

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

"For I say unto you, that except your righteousness shall exceed the righteousness of the Scribes and Pharisees, ye shall in no case enter the kingdom of heaven." Mat. 5:20.

There is that righteousness which is called of man: That purity of heart, uprightness of life, and conformity of good teachings. In order to be on the safe side, it must not be as that of the Pharisees which consisted in externals, selfishness, and hypocrisy.
