Mary Pearl Bearden VENISON MINCEMEAT

Opening of deer season in Texas n the immediate future is certain to bring to wives of successful hunters the problem of using less tender cuts

The shoulder, neck and lower parts of the ribs when boned and ground makes good mincemeat. Using 5 cups of ground cooked venison, 5 cups brown sugar or molasses, ½ cup of vinegar, 6 medium sized oranges, 6 large lemons, 21/2 cups raisins, 21/2 cups currants, 2 tablespoons salt 2 teaspoons mace, 1 tablespoon allspice, 1 tablespoon nut meg, 1 tablespoon cinnamon, peel of 2 lemons and 2 oranges, 1 tablespoon ground cloves.

Wash currants, raisins, oranges, and lemons and let them drain. Mix sugar and spices. Peel lemons and oranges. Cut pulp into small uniform pieces, and run the peel through a food chopper-using a medium knife. Mix all ingredients together. Heat to boiling. Pack in R enamal cans or glass. Seal while hot. Process at 15 pounds pressure, No. 1 cans and half-pints 40 minutes, No. 2 cans and pints 50

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


