Rawlings Well Produces 74 Barrels in Official Test

Bronte's oil well, the Hickok & Reynolds, Inc. and Dan Auld No. 1 E. C. Rawlings, made 74 barrels of oil week. The well was perforated at 4,370 to 4,390 feet in the Palo Pinto lime for the production.

The Rawlings well was put on the swabbing. It made 40 to 45 barrels per day on the swab, and showed considerable increase on the pump. Unofficial reports say that two off-

sets to the Rawlings well will be started in the next few days. One will be drilled by American Republic on Jess Percifull's land, just north of the Rawlings land. The other will be on the Hickman land, between the Rawlings land and town. It will be drilled by Humble.






