## H. H. Jameson Well Flows 196 Barrels

Sun Oil Company's third producer, No. 1 H. H. Jameson, completed a 24-hour flow during the week of 196.47 barrels of 46.7 gravity oil. It also registered a gas-oil ratio of 1,369-1, and the oil was cut but 4/10 of one per cent by acid water, according to Johnny Brewer.

Oil came through a 3/4-inch choke on 2-inch tubing which extended down to 6,445 feet, with 1,056 perforation in some four zones running between 6,200 and 6,458 feet in 5 1/2-inch casing which was cemented at 6,462 feet on the bottom.

The casing had a pressure of 1,380 pounds and the tubing registered 650 pounds. This Railroad Commission test ended Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock.

No. 2 Fred Jameson - Sun Oil's fourth producer, which entered the oil bearing formation at 6,302 feet, was correlated 132 feet lower than the No. 1 Fred Jameson, which is 2,944 feet north-northwest. On its first drillstem test from 6,265-315 feet, recovery was 180 feet of clean oil and 270 feet of oil and gas-cut drilling mud. On the second test, with a packer at 6,315 feet and with drilling to 6,365 feet, an estimated 365,000 cubic feet of gas appeared, and the drillpipe gave 480 feet of clean oil. Bottomhole pressure was 1,050 pounds open and 2,750 pounds closed, with a 5/8-inch bottom choke and 3/4-inch top opening. On the third test, with the same openings, bottomhole pressure was 200 pounds when open and closed pressure was 2,550 pounds. Yesterday the hole was being conditioned with caliper and Schlumberger surveys being made. Running of 5 1/2-inch casing to the bottom was scheduled and was to be cemented for perforating opposite the producing levels.

No. 2 Allen Jameson - Drillpipe that had twisted off at 3,121 feet was being recovered, with new 4 1/2-inch pipe being picked up to resume drilling at 3,865 feet in shale and lime.

No. 1 W. L. Tubb - After being spudded Sunday at midnight, this 6th Sun Co. well was drilling over 1,500 feet yesterday. It is 1/2 mile north and 1/4 mile west of No. 1 Allen Jameson well.

No. 1 Jim McCutchen - Reported yesterday as past 5,100 feet.

## VA Classes Have Winning Year

The Vocational Ag classes started the year with a total of 39 students in the three classes. There has been a full program of prescribed and extra curricular activities, and more emphasis has been given to the farm shop and farm mechanics.

Members of all three classes have competed with other schools in the Ballinger district and have won a major part of the contests.

On Dec. 5, 1946, teams from Bronte, Ballinger, and Winters met in the latter town for the District Chapter conducting contest. The Greenhand, or first-year group, from Bronte won first place and the Chapter Farmer group won first in their division.

On January 25, the Ballinger District Future Farmers of America banquet was held in Bronte and Dorothy Faye Scott, the local chapter Sweetheart was honored as a district queen and presented with a beautifully engraved compact.

On Feb. 25, 1947, the District Livestock judging contest was held in Ballinger. The Chapter Farmer group, composed of Davie Cassiot, J. L. Alexander, and Glenn Blake won first in their division and the Greenhand group won third in their division.

Boys from the Bronte Chapter showed stock at the local county show on the 24th and 15th and won a large portion of the premiums at that show. Hogs and lambs were shown in the San Angelo show and placed high there.

Three boys, J. B. Arrott, Wayne Arrott, and Le Drew Arrott went to the El Paso livestock show and competed in a judging contest there against boys from Texas and New Mexico. They won third place in competition with 31 teams.

On March 15, 27 boys went to the Fort Worth livestock show. They spent two nights in the gym at Stephenville and visited Swift Packing Co. while on this trip.

On April 26, a dairy cattle and livestock judging team went to Lubbock and competed in a contest composed of teams from the northwest half of Texas. The dairy cattle team won 6th place in the judging of Holstein cattle and Judge Sandusky was second high man in this event.

This group held its annual Father and Son Barbecue on May 8, with a good number of the fathers and invited guests present. On May 29-30-31, a group from this school will attend the Area Officers' Training School at Alpine.

Roy Hamilton, son of the late Rev. R. F. Hamilton who preached at Blackwell for years, died recently in California, according to word received from there by W. C. Shamblin of Blackwell. Death was due to leukemia, it was reported, and he was survived by his mother, wife, brother, sister, and several children. He was an uncle of Mrs. Shamblin, a long-time resident in Coke and Nolan Counties, and was well known here during his stay.

