#### **HERE'S** BLACKWELL

Funeral services for Mrs. J. A. Jordan were held last Tuesday, August 19, at 4:00 p. m. at the Blackwell Methodist Church with Rev. John English of Baird in charge, assisted by Rev. Cecil Tune of Blackwell.

Coming to Blackwell in 1914, the ordans made their home here until his death on February 2, 1944. In May, 1945, Mrs. Jordan sold her Post Office at Bronte, Texas, March 1, ranching interests here and moved to 1918, under the Act of March 3, 1879. 

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

SOUTH ZONE: Oct. 20 to Dec. 3, both days inclusive, except in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmit, LaSaile, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenedy, and Willacy counties where mourning doves may be hunted only on Sept. 12. 14. and 16. from 4 p.m. to sunset, and from Oct. 20 to Nov. 30, from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

White-winged Doves SHOOTING HOURS: 4 p.m. to sunset.

BAG LIMIT: Not more than 10 per day and not more than 10 in possession. Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.
