## Dam on Big Oak Creek Is Proposed at UCRA Meeting with Reclamation Bureau

UCRA directors returned to their homes earlier this week after meeting in Austin, Monday, with the Bureau of Reclamation, and various state agencies for the purpose of speeding up the study on the Colorado River dam project above Robert Lee. A proposal for another dam which would be under the jurisdiction of the UCRA was heard and taken into consideration. This additional dam would be on Oak Creek near Fort Chadbourne in northeastern Coke County.

The survey on the proposed dam above Robert Lee was narrowed to two alternatives: 1. A large dam impounding water sufficient to provide Colorado City, Big Spring, Midland and Odessa with municipal water supplies, along with smaller communities in Coke and Runnels counties, and for 40,000 acres of downriver irrigation; 2. A minimum-sized dam providing municipal water for the cities and 5,000 acres of irrigation.

Regarding the Oak Creek project, L. T. Youngblood, chairman of UCRA, stated that the river authority itself would check into the feasibility, need and financing factors of the dam. The Oak Creek dam would impound 35,000 acre feet of water and furnish irrigation for 3,000 acres of land in Coke and Runnels counties, as well as furnish municipal water supplies for Bronte, Robert Lee and Sweetwater. The Gulf refinery at Sweetwater now needs extra water, and Sun Oil Company has expressed a wish for a large amount of water to be used in connection with a repressuring plant which is planned for the near future.

It was found at the Austin meeting that the City of Sweetwater has already filed a presentation for an Oak Creek reservoir, which would be outside the watershed now serving that city. River authority officials expressed the belief that any conflict existing between the counties involved could be "ironed out" inasmuch as UCRA is interested in providing water supplies for as much of its territory as possible.

UCRA board members attending the meeting at Austin were Chairman Youngblood of Bronte, Secretary Gerald C. Allen and Member Cumbie Ivey of Robert Lee, Vice-Chairman H. G. Wendland of San Angelo, Glenn R. Lewis, San Angelo attorney, also participated in the meetings.

### CITY STREETS AND ALLEYS BEING SPRAYED

Spraying of the streets and alleys in Bronte with DDT began Thursday morning, according to Mayor Whitt. Local city officials borrowed the spraying machine from County Agent T. B. Hicks.

The Mayor stated that the spraying will be done free of charge but that anyone who wishes to contribute to the cost of the DDT which is being used may do so. All alleys and streets in Bronte which are not blocked will be sprayed.

## Local Well To Test In Higher Palo Pinto After Cementing

Hickok & Reynolds Inc., and Dan Auld No. 1 E. C. Rawlings wildcat 1 1/2 miles west of Bronte, will perforate the casing and further test the Palo Pinto pay above the section which was recently tested at 4,370-90 feet, it was reported yesterday.

The perforations at 4,370-90 feet were to be squeezed with cement, following a flow of practically all salt water after the well was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid. Prior to the acidizing, the well had swabbed oil naturally at the rate of about 35 barrels per day.

Earlier reports indicated that the next test would be at 5,100-5,200 feet in the Marble Falls, from which an estimated 10 to 15 million cubic feet of gas was recovered daily, and a little distillate showed. The latter report that the No. 1 Rawlings well would be tested in the Palo Pinto above the acidized section indicates a change in plans.

## HIGHWAY THRU TOWN WILL BE 40 FEET WIDER

## Tomorrow Is Election Day

Precinct, county, state and national politicians made their final pleas for votes this week in preparation for the Democratic primary elections throughout the state tomorrow. Of top interest on the Coke county slate is the county judge's contest, the only county office which is being sought by more than one candidate. Jeff Dean, former Bronte school superintendent, is seeking the office while his opponent, Bob Davis is seeking re-election to his second term.

Of particular interest to the Bronte citizens is the county commissioner's contest for precinct No. 2. Otis Smith, the present commissioner, is seeking re-election while Marlin Mackey and Leroy Scott are also seeking the office.

The election in Bronte will be held in the City Hall, as usual, and the polls will open at 7 a. m. D. K. Glenn and J. T. Henry are election judges. Clerks who will help with the local election are Mrs. Frank Keeney, Mrs. D. K. Glenn, Mrs. C. C. Glenn and Mrs. Nell Flores. The polls will close at 7 p. m.

Other names to appear on the county slate are: Paul Good, candidate for re-election as sheriff; Willis Smith,

candidate for re-election as county clerk; Ruby L. Pettit, up for re-election as county treasurer and Frank C. Dickey, seeking the office of county attorney.

