Complete purchase of the 114,000 acre feet of storage in the North Concho reservoir is proposed by the UCRA. Youngblood said routine matters were taken up at the conference. The group flew home Tuesday night.

4-H GIRLS HAVE PICNIC TUESDAY

At the meeting of the 4-H club on August 17, a demonstration was given on the freezing of ice cream. The demonstration was given by Mrs. H. A. Springer, sponsor, at her home. It was demonstrated that the proper proportion of eight parts of ice to one part of salt mixed together before freezing makes a smooth textured cream if the freezer is turned slowly at first and then more rapidly when the cream begins to freeze. The demonstration also included the use of Eagle brand condensed milk, which gives a smooth texture to uncooked ice cream. A small amount of coloring makes an attractive dessert.

During the business hour Camille Martin acted as president and Felma Brunson as secretary. At the next meeting, the officers for the coming year will be elected.

For recreation, Judith Anderson and Camille Martin directed games to music played by Juanetta Coalson at the piano.

GRAIN LOANS DEPEND ON STORAGE

Although loans are available to support the farm price of wheat and grain sorghums, they cannot be made unless the grain is stored properly. Details of the loan program, together with specifications for proper storage, may be obtained at the County ACA Office, located in the Agricultural Building, in Robert Lee, Texas.

Providing enough storage for a record crop of all grains has become a major problem for the Nation. Preliminary surveys indicate the Country is 800 million bushels short of enough storage space for the 1948 crop. Officials point out that every bit of the large crop is needed and none should be allowed to spoil through improper storage.

There is little chance to expand country and terminal elevator storage, so if the crop is all to be put under cover it will have to be stored on the farms. If farmers will make their storage requirements known instead of waiting until too late, it is possible that the problem can be met.

It is urged that all farmers who have grain to store to be alert to the problem and not depend on country or terminal elevator storage which may not be available when the grain is harvested.

The Tuesday evening meal consisted of outdoor cookery, and learning to cook "Angels on Horseback."

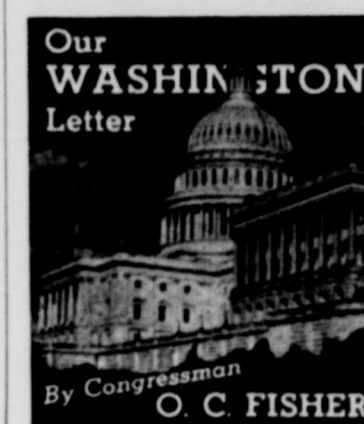

Drilling Continues In Jameson Field; Two Locations Are Staked



With the Congress in recess, the big news in Washington during the past week has been the disclosure of wartime Communist spy activities. This has been done through public hearings conducted by House and Senate Committees.

There have been three principal sources of information; namely, Elizabeth T. Bentley, Louis Budenz, and Whittaker Chambers. They are all ex-Communists and make no bones about their past.

Miss Bentley, a Vassar College graduate, said she fell in love with a Russian agent named Jacob Golos, and she became the chief courier for Golos' spy ring which had been operating for years. During the war she said she made fortnightly trips from New York to Washington to pick up secret information from Government employees and then passed it on to Golos. The latter died and Miss Bentley quit the Commies in 1945 and told her story to the F.B.I. and a New York Grand Jury.

Budenz was once editor of the Communist Daily Worker, was high in Communist councils, and reformed a couple of years ago. He is now a professor up at Fordham College and is believed to be a sincere and honest man. Budenz holds no punches. He corroborates Miss Bentley's testimony in many respects, particularly where she put the Commie label on a number of individuals. I have questioned Budenz myself in the past. He leaves a good impression, and is undoubtedly strongly anti-Communist at present.

Douglas Chambers is another ex-Communist, having quit the party several years ago. He is now a senior editor of Time Magazine. His testimony corroborated Miss Bentley on several points. He, Miss Bentley, and Budenz all told their stories to the F.B.I. long ago.