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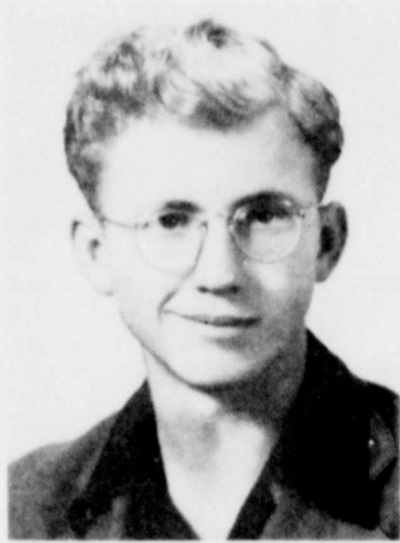

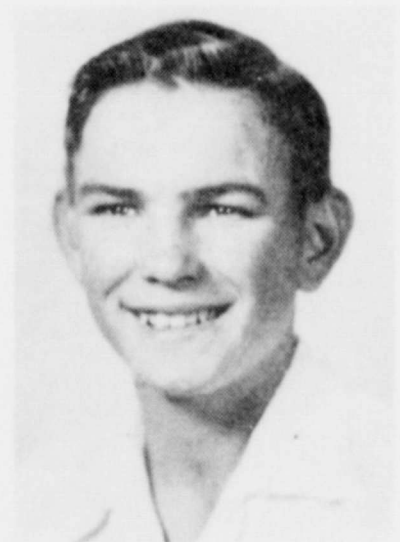

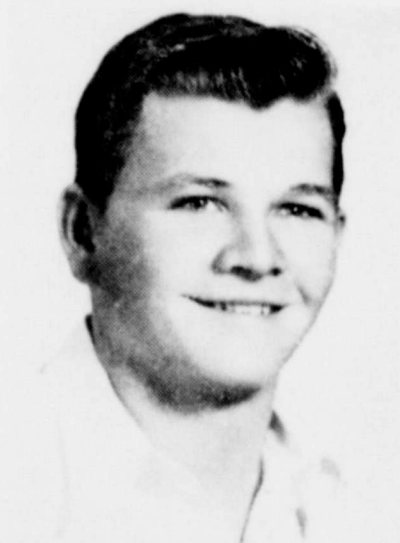

Then came our Junior year with our picking up Frank White, Rosa Lee Langford, and Johanne Gassiot, Mary Lee Davis, Sissy Barber, L. E. Conger, and Betty Jean Williams. We also lost some, as Billye Marks, Katie James and Sissy Barber, Miss Crow, who later became Mrs. Royce Lee, was our sponsor.

Then came our Senior year, and were we happy for Mrs. Lee was our sponsor again. Then we had lost Johanne Gassiot who got married. At mid-term we had lost our sponsor, too, and Miss Jean Duncan, that good looking bomb shell, came to teach and be our sponsor. The Senior Class of 1947 consisted of only 16 members: Claude Ash, L. Conger, Cecil Coalson, Mary Lee Davis, Jewel Latham, Rosa Lee Langford, Portis Robbins, Lonnie Rogers, Joe Scott, Bill Simpson, Pete Taylor, Bill Thomas, who is not going to graduate so he can play football again, Theron Tidwell, Carol Westbrook, Betty Williams, and Frank White. Out of that bunch, only five started out twelve years ago - Cecil Coalson, Bill Simpson, Joe Scott, Pete Taylor, and Theron Tidwell.

### THOMASONS VISIT TEXAS CITY

Mr. and Mrs. Will Thomason have plenty they can tell you about the recent Texas City explosion. They went down there last Thursday and returned Monday, and while there, visited with Mr. and Mrs. Tom Green and Earl Horne, uncles and an aunt of Will.

Mrs. Green was severely cut by flying glass and is now suffering from shock, while her husband and Earl were not injured.

They were in their store, about a mile and a quarter away from the exploding ship, and were cut by the flying glass.

According to their account, there was a small explosion which lifted the Grand Camp from the water, and a second explosion which blew it apart, scattering death and destruction in every direction.

Cars were mashed and welded together, walls blasted and destroyed, and destruction was terrible, according to Will, who gave a detailed account of things he had witnessed.

Bodies of some of the victims will never be found, he believes, for many must have been blown to pieces, while others may suffer for long periods from the shock of the blast and the accompanying sights.

### WRITES ABOUT TEXAS CITY

Walker Bernard, brother of Mrs. J. M. Rippetoe, took an active part in the recent Texas City disaster, and wrote the following to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Bernard.

"I was there and helped carry out the dead for eleven hours. The blast was so severe that the bodies were torn to bits. We would load 15-20 in a truck, and found lots of spare legs, arms, and parts of bodies."

