No. 1 Rawlings Seems To Be A Producer; Forty To Fifty Barrels A Day Made In Test

Hickok & Reynolds, Inc., and Dan Auld No. 1 E. C. Rawlings well 1 1/2 miles west of Bronte on the Robert Lee highway appeared Wednesday to be a producer as forty to fifty barrels of oil per day were being swabbed.

Plans were to put the well on the pump the first of this week, but due to the steady increase in the amount of production, it was decided to continue swabbing for a few more days. Tentative plans now call for setting up the pump today, Friday.

The writer was out at the Rawlings well Wednesday afternoon and it made approximately five barrels of oil on one pull of the swab, with the swab being pulled every two hours.

Latest reports say that at least two offsets of the Rawlings well will be started in the near future. One will be drilled by American Republic on Jess Percifull's land, across the highway from the Rawlings land, and the other by Humble on the Hickman land between the Rawlings well and Bronte.

Seaboard and Southern Minerals No. 2 Reed drilled to a total depth of 6,680 feet in Cambrian sand. It is to be plugged and abandoned as no show was found in the 420 feet of Ellenburger through which the well was drilled.

Sun Oil Co. No. 7 Mathers tested at 5,804 to 5,819 feet. There was a slight blow of air and 30 feet of drilling mud was recovered.

Sun Oil Co. No. 9 Jameson has reached a total depth of 6,421 feet. The hole has been swabbed down to 4,000 feet from the surface, with 30 per cent drilling mud and 70 per cent oil emulsion found. Plans call for bleeding and further swabbing.

Shamrock No. 2 Wendland drilling at 6,231 feet in Bend lime with no shows.

Sun Oil Co., No. 2 Walker drilling at 4,607 feet in shale and sand.

YEAR'S WORK PLANNED BY COUNTY HD CLUBS

Plans were started Tuesday for next year's plan of work for the Women's Home Demonstration clubs of Coke County. The yearbook chairman from each club met with the Council WHD committee under the direction of Miss Mary Pearl Bearden, county home demonstration agent, and Miss Thelma Casey, district agent, San Angelo.

How to plan the Home Demonstration club yearbook was studied and these plans were found to divide naturally into two parts: subject matter which consists of three main divisions: home economics, programs of study and action of the Texas Home Demonstration association, and material of general and timely interest. Also, form and arrangement of yearbook was discussed.

Long-time plans for Coke County have been clothing and home improvement. These demonstrations should be carried from two to four years. Suggestions from the committee were to continue home improvement and make long time plans on landscaping, food or family life education. These suggestions were carried back to the clubs for discussion. The two main demonstrations carried should be given at the times when they will be most effective.

With the advise of the specialist and the district agent, the county home demonstration agent and the council will work out the long time plan for the demonstration. This will form the basis of the home economics part of the home demonstration club program.

The mishap occurred when the two boys, riding a bicycle, were struck by a car. The vehicle narrowly missed two other youths who were standing near a second bicycle.

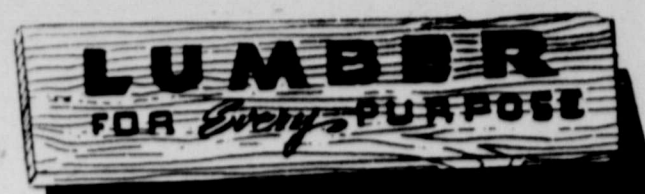

AAA NEWS

Plans and provisions of the 1949 Agricultural Conservation Program are "Shaping Up," so that farmers of Texas will not be delayed in making their conservation plans for the coming year. According to B. F. Vance, Chairman of the State PMA Committee, the 1949 National Outline, approved by the Secretary of Agriculture, has been received. The National Outline is made up of practices recommended by State PMA and County Agricultural Conservation Committees after the advice and assistance of soil and crop specialists of State and Federal Agricultural Agencies.

State PMA officials, soil and crop specialists of State and Federal Agricultural Agencies met with County Agricultural Conservation Committees and Administrative Officers in the State PMA office in College Station July 19, 20, and 21 to review the National outline and to develop the State Agricultural Conservation Program for 1949.

The Conservation practices for 1949 have been re-grouped under six major objectives which focus attention on the soil and water problems the practices are to help correct. The first objective is "Practices to Protect Farm Soil from Erosion by Wind and Water." In this group are such practices as the construction of dams, terraces, sod waterways, farming on the contour, strip-cropping and planting trees.

Other practices are grouped under the following objectives: "Developing Cropping Systems to Restore and Maintain Soil Productivity," "Practices to Restore and Maintain Sustained Yields on Range and Pasture," "Practices to Conserve and Obtain Efficient Use of Irrigation Water," Forestry and drainage practices are the other groups.

In 1949 there will be an increased emphasis on local use of the program to meet specific and "most serious" conservation problems. County Committees will be encouraged to "push" practices which are most needed in meeting local problems. In many instances this will mean the introduction of practices which are not well known in the county or community and which need added assistance to get them started.
