

Led by Le Drew Arrott, who averaged 6.1 yards each time he carried the ball, the Bronte Longhorns were just not potent enough last Friday night at Ballinger, where the Menard Yellowjackets beat them by a count of 19-6 to win the bi-district championship of Districts 7-B and 8-B.

Menard scored midway in the sec ond quarter on a drive starting from their own 28-yard line. Eight plays later, with half of them passes, Menard had scored when Otis Guyton hit Jean Walker with a bullet pass in the end zone for the first score.

Early in the third quarter, Menard scored again after recovering a fumble on the Bronte 47-yard line. This time it took seven plays, mixed with end runs, off tackles, and over the center for the second counter.

Bronte's touchdown drive originated on their own 32-yard line, and 10 plays later they had punched across the counter. In this drive, Arrott tore around right end, Thomas passed to Sandusky, Kirchman went over right tackle, and Arrott went over left guard then hit center for the score. According to Buck Coleman, there is some \$500 in the building fund at this time, and this amount will be stretched as far as possible.


It is believed that about \$300 more is needed to complete the remodeling of the building.



The drouth is considered broken in northwest Texas. Rains averaging an inch or more fell during the last half of November, wetting the top soil to a depth of eight to 12 inches. Estimates indicate that more than 60 per cent of the wheat acreage was sowed before the rains came.

Only a small percentage of the voluntter seed sprouted and was killed, thus most of the planted acreage will include lots of volunteer growth which is likely to result in too thick stand.

Started late, the small wheat plants will not stool much nor develop a good root system as a defense against the danger of wind damage and winter killing. Harvesting of cotton and grain sorghums in the northwest is fully 90 per cent completed. Digging of sugar beets has been delayed by rain and cold weather but the processing plant requires that harvesting be completed by December 10. Range conditions are poor and there is no wheat pasture to present a scene far different from

that of a year ago. Elsewhere weather conditions during the past 30 days generally have been favorable for crop harvest, despite recent interruption by rain and scattered showers. Some damage to peanuts in the stack is reported; however, the moisture was badly needed to bring up volunteer wheat and small grain planted in day soil, also for pas-

A cotton crop of 3,250,000 bales, as of November 1, was up 100,000 bales from figures a month earlier, while rice increased from 22,491,000 bushels to 23,373,000 bushels. Corn slipped a bit during that period and grain sorghums and peanuts held their own. The latter is estimated at 319,600,000 pounds. Probably 90 per cent fo the rice crop has been harvested.

"Snowballs" are made of cotton dered copper sulphate or blue stone, and red flames come when strentium chloride is used. If you can get these powders you might like to make a tiny bag or basket of snowballs for a

fire or that of some friend. This is what you do: If you want

(blue stone);

Orange, get Calcium chloride;

Turquoise, get Copper chloride. Some of these may be sold in your local hardware store . . . if not, you may order them from manufacturing chemists in large cities near you. (Those sold in drug stores are usually chemically pure and the price is therefore much higher).

How ot apply the chemical salts: 1. Liquid method. First secure a wooden pail or tub or earthen crock. The chemicals will destroy metal container.)

Second, dissolve the chemical giving the color desired in the proportion of 1 pound to 1 gallon of water. This nount is sufficient to treat 1/2 to 1/4 bushels of cones. Place the kindling cones in a basket, porus bag, or some other similar container and dip them in the solution. This method saves your hands. Third, remove the kindling, let it

drain a bit, and then spread on paper Fourth, allow them to dry overnight, re-dip and dry.

Fifth, they are ready to be placed in red cheesecloth bags and hung near your fireplace, or to be given away for Christmas presents.

Dry method. 1. Dissolve glue in the proportion of 1 tablespoonful to gallon of boiling water. Dip the cones in this solution and remove them with a metal skimmer. Then sprinkle with the chemical while the cones are hot. A satisfactory product will result. A salt shaker with large holes in the top may be used for the fire powder in either of these methods. 2. Melt paraffin wax and, after spreading the wood or cones on paper, pour the wax lightly over them. Before the wax hardens, sift the chemicals onto the cones. This salt will adhere and will produce a very pleasant effect when burned. (Use the paraffin sparingly).

Caution: Copper salts will stain brick, tile, and concrete - so be careavoid permanent stains.
