Depending on the cuts and packages, this box will hold 500 - 600 pounds. It has a written guarantee, and while it once was priced at \$670, it now costs only \$550, with liberal credit terms arranged. It's called the AMERICAN, and is made by the American Refrigerator and Machinery Company.
