Noel Percifull swatted a pair of singles in four official appearances at the plate to bat in two runs.

Revival services will begin tonight, July 2, at the Bronte Church of Christ and will continue through Sunday, July 11. Morning and evening services will be held.



FISHER FAVORS SECURITY

The strong peace-with-security policy
the Administration has been fol-
lowing got strong bi-partisan backing
from the 80th Congress, reports Con-
gressman O. C. Fisher upon his return
from a busy six months in Washing-
ton.

While expressing hope our stepped-
up preparedness program will deter
the Russians and prove to be a posi-
tive force for peace, Fisher warned
against complacency at a time when
the Soviets are building up a tremen-
dous military machine and have been
gradually extending the iron curtain.

"We know from experience that
strength is the only language the dic-
tators understand", he added.

Congressman Fisher is making a
series of reports to the people on the
highlights of the recent session and
expects to visit in each county in the
district in the near future.

Representative Fisher listed some
of the highlights of the session as
follows.

1. The doom of the isolationists and
appeasers was spelled out.
2. The Reciprocal Trade Act was
extended.
3. More was done for expansion of
rural electrification than has been
done in a similar period in history.
Soil Conservation, so vital to our Na-
tion's economy, received further en-
couragement.
4. Highway aid was continued for
two additional years. About one-third
of this is earmarked for farm-to-mar-
ket roads.
5. The agriculture program was
extended for another year.
6. A number of bills were enacted
to improve the rehabilitation program
for war veterans, including an increase
in subsistence allowances for students,
an increase in the ceilings for on-the-
job trainees, and an increase in bene-
fits for widows and orphans of de-
ceased veterans. The Courts Martial
system was overhauled, designed to
improve equal justice and assure fair
trials.
7. A housing bill, giving veterans
preference in the purchase of war
housing units, resuming the insurance
on home mortgage loans, and author-
izing RFC to set up a secondary mar-
ket for GI loan obligations, was en-
acted.
8. Government costs for the next
year were cut by nearly \$2 billion
under budget requests.

Representative Fisher expressed dis-
appointment over the failure of the
Senate to act on the Tidelands bill,
the Mundt-Nixon bill to further curb
Communism, and the measure to re-
peal Federal taxes on oleomargarine.
All of these passed the House, he
pointed out.

He opposed the so-called Civil
Rights bills, and said they pertain to
subjects the States, and not the Fed-
eral Government, should deal with.

**SEED TESTING
AVAILABLE**

College Station, July 2 — (Spl) —
The Vetch Seed Testing Laboratory
of the Texas Agricultural Experiment
Station at A. and M. College is now
operating. Dr. E. B. Reynolds, labora-
tory director announced today. Ger-
mination and purity tests are being
run on seed from the crop now being
harvested.

Vetch is one of the best and most
widely grown legumes used in Texas
for soil improvement. It furnishes
protection against erosion, adds nitro-
gen and improves the physical condi-
tion of the soil.

Production of high quality vetch
seed has become an important source
of farm income in the West Cross
Timbers and adjacent farming areas.

An appropriation for experiments
with vetch and seed testing was made
available by the State Legislature at
the request of individual vetch seed
producers and grower organization,
Dr. Reynolds said. Services of the
laboratory will include germination
and purity tests on seed produced by
Texas growers.

The Red and White store here is


