State Highway Commission Chairman John S. Redditt explained the Coke County construction was part of a general statewide move to modernize and rehabilitate 1,456 miles of state roads. "We have ordered jobs estimated to

cost \$6,330,500 to protect our investment in present roads and to give greater comfort and convenience to the people using them," Redditt said. The projects ordered cover all areas and widening many narrow "razor back" roads, new surfaces for asphalt pavements, widening bridges, build-ing stable shoulders, eliminating sharp

PLUMBERS NEED LICENSE

Texas plumbers who do not secure state license before January 5, 1948, will be violating the new Texas License Law. They will not only be subject to the penalties of the Act, but will also be required to take an examination, C. E. Belk, Administrator of the Texas Plumbing Board warned here today.

The law, as passed by the last legis-lature, provides for no extension beyond this date nor does it provide for any exceptions. He said applications postmarked on or before January 5, will make it unnecessary for qualified plumbers to take an examination, but after that date all new license would require an examination. State License now being issued are valid until February 1, 1949, and may be renewed without examination, Belk

"It is not our desire to require any plumber to take the examination if he already qualified," Belk said, "but the deadline is set by the Law. However, the Board has been conducting examinations since November 25, and any person wishing to take the examination should make application immediately. Examination machinery is established and individuals will be scheduled promptly upon application and fee. Application blanks have been furnished to mayors in all Texas cities and additional copies can be secured by writing to the Texas Board of Plumbing Examiners, 306 West 15th, Austin, Texas.