"I was working near the docks when the second ship blew up, and it killed a priest who was walking beside me and several others around me. It blew me 50 yards but didn't hurt except for skinned places. I had a gas mask and a police coat which kept me from getting cut."

"Blood was so thick it took three truck loads of sand on the floor to

keep you from falling and slipping down. My crew of about 5-10 men changed every 10 to 20 minutes, for they couldn't stand the sight."

"Out of 147 who volunteered to help rescue people, only 42 got out alive. I worked till I was worn out, then was taken to Houston."

Other experiences he encountered were apparently terrible, but it was an eyewitness account, and the Rippetoes said they knew nothing about it until they heard from him that he had been helping with the rescue work.

### D. M. McQUEEN RETURNS

D. M. McQueen returned last Friday afternoon from Shawnee, Oklahoma, where he had spent the winter with his son, M. C. McQueen of that city.

When in Bronte, he stays with his two sons, A. F. and O. R. McQueen, and also has another son, S. L. McQueen of Wichita Falls.

Mr. McQueen declared he came here in 1909 from Oklahoma, and that he had lived there in two states and one territory — without ever having had to move once. It happened this way — he was living on the Texas-Oklahoma border on land that was later claimed by Oklahoma, hence the two states, and before Oklahoma became a state it was Oklahoma Territory, so he covered ground without having to move.

### MRS. BOECKING HOSTESS FOR DIVERSITY CLUB

Fourteen members and four guests were present last Thursday, May 1, when Mrs. Charlie Boecking entertained for the regular meeting of the Bronte Diversity Club.

Mrs. Nell Flores and Mrs. Chet Holcombe had charge of the program, which was on the life of Stephen Foster.

While future plans were not definite, members were expecting the next social to take place on Thursday, May 22, but plans were only tentative, it was revealed, for new members are expected to entertain the older ones at that time.

### NOTES FOR CLUB REPORTERS

Miss Mary Pearl Bearden, Coke County HDA, has recently written a letter to the various Club reporters in the county, talking to them about the publicity for the WHD Clubs, hints which might well be used for other clubs and organizations.

As she says, "the success and progress of our Club work depends largely upon the publicity which it is given. As a reporter, it is the duty of each of you to do your club justice by being prompt and accurate in turning in your reports to your editor."

She encloses a booklet written by Laura Lane of the A. & M. College Extension Service, which contains the following comments:

"If you can see and hear, read and write, and tell the truth, you can become a good reporter. You have four big duties: 1. to announce all meetings, tours, achievement days, social events, and other future activities of your club, 2. to give all interested newspapers reports of these meetings and events as soon as they have happened, 3. to know the person who handles your news stories, 4. to train an assistant to take your place when you are absent or to follow when your term of office is over."

"If your club announcements and reports are true and timely and interesting to a lot of people, they'll be printed. Be certain you are right — even about unimportant things."

"News spoils easily with age, to your reports should be timely. Just as vegetables should be canned as soon as possible after they are brought in, reports of club news should be given to the papers as soon as the events have happened."

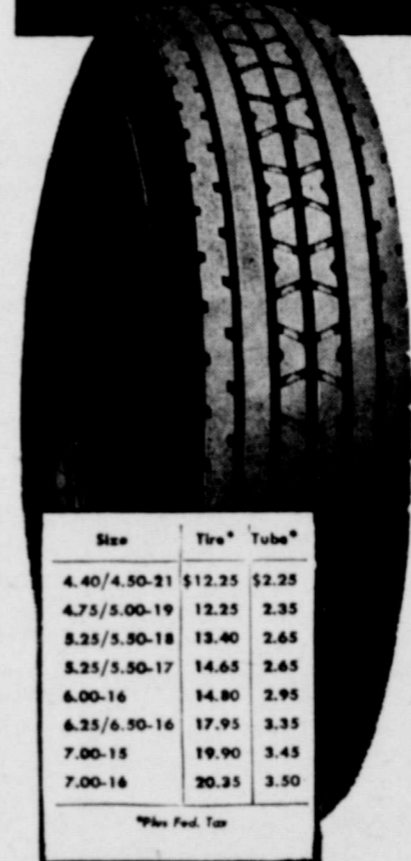

**Our Washington News Letter**

History was made in Washington last week when President Aleman of Mexico became the first Mexican chief executive to cross the Rio Grande for an official visit to Washington.

Anything that was missing in the way of good will between the two nations was patched up before the visitor left the capitol city. Flown here from Mexico City in the Truman plane, the Sacred Cow, Aleman was received by President Truman at the airport, then rode in a parade witnessed by 600,000 people. The size of this turn-out was second only to that which received General Eisenhower upon his triumphal return from Europe after the war.

