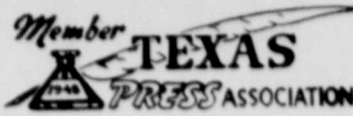

COMMISSIONER'S COURT HAS MONDAY MEETING

The Commissioner's court, in their regular session Monday, made application to the Tom Green county commissioner's court for a refund of state and county taxes which has been paid to them over a period of years on land, part of which is in Coke county. The court also approved the usual list of bills and the audit report recently submitted by Neimier Audit company of Lubbock.

They also reviewed and approved the treasurer's quarterly report. The court granted \$50 to the County Judges and Commissioners association of Texas as Coke county's share in defraying expense of a rural roads program which will be presented at the next session of the legislature.

They passed a resolution directed to the Governor petitioning him to call a special session of the legislature for the purpose of making available to the various counties some of the more than \$60 million of surplus now in the general fund of the state for farm to market roads, to help compensate officers and employees of counties and to help carry on various state departments operated in the county such as the old age assistance, public welfare, county service officers and the highway patrol.

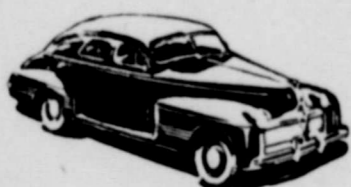

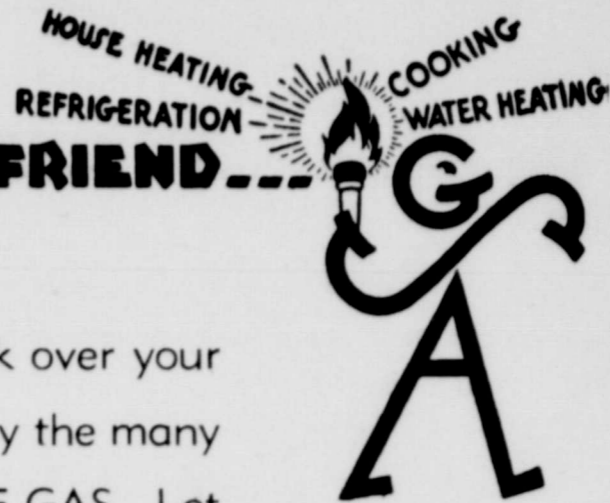

COKE TO BE SERVED BY BOYS CO-OP RANCH

Coke county is one of the thirty-two West Texas counties which will be served by the Boys' Co-op Ranch of West Texas. The Ranch will be a foster home for dependent or neglected boys from the 32 counties.

Edwin S. Mayer of Sonora and San Angelo, member of one of West Texas' oldest ranch families, has accepted regional chairmanship of the funds campaign to establish the Boys' Ranch at Tankersley, Texas. E. E. Armistead is the campaign director.

965 acres of productive ranch land have been set aside for the ranch, sale of which already has been contracted for.

M. D. Bryant of San Angelo, ranchman, oil man and financier, will be regional big gifts chairman in the establishment of the Ranch.

"It is highly essential that West Texas take care of its own boys in this particular field," Mr. Bryant said.

"Other such homes in the state are filled and there are long waiting lists." Organization for carrying on the funds drive comprises nine separate districts within the entire area. Head-quarter cities are Fort Stockton, Pecos, Odessa, Midland, Big Spring, Sweetwater, San Angelo, Junction and Brownwood.

The dedication of KTXI, the new radio station of the Department of Public Safety located two miles east of San Angelo on the Ballinger highway, will be held on Tuesday evening, July 20.

Henry will receive the certificate in San Antonio on July 28 at a meeting of the Association. Awards to be presented to teachers of Vocational Agriculture will be the first ever awarded by the Association.

According to Lewis B. Taylor, Executive Secretary of the Association, there are 554 teachers of Vocational Agriculture in Texas. Of this number, 235 have taught less than 10 years, 150 have taught 10 to 14 years, 39 have had 15 to 19 years' experience, 19 have served 20 to 24 years, and 11 have taught for more than 25 years.

Teachers with at least 10 years' service will receive certificates at the meeting. Bronze, silver, and gold lapel pins will be presented, respectively, to teachers with 15, 20, and 25 years' service.

LAPEL BUTTONS WILL BE GIVEN TO RELATIVES

An accolade and Gold Star lapel button will be distributed by the Adjutant General to the next of kin of members of the Army and Air Forces and Naval Forces of the United States who lost their lives in the service during the period between December 7, 1941 and July 25, 1947.

The buttons will be furnished without cost to the widow and to each parent. They will be furnished at cost price to each child, brother, sister, half brother and half sister. The cost of the button will be approximately \$1.50 and will be shipped C.O.D.
