STATE-COUNTY HEALTH OFFICIALS CONCERNED ABOUT BRONTE

According to a letter addressed to County Health Officer Dr. J. K. Griffith of Robert Lee from State Health Officer George W. Cox, the latter is concerned about insanitary conditions in Bronte. Dr. Griffith recently advised Dr. Cox "of the action . . . taken regarding insanitary conditions at Bronte."

Dr. Cox noted that he was "pleased to observe that between you and Dr. J. D. Leonard the situation will be improved."

Dr. Leonard has continued his inspections of insanitary conditions in Bronte, and reports that a number of business firms and individuals are taking necessary steps to comply with sanitary laws.

At a meeting of the City Council on Wednesday, June 19th, a San Angelo lawyer advised Council members that the City statutes on sanitation were air-tight and could be enforced with no trouble at all. According to accounts of the meeting from those who attended, it was pointed out that enforcement of the sanitary code would result in making somebody mad.

The attorney reportedly noted that notices could be sent to violators requesting their cooperation in cleaning up their premises within a certain time, and at the end of that time, a daily fine could be assessed with each day constituting a separate offense.

It is not known whether the Council contemplates such action, but it is known that such action is entirely legal and permissible.

On the other hand, if such action is not taken, Bronte may then be faced with a corps of State health officials, who will enter the town with no timidity about enforcing laws already on the books. According to the letter from State health officials, it would seem that if Bronte takes no action, then action will be taken for Bronte by others.

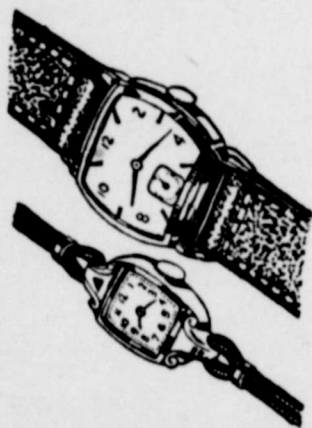

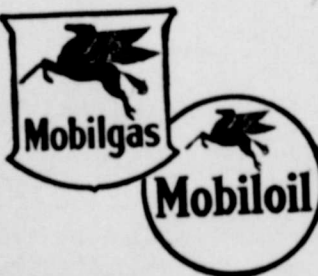

Flower and picture arrangement composed the program when the Blackwell WHD Club met in the home of Mrs. Austin Jordan last Wednesday. Mrs. J. W. Leach read a paper on how to create beautiful pictures with flower arrangements, and noted that stems should be cut long, on the diagonal, and before sunrise if possible. Foliage that would be below water should be removed, you should mass the darkest or brightest flowers in the center, then work in medium and tallest sprays, arrange heavy flowers together, and team up your lightest. Crushed chicken wire is excellent to hold flowers in place, or an irish potato with holes in it.

Mrs. D. T. Hunt discussed containers for different bouquets and arrangements, and pointed out that containers be suitable in size, shape, and color, and that it should not be so elaborately decorated that it draws one's attention to the vase rather than the flowers.

Decorations for pulpit and altar were presented by Mrs. T. A. Carlisle. She noted that flowers should stand in deep water, be placed one at a time.

Mrs. Geraldine McCullough, WHD agent, declared that a stair-up arrangement of pictures was bad, in that it led one to look to the ceiling. She said they should be hung as nearly on the level of the eye as possible.

The next meeting will be in the home of Mrs. Lee Alderman on July 3, and the program will be on tea service. Dona Hendry, a 4-H girl, gave a report of her trip to the Brown-wood encampment.

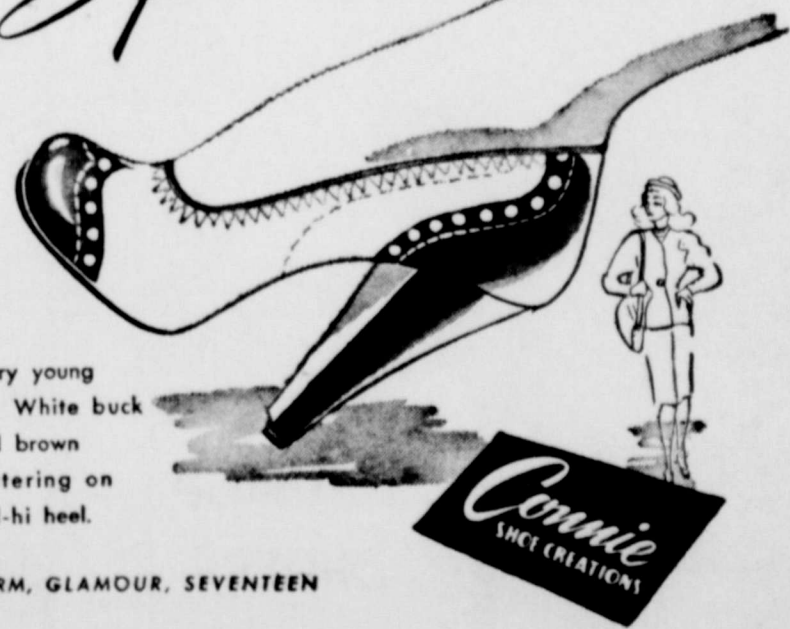
