LATEST OIL NEWS . . .

Union Oil Company officials Wednesday confirmed reports that the No. 1 Jim McCutchen well 7 miles west of Bronte would be plugged and abandoned at 6,746 feet in Ellenburger dolomite.

It was said without confirmation that another test will soon be made near by the first location.

Official reports said that the Ellenburger was reached at 6,304 feet, with elevation given as 1,921 feet.

As the Enterprise previously reported, three drillstem tests were made, with recovery on 6,308-27 feet of 120 feet of oil and gas-cut drilling mud. A second test from 6,310-70 brought 60 feet of oil and gas-cut mud plus 210 feet of salt water, and a third test from 6,694-6,746 feet recovered 4,070 feet of salt water and dead oil scum.

No. 2 Allen Jameson — The well reached the top of the reef lime in the crinoidal section at 6,410 feet, and took a one hour drillstem test at 6,445-85 feet, recovering 65 feet of drilling mud cut with oil. A second test from 6,485-6,510 feet resulted in the packer failing, with a later test scheduled.

No. 1 W. L. Tubbs — Reef lime was reached at 6,267 feet, and a drillstem test at 6,227-6,300 feet failed as the packer did not hold.

No. 3 Fred Jameson — It was reported as drilling at 2,300 feet in shale and lime.

BOND ISSUE VOTE RECEIVED QUIETLY

Last week's announcement concerning the proposed \$275,000 bond issue to build a new courthouse in Coke County was rather quietly received.

Voting, of course, will take place on Saturday, June 14, in places previously designated.

While some expressed themselves as favoring a change in sites, others believe the courthouse should remain where it is, because people are used to the location there in the center of the county.

There were some questions, however, about the increased taxation involved. Even proponents admitted there would be some increase, even if a slight one, but no figures were introduced as to the possible amount.

One statistician, however, did produce figures from the Texas Almanac which indicated that the net debt of Coke County amounted to the sum of \$242,466.66. Of this amount, \$6,925 was in time warrants, \$253,525.00 was in bonds, and the balance in sinking funds totaled \$17,983.34. For an assessed valuation, therefore, there was \$5.73 of debt to each \$100 valuation, and our informant stated all his figures came from the 1945-46 Texas Almanac.

Another observer noted that the tax rate would be raised some \$4 per \$1,000 if the bonds were okayed, and suggested the county commissioners sign a statement that the tax rate would not be raised, if they wanted the bonds voted.

Still others said the new courthouse was worth the cost and was needed, but some said a wait of a few more years would bring reduced prices and a better courthouse at far less cost.

All agreed that maybe something should be done, and that was the question to do it now or later.

NEW TRAIN SCHEDULES

According to unofficial information, the Santa Fe will begin new train schedules through Bronte effective Sunday, June 8.

Train No. 46 is to leave San Angelo at 6:00 PM, arriving in Bronte around 7:00 PM, and in Sweetwater at 8:25 PM. This is the train that has been coming through Bronte at 7:20 in the mornings.

Train No. 45 will leave Sweetwater at 7:30 AM, arriving in Bronte around 8:45 AM, and in San Angelo around 9:45 AM. This is the train that has been coming through Bronte at 9:25 in the evenings.

In other words, the time of day on these two trains is just about reversed, and it will also affect the post office schedules, in that the morning routes will probably be run at a later period to catch the train with its load of mail.

REV. A. R. MAULDIN NEW METHODIST PASTOR

Rev. A. R. Mauldin of Eagle Pass was named last week as the new pastor of the Bronte Methodist Church, who will assume his new position next Sunday.

Rev. George B. McCrary, who has been pastor in Bronte since December, 1945, was transferred to the Lampasas Methodist Church and left for there with his family yesterday.

Rev. Mauldin has been in Eagle Pass for several years, and he and Mrs. Mauldin have three children, two boys and a girl.

TRAINING SCHOOL HELD IN BRONTE

A leader training school for making slip covers for furniture was held last Tuesday, June 7, at the Bronte Baptist Tabernacle, according to Mary Pearl Bearden, Coke County HDA.

