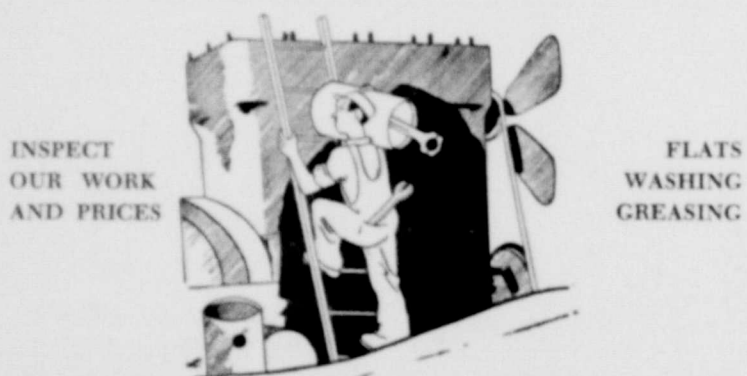

## LET'S ALL STRIKE

As the present strike situation continues, labor stands fair to lose many of its gains made over the past few years. In spite of strikes, labor leaders continue to receive their large salaries while the great mass of laboring men receive nothing. It is becoming more and more apparent that these masses are getting restive, and would like to go back to work.

So we have the spectacle of unemployment, transportation tie ups, scarcity of coal, and dire necessity, due mainly to the selfishness of so-called labor leaders.

Suppose they were unable to get their necessities? Suppose their grocery men refused to sell groceries, the laundry to clean clothes, the undertaker to bury the dead, the doctor to prescribe for the sick, the teacher to instruct his students, the druggist to make sodas, the merchant to sell his wares, and the business man to carry on his affairs? Just suppose all of us went on strike — refused to do our regular and accustomed tasks and duties?

The interdependence of one upon another would be so readily apparent. But the lack of common sense, intelligence, decency, and good will among some of our so-called top leaders is not laughable.

## A NEW CONSTITUTION

Much is being said about possible revisions and/or amendments to our Texas Constitution, on the theory that a leaky, decrepit, and worn-out document must be given additional shots in the arm.

On the contrary, let the candidates speak their positions on a new Texas constitution. To say that we haven't the brains to do it speaks poorly of ourselves, what we mean is that too much pressure may be brought to bear on those who may write such a document. What a comment!

Legal technicians, of course, will swear by the old paper, others will swear at it. Bumbling, contradictory, ambiguous, uncertain, indefinite, outdated — it affords a wonderful field and fat fees for those who may explore its depths. But it's an expensive luxury, the question is — can we afford not to have a new constitution for Texas?

And your convictions — you candidates for State office?

## TWO ORDINANCES

Ho hum, of course the City of Bronte has ordinances, but ho hum, let somebody else worry, not us. What do we care that filth, dirty garbage, stink holes, and nasty toilets exist? What do we care for a bumper crop of flies and mosquitoes, for unsanitary conditions that help to bring on disease, polio, epidemics, and sickness?

Ho hum, if we haven't the intestinal fortitude and spirit of cooperation to work together to eliminate such nastiness, ho hum, let the other fellow worry while we all go fishing.

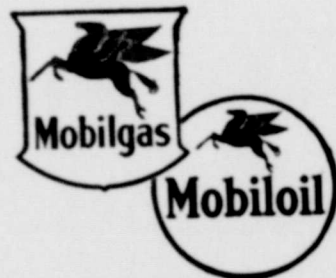

Initial step in the establishment of a stud of Quarter Horses was made at Texas Technological College recently. The department of animal husbandry at Tech purchased Sir Chubby, two-year-old stallion, at a recent auction in Plainview.

Sir Chubby is a registered Quarter Horse having for his sire, Chubby, a stallion owned by the Hooper estate of Plainview, who is famous as a sire of outstanding Quarter Horses. Sir Chubby's dam, Madame Waggoner, a registered mare, was bred by the W. T. Waggoner estate of Vernon. Two foundation Quarter Horse families appear in Sir Chubby's pedigree. Through his sire, he traces to Peter McCue and through his dam to Joe Bailey.

Purchase of Sir Chubby was made possible through a gift to the animal husbandry department by Hemphill-Wells company of Lubbock.

It is planned to obtain a small band of Quarter mares to complete the establishment of a Quarter Horse stud at the college, according to W. L. Stangel, dean of the Division of Agriculture.

"Without question, the Quarter Horse is the most popular breed of horses in Texas and will continue to be popular for he is recognized as an ideal cow horse and Texas still is and will continue to be a cow country," Stangel says.

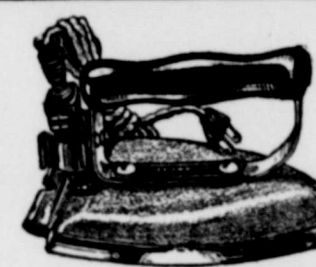
