Rawlings Well Has Good Showing of Oil

Bronte's first showing of oil became a reality Wednesday when early swab-bing of the Hickok & Reynolds No.1 E C. Rawlings wildcat C NE NW 453-1A-H&TC, made a good showing

The hole had been drilled 5,802 feet where granite was found, and was plugged back to around 5,300 feet. Perforations were made at 4,370 to 4,390 feet, and swabbings made Wednesday indicated a show of approximately 50 per cent oil at the rate of about one barrel per hour.

The well is located 11/2 miles west of Bronte on the Robert Lee highway. The perforations were made in the Palo Pinto lime, which is new pay for this county. A fair showing of gas was also had with each swabbing. When the well is cleaned out the operators will presumably acidize it.

Townspeople and farmers alike were driving back and forth from the Rawlings well all day Wednesday and everyone apparently was favorably impressed by the early prospects for boys. a producer.

Jess Percifull had several samples of oil taken from the well, which he was showing to all who were interested. His samples became clearer and showed a greater percentage of oil as the day progressed.

COMMISSIONER'S COURT HAS MONDAY MEETING

The Commissioner's court, in their regular session Monday, made application to the Tom Green county commissioner's court for a refund of state and county taxes which has been paid to them over a period of years on land, part of which is in Coke county.

The court also approved the usual list of bills and the audit report recently submitted by Neimier Audit company of Lubbock.

They also reviewed and approved the treasurer's quarterly report.

The court granted \$50 to the County Judges and Commissioners association of Texas as Coke county's share in defraying expense of a rural roads program which will be presented at the next session of the legislature.

They passed a resolution directed to the Governor petitioning him to call a special session of the legislature for the purpose of making available to the various counties some of the more than \$60 million of surplus now in the general fund of the state for farm to market roads, to help compensate officers and employees of counties and to help carry on various state departments operated in the county such as the old age assistance, public welfare, county service officers and the highway patrol.