Miss Myra Tankersley, HDA of Taylor County, helped with the program, and it was pointed out that slip covers now occupy a permanent place in home furnishing. They are no longer old-fashioned loose, baglike protectors against dust in the summertime, but trimly fitted and smartly tailored coverings suitable for year-round use.

Controlled shrinkage, more permanent colors, crease resistant and water repellent finishes are also outstanding improvements that will meet decorative requirements yet be sturdy enough to withstand hard wear and repeated laundering.

It was noted that slip covers may be modeled right on the chair or cut from a pattern, and the former method is preferred.

A lovely striped slip cover was fitted and made for an over-stuffed chair belonging to Mrs. E. A. Gentry of the Bronte Junior Club.

COUNCIL DISCUSSES WATER SITUATION

The Bronte City Council met last Friday night, May 30, and in a 3-hour session discussed several matters of interest concerning the water situation in town.

It was pointed out that the filter plant at the lake is being repaired and that a chlorination system will be installed when possible to permit use of the lake water, which tests show is not yet satisfactory.

The question of giving Willard Sharp, water superintendent, an expense account to use for his car was discussed for some time, and finally settled by granting him up to a maximum of \$35 per month to run his car. Sharp had presented tickets showing his expenses in May to amount to a total of \$40.20 on his car, and as a result, it was agreed to establish the maximum of \$35 monthly to be used for expenses, with payments to include the May bills.

Also discussed during the evening were matters relating to the sale of the revenue bonds for the water system, the employment of D. S. Holdridge, San Angelo attorney, to see about delinquent taxes, highway paving, and general city improvements.

It was brought out at the meeting that Bronte had 246 water users, and that the meter situation was as follows: 56 users have no meter, 16 users have meters in bad order, 17 users have poor meters, and 157 users have good meters.

Present for the meeting were Mayor H. O. Whitt, C. E. Bruton, O. W. Chapman, Cecil Kemp, C. R. Smith, D. K. Glenn, Willard Sharp, W. W. Millikin, and your reporter.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for tonight around 7:30.

EDITOR'S MAIL BAG

(This unusually interesting letter was received this week from Hervey Latham, and since he is so well known here, we are passing it on as a matter of interest to our readers.)

Seoul, Korea,
26 May 1947

Dear Mr. Nunnally,

Well, how is Bronte these days? Washing away, or blowing away? Knowing the Texas weather, one can never tell. We have been having very nice weather here, but the dust is very thick. Maybe it will rain some of these days, and when it starts, it won't stop until the latter part of August.

I just returned from Kyoto, Japan on a 7-day leave, and had one of the most interesting trips that I could possibly have hoped for. We saw many famous places, and many shrines and temples.

First of all we went through Hiroshima, which as you know is the first city the Atom Bomb was dropped on.

It is still just one more bunch of rubble. You see a small shack going up here and there, but no large buildings, with the exceptions of the ones that survived the blast. Some of them did, because all that was wrong with the depot was that it didn't have a top on it.

We stayed at a large hotel, which will compare with any in the states that I've ever seen. Beautiful on the inside, with huge murals painted on the wall, and the dining room took one-half of the sixth floor, and they had cute little Japanese waitresses. About all they could say in English is "What would you like please?" and "I am sorry." Everything that they did, they were sorry about it. Just tickled me to death.

We went to Nara, Japan while we were there. That is where most of the shrines are. The most interesting of the things we saw in Nara was the Great Buddha. That is the largest Buddha in the world, and to give you a little hint as to its size: 53½ feet high, face is 16 feet by 9½ feet, mouth is 3 feet and 9 inches long, it weighs 500 tons, and three people can easily sleep in the palm of his hand. The story that was told to us by the Red Cross girl that was with us, is this: This Buddha gets very dusty, and when they clean the dust off him, they save it. When a person (Buddist) gets sick, they can take this dust internally, and it will cure them of all ills.