Douglas Chambers told the House Committee that both Nathan Witt and Lee Pressman were part of the Washington Communist group. Both of them formerly worked for the Government. After Pressman left the Government, he became General Counsel for the C.I.O. While Pressman acted in that capacity, Nathan Witt was Executive Secretary to the National Labor Relations Board. The Commies had a glorious time in those days. Non-Communist unions found their cases delayed before the N.L.R.B. while the C.I.O. pro-Communist unions were given special attention. Pressman and Witt worked together beautifully.

Now, Pressman and Witt are law partners in New York and are helping to run Henry Wallace's Commugressive Third Party campaign. Pressman is running for Congress on the Wallace ticket.

I recall that in February, Witt showed up in Washington as attorney for the Communist-dominated United Public Workers of America, C.I.O., when a committee of which I was a member was investigating a strike that union had pulled against Government cafeterias in Washington. During the time I was interrogating Abram Flazer, president of the union, Witt became so unruly the Committee chairman ordered the police to remove him from the room.

It is well to keep in mind that spying is not in itself the most important work of the Communist Party. The Party's main activities are false propaganda every day, the poisonous smearing of this country, and of the Congress as an institution in particular, the gnawing away at American loyalty, the general impact of a Fifth Column.

And while the revelations of spying activities during wartime may not produce sufficient evidence to warrant indictments, the hearings may serve to arouse more people into realizing what the Communist Party is - not a party at all, but a huge conspiracy.

Hickok & Reynolds, Inc. and Dan Auld No. 1 E. C. Rawlings, 1 1/2 miles west of Bronte was pumping an unreported amount of oil. New locations to offset the Rawlings well are still rumored, but no new locations had been made at press time Thursday. Two offsets to the Rawlings well are anticipated.

Two new locations were staked in the northwest part of Coke County recently. They are:

Al G. Hill No. 2 Ralph H. Harris Estate, a 7,200 foot rotary wildcat, 22 miles northwest of Bronte, and east and south of the Jameson field.

Sun Oil Co. No. 8 C. E. Mathers, 6,000 feet in the Jameson field.

Sun Oil Co. No. 5 C. E. Mathers in the Jameson field in the northwestern part of Coke County was continuing to test late Wednesday after flowing 254.7 barrels of oil in 24 hours through a one-fourth inch choke at a total depth of 6,377 feet.

Sun No. 1 Calla Mae Cargile, in northern Coke County was plugged and abandoned at total depth of 6,882 feet in Ellenburger Dolomite. It showed only sulphur water with no oil or gas.

Sun No. 1 P. W. Millican wildcat nine miles south of the Jameson field, had again plugged back in an attempt to straighten out a crooked hole.

Sun No. 7 C. E. Mathers was preparing to core at a total depth of 6,210 feet in lime.

Sun No. 2 J. B. Walker had reached a total depth of 5,712 feet in shale.

Sun No. 8 Fred Jameson was drilling at 3,305 feet in shale.

Allen Guberson and others No. 2 Jack Lassiter, offset to the Marble Falls discovery, No. 1 Lassiter, was drilling below 3,330 feet in shale and lime.

STEPHENSON SERVICES TO BE HELD SATURDAY

Funeral services will be held at the Bronte Baptist church Saturday afternoon at 4 p. m. for Pfc. Buel Stephenson, son of L. M. Stephenson of Roscoe, Rev. Denton from Abilene will officiate and interment will be in the Bronte cemetery under the direction of Cliff Funeral Home of Bronte.

Young Stephenson was killed in Belgium during world war II and his body was returned home for burial. The Bronte American Legion post will officiate. The body, which arrived in New York in July, will arrive in Bronte by rail Saturday morning.

Pfc. Stephenson graduated from Miles high school and entered the service soon after graduation. He lived in and around the Brookshire community. He was a member of the Brookshire softball team for a number of years.

He is survived by five brothers and one sister.
