Both Harris and Dallas Counties sent two delegations to the conclave, each of which claimed to be the "legal" delegation. That was finally settled by a roll call vote which seated one of the Harris County delegations by a vote of more than 2-1. So the majority ruled.

Now the law provides, as we understand it, that each senatorial district is to choose its committeemen who are to serve on the State Democratic Executive Committee. Several members were thus chosen, only to be thrown off and replaced by others, at the convention.

The Convention Committee on Party Officers, for example, threw off members of the San Antonio delegation and replaced them with members of its own choice, in spite of the fact that an attorney present pointed out that their action was not legal.

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



### The Bronte Enterprise | Eagles Outscore Longhorns

The Eldorado Eagles came to Bronte last Friday, September 27th, and went home with a 13-0 victory over the Bronte Longhorns, who had previously played a scoreless tie with

Eldorado's first touchdown came toward the last of the 2nd quarter on a 45 yard run following an intercepted pass, but the point after touchdown was lost when the ball was blocked. The visitor's second touchdown was the result of an end run from the 15 yard line, and here the point was good, making the score 13-0.

First Quarter Eldorado received the ball on kickoff, advancing 50 yards in 11 plays, and then lost the ball on the

Second Quarter

But the tide soon turned at the first of the 2nd quarter, as Vaughn in turn intercepted an Eagle pass on their own 48 yard line. The Longhorns failed to gain sufficient yardage, however, and lost the ball on downs. Eldorado was then set back 10 yards by fine line play on the part of Scott, Arrott, and Rogers, playing for the Longhorns, and the Eagles kicked out from their own 40.

A swarm of Longhorns closed in on the ball, blocking the punt beautifully, and Bronte recovered on the Eldorado 35 yard line to offer another

good scoring threat. Another pass was intercepted at this point, with the Eagles taking over in mid-field. It didn't take long, though, till Scott took his turn at pass intercepting, and Bronte again had the ball on the Eagle 35 yard line.

More line plunges brought the Longhorns down the field, but another Bronte pass backfired when in-tercepted by the Eagles, who ran 45 yards for a touchdown, making the score 6-0 when the try for extra point