Candidates for commissioner of Precinct 1 are Henry Varnadore, J. C. Strickland and J. W. Service. Ralph Garvin and T. R. Harmon are running for commissioner of Precinct 3, and J. P. Arrott and Claude Dittmore are both seeking election as commissioner of Precinct 4.

On a statewide scale, interest in the U. S. Senate race has overshadowed that of the governor's race, with the big three, Lyndon Johnson, Coke Stevenson and George Peddy, each fighting to win in tomorrow's election without a runoff.

Of interest here, too, is the race for congressman from the 21st district with O. C. Fisher seeking re-election to the office. Seeking to unseat him are Charles South and Howell E. Cobb.

Election officials here urge that the qualified voters all get to the polls tomorrow and make a good showing in this precinct. They stress that it is not only a duty to vote but is the privilege of every American citizen.

THE SABBATH AND REST

"Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labour, and do all thy work: but the seventh is the sabbath of the Lord thy God: in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, thy manservant, nor thy maidservant, nor thy cattle . . ." (Ex. 20:8-10)

This is no arbitrary law, but a principle ingrained in the very nature of the universe. It has been scientifically proven that even steel gets tired, that locomotives that are allowed one day of rest in seven give better service. Much more essential is the day of rest for man. The night rest period is not sufficient to restore the surplus oxygen in the blood, so that each succeeding work day reduces the surplus more and more. During the day of rest that surplus, necessary to prevent fatigue, is restored. Many war plants found that they got only six-day production out of men who worked seven days per week.

Rest is so essential to the welfare of mankind that we cannot afford to continue to disregard this law of God for our bodies. We speak of breaking the ten commandments, but they cannot be broken. We only break ourselves upon them.

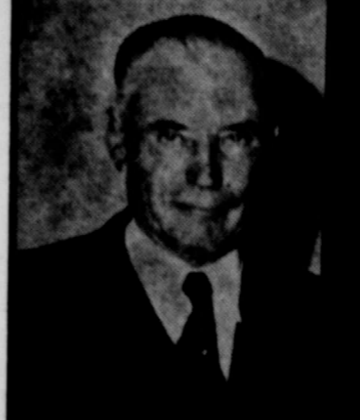

### DRIVERS URGED TO "TAKE IT EASY"

Would you drive your car off a 10-story building?

Well, that's what it's like to hit a solid obstruction when driving 60 miles an hour, according to Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Speed kills - take it easy" is the slogan of a traffic campaign the Texas Highway Patrol is conducting during July as part of a continuing program to save lives on the streets and highways of this community. The year-round program is part of a nationwide traffic safety educational promotion of the National Safety Council.

"Just remember, when you find yourself driving a little too fast, that the faster you go the greater is the destructive power of your car," W. J. Elliott, Chief of the Texas Highway Patrol said. "And remember, too, that the higher your speed if you have an accident, the greater are your chances of being killed. In fact, the chance that an accident will be fatal is eight times as great at a speed of 60 miles an hour or more than at 20 or less."

Speed is a contributing factor in two out of every five fatal motor vehicle accidents, state traffic authorities report. They interpret "speed" as "violation of speed limits" and also "speed too fast for conditions."

"Speed is an accident cause all of us can help to eliminate," officials of the Texas Highway Patrol said. "We can do this by driving within legal and common sense speed limits, and by supporting our police in the enforcement of all speed regulations in our community and state. Let's eliminate this killer."

### WATER MAIN BEING LAID THIS WEEK

A new city water main is being laid this week and will make much improvement in the city water supply. The four inch main will be approximately 4,400 feet long when completed and will extend west from the water tower about 870 feet and north 1,300 feet. The line then turns back east for 900 feet and then south back to the water tower.

When completed the main will make a complete loop and will cover most of the west part of town except for a 3 inch main which is to be put down in the near future. The latter main will run between the 4 inch lines.

Shipment on the pipe for the 3 inch line has been promised for the last of July and will be installed immediately upon delivery.



### 1949 ACP FUNDS AUTHORIZATION UPPED

Plans may now be developed for a 1949 Agricultural Conservation Program offering farmers almost twice as much assistance for conservation practices as was available under this year's program.

For the current fiscal year, the Agriculture Department Appropriation Act sets aside \$150 million for the 1948 program, including administrative expense. This was the amount Congress authorized last year for developing the 1948 program. Congress this year has authorized the development of a 1949 program amounting to \$262.5 million.