The visiting President addressed the Congress in Spanish. Translations were distributed and he was easy to follow as he bore down on the friendly relations between the two countries separated by the Rio Grande. Incidentally, there was the matter of a \$60 million loan discussed while the visiting President was here. But one thing about Mexico is that she is always a good credit risk and has paid her obligations to this country in the past in a satisfactory manner.

Elsewhere on Capitol Hill, the Senate wrangled over the Labor bill and rumors began to fly that President Truman will veto any labor bill that is passed if it has any teeth in it.

The House sliced the State Department's foreign relief bill to \$100 million, and amended it so very little, if any, relief will go to the Communist-dominated countries. The wool bill continued to be tied up in the House Rules committee where the questions of the import fees on foreign wool is causing some disturbance among the

members. The Boston wool trade, which opposes any wool bill, has been fairly effective in arousing opposition to pending legislation, their new strategy being to appeal to those who are opposed to tariffs on imports.

The wool-bill opposition has succeeded in recruiting the aid of Representative McCormick, a democratic leader from Boston, and Helen Gahagan Douglas, a left-wing congresswoman from California. Speaker Martin, from Massachusetts, is also unfriendly to legislation favoring the domestic wool grower. Mrs. Douglas called a meeting the other day of two or three other congresswomen and invited representatives of all the women's organizations with headquarters in Washington. There she had a field day by telling them how vicious the wool bill is, how unimportant the wool growing industry is, and how desirable it is to reduce the tariff on wool. It was rumored that her actions were promoted by the Boston wool trade.

Representative Ewing Thomason of El Paso is the latest Texan to retire from Congress, his resignation being expected this summer. He has been appointed Federal Judge at El Paso. Out in California the state legislature finally got around to elevating the importance of the goat. The goat out there can now lift its head in pride. No longer is it just a misdemeanor to steal a goat in that state; a new law has made it a felony. Referring again to President Aleman's visit, the hasty preparations for his reception caused some red faces in the State Department. The 650 Mexican flags strung along the parade route to welcome him were not the official flag of Mexico at all, but merely the merchant marine flag of Mexico, which happens to be identical with the official flag of Italy. Mexico and Italy are technically still at war. A few of the official Mexican flags were on display, however.

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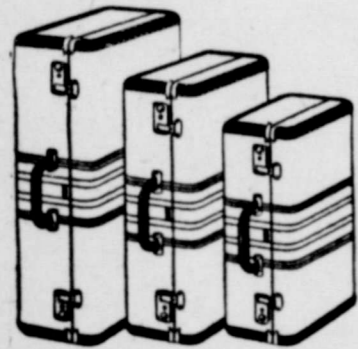

#### Mothproofing

It looks like cold weather is just about gone, so a lot of us may be storing away our winter clothes soon. Flourine solutions are being sold for home use in mothproofing clothes. If these solutions are applied according to directions on the container, they will give good protection for a limited period. If the solution is sprayed on, the spraying must be so thorough that all parts of the fabric are moistened. It's wise to give special attention to spraying along folds, seams, pockets, under lapels and other places where moths are easily hidden.

Mothproofing sprays differ from the ordinary moth spray, which will kill any insects on contact, but gives no lasting protection. The mothproofing spray protects a garment by killing moths that feed on the fabric. The new DDT mothproofing spray that is now coming on the market promises to be the best all-round spray yet developed. The DDT spray combines the good points of both the other sprays. It kills moths on contact and leaves an effective residue on the fabric that gives future protection. USDA is still conducting tests on the DDT mothproofing spray, but the evidence so far points to very effective results.

If you use any mothproofing solution, check the list of ingredients to see that arsenic is not listed. If it is, it is best not to use the solution on clothing, blankets, upholstery or any fabric that may come into contact with the skin.

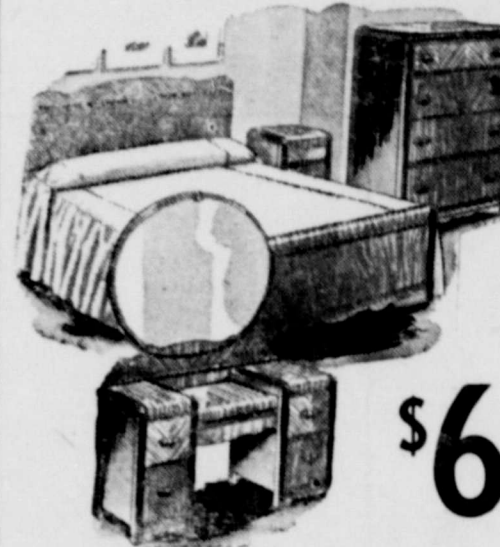
