Grand Champion Hereford Calves



CHICAGO — This blocky load of Hereford steer calves topped the 3rd annual Chicago Feed Show here. They were exhibited by Fred G. DeBerard of Kremmling, Colo., and won the purple in competition with 76 carloads of all breeds. This makes two years in a row DeBerard has won this honor on Herefords, and Herefords have won all three shows. In the sale following the show this load of 422 lb. Herefords brought \$56.75 per cwt., and were purchased by 19-year-old 4-H Club member John Hart of Lee, Ill. The second prize load, also Herefords, brought a new all-time, all-market record of \$60 per cwt. This load weighed 387 lbs., was consigned by G. Dewey Norrell & Sons of Collbran, Colo., and was purchased by Lee Gannon of Delmar, Ia., for his sons' 4-H Club projects.

SKINNY ADAMS HURT

S. E. "Skinny" Adams of Robert Lee was seriously injured last Friday afternoon near San Marcos when the car he was driving collided head-on with another car driven by Charles S. Papa of Dallas, who was instantly killed. Skinny was brought to an Angelo hospital late that night, where it was reported he was suffering from a fractured left leg, a broken knuckle, and broken ribs and chest bruises.

Sherrell W. Green of Austin, one of three students hitch-hiking a ride with Skinny, died the following day from injuries he received in the wreck.

The two others, Lawrence Nelson of Austin, and Willard Young of Center Point, suffered less severe injuries.

It was reported that the accident occurred on slick, wet pavement when one of the cars tried to pass another on the three lane highway.

LATEST OIL NEWS . . .

Sun Oil Co. is locating 13 more tests in the Jameson field, where already it has completed 11 producers, has two more wells expected to be completed soon, and four other wells also drilling.

The 13 new wells, scheduled to get underway soon, will be drilled to a depth of 6,500-6,600 feet, and some four or five will be drilled at the same time.

Six of them will be on Homer Jameson's land, four on Fred's and one each on Allen Jameson's, C. E. Mather, and W. I. Tubbs lands.

No. 2 C. L. Mather will be 660 feet from the north line of section 459-1A-H&TC, and 1,200 feet east of No. 1 Mather, and No. 4 W. I. Tubbs will be 660 feet from the south, 1,980 feet from the east line of the Tubbs lease in the C. T. Shafer survey 1,199, 1/4-mile west of No. 2 Tubbs.

The other locations will all be in block 1A-H&TC Co. survey.

No. 3 Allen Jameson and No. 8 Homer Jameson will be in section 253, No. 4 Fred Jameson, No. 8 Fred Jameson, No. 9 Fred Jameson, and No. 6 Homer Jameson will be in section 315, No. 7, 9, 10, and 11 Homer Jameson will be in section 316, as well as No. 6 Fred Jameson.

No. 4 H. H. Jameson — Recorded a natural flow of 212.58 barrels of 48 gravity pipeline oil in 24 hours, with gas-oil ratio of 1,110-1. Gauge was through a 1/4-inch tubing choke from open hole between 6,238-537 feet.

The well topped the pay at 6,097 feet, and has an elevation of 2,127.3 feet. It is Sun's eleventh producer in the Jameson field.

No. 1 J. W. Arledge — Drilling started the first of the week on this well, located 8 miles east and 1 mile north of the discovery well. Ray-Harris is doing the drilling, 800 feet.

No. 5 H. H. Jameson — Spudded in Tuesday, contractors are Morris-Hamilton Drilling Co. of Houton. Down to 700 feet.

No. 1 C. L. Mathers — 5,700 feet.
No. 1 J. B. Walker — 5,400 feet.

No. 3 H. H. Jameson — Recovered 450 feet of gas-cut mud with sulphur odor and a rainbow of oil last Wednesday.

VENISON MINCEMEAT

Opening of deer season in Texas in the immediate future is certain to bring to wives of successful hunters the problem of using less tender cuts of venison.

The shoulder, neck and lower parts of the ribs when boned and ground makes good mincemeat. Using 5 cups of ground cooked venison, 5 cups brown sugar or molasses, ½ cup of vinegar, 6 medium sized oranges, 6 large lemons, 2½ cups raisins, 2½ cups currants, 2 tablespoons salt 2 teaspoons mace, 1 tablespoon allspice, 1 tablespoon nut meg, 1 tablespoon cinnamon, peel of 2 lemons and 2 oranges, 1 tablespoon ground cloves.

Wash currants, raisins, oranges, and lemons and let them drain. Mix sugar and spices. Peel lemons and oranges. Cut pulp into small uniform pieces, and run the peel through a food chopper using a medium knife. Mix all ingredients together. Heat to boiling. Pack in 8 enamel cans or glass. Seal while hot. Process at 15 pounds pressure, No. 1 cans and half-pints 40 minutes, No. 2 cans and pints 50 minutes.

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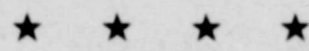