The next thing that we saw was the Great Bell, which interested me only because of the story that is connected with it. The Buddhist people believe that they can ring this bell loud enough, and contact the spirit of someone who has died long ago.

Then on a hill, located just above the Bell, there is a temple, which had a peculiar story to it. Long ago, there was a king who wanted a living Buddha. He searched all over Japan for one, and finally found one near the city of Osaka. He brought this living Buddha to this temple (The Nigatsudo Temple) and hid him. Now in order for this Buddha to answer a person's prayer, this person must pray 100 times a day for 21 days. This person must climb hundreds of stairs, wash his hands and mouth (for purity) then pray, then descend another group of stairs, then go through the entire process again. I don't think that it is possible myself.

Back in Kyoto we visited the largest wooden building in the world. In it is a huge Japanese shrine. They have two beautiful altars (or that is what I would call them) made of the brightest shining metal, and anywhere from 30 to 40 people are there praying constantly. They get down on their knees, and it is very interesting to watch. They moan and groan for about five minutes, then rise, put some yen in a little box, and leave. In 1880 the reconstruction of the two chief buildings was started. Strong ropes were needed to hoist the heavy timbers for various purposes. Many pious women throughout the country, both young and old, cut off their hair to make ropes out of them. The coil that I saw was 236 feet in length and weighed 2234 pounds. Was really a huge thing.

Japan is so much nicer than Korea. It is a clean country, and the people look more like people, than the ape men we see over here. They are very courteous, because there they are the conquered, and here we are the liberators.

I have pictures of all the things that I have told you about, and I'm putting them in my photo album. I have the thing full, and it is sure a nice book. When I get home (which I am hoping will be in the near future), I will show them to you. This may not be interesting to anyone but me, but I would not take anything in the world for the trip. During peace time, people pay thousands of dollars to see what I saw for nothing.

COKE COUNTY NEEDS A NEW COURTHOUSE

Let's build the new Courthouse now. I don't believe that any one will deny that there is a County anywhere that is more in need of a new Courthouse than Coke County. The present courthouse is so old and has been repaired and braced so many times that it should really be condemned for further use. We have realized for several years the need of a new courthouse but have dismissed the proposition with the thought that the county site would have to be moved in the event the lake was built. Now that it seems definitely settled that the lake will not be built at this site we believe that it is the opportune time to build a new courthouse.

Some have raised the question of cost of materials at this time. In that respect we wish to call your attention to the fact that the cost of materials and labor is not very likely to be reduced within the next few years. On the other hand, money rates are advancing and only a small raise in the interest rates on the bonds would more than off set the lower costs of building. There should be very little if any raise in the tax rates to take care of the bond issue, since the full legal limit of 25 cents per hundred for the courthouse fund is already being assessed and used as an upkeep fund for the old courthouse, and for buildings outside of the courthouse for use of the AAA, County Agent and other State and County agencies.

With a new courthouse we would not only save this expense but would actually have a few offices to rent to lawyers and others who might need them. Tax valuations will show a considerable increase next year and for several years to come on account of increased oil business within our county. The office space in the old building is totally inadequate, especially in the County Clerk's office and vaults. Larger vaults are desperately needed to take care of the increased business and will be especially needed from now on.

The question has been raised as to where the new courthouse will be located. The law specifically states (Article 1595-96-97 of Vernon's Annotated Statute of Texas) that the courthouse shall be located in the County Site. Also that if the County Site is located within five miles of the center of the county and has been so located for as much as forty years a petition containing a majority of the qualified voters of the county must be presented to the Commissioners' Court requesting another location for the County Site, and then if such election is called it would require a two-thirds majority to change the location.

The very able architectural firm of Castle & Castle of Abilene was asked to make an estimate of the cost of the new building and their estimate of around \$260,000.00 is considered adequate and we would not be surprised if and when a contract is called for that the total costs will be a considerable amount less than this, in which case bonds would be issued only in the amount necessary to complete the building.

Since we all realize the very urgent need of a new courthouse and since the additional costs in taxes will be so small if any, lets get out and vote for the new courthouse for Coke County.
