Democrats Win Overwhelming Majority In Both Local and National Elections

A straight Democratic ticket was the rule here in Bronte in Tuesday's election with about 95 percent of the ballots cast being for the Democratic nominees in every race from the President of the United States on down.

Truman received 304 votes to 15 for Dewey and one for States Right-

er Thurmond. Democratic nominee for Vice President Barkley received the same vote as President Truman.

Another race of interest was the one for the United States Senate post now occupied by W. Lee (Pappy) O'Daniel. Democratic nominee, Lyndon Johnson was overwhelmingly elected here in Bronte with 298 votes. Republican Porter received 23 and Prohibitionist Sam Morris received one vote.

All eight of the constitutional amendments voted on carried in the state as a whole, but numbers seven and eight were defeated in the Bronte box. Number seven, the one to abolish the state ad valorem tax was defeated here 111 to 36, while number eight, the amendment to provide compensation and retirement for judges was defeated here 107 to 40.

Bronte voters saw eye to eye with the remainder of the state and nation on all the candidates running for offices, and on all the constitutional amendments except the two noted above.

B. F. Bridges was election judge for the Bronte box. Three hundred twenty-eight ballots were cast.

MARLENE ARROTT WINS IN AREA STYLE SHOW

Marlene Arrott of Bronte was one of six San Angelo area winners in the "Sew It Yourself with Wool" style show and contest held Monday in San Angelo. Miss Arrott was first place winner in the junior dress division with a tailored green wool gabardine made by a Simplicity pattern at a total cost of \$20.40. She wore rust-colored accessories.

The six winners will vie with winners from eight other areas when the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association meets in San Angelo in December.

Other first place winners were: Jo Anne Moreland of San Angelo, senior dress division; Dona Hendry, Abilene, junior dress division; Jo An Jarvis, Sweetwater, junior suit division; Betty Jane Donalson, Sterling City, senior suit division; and Patsy Jeanne Kelly, Stanton, junior dress division.

Entries in the contest were judged on their workmanship, judgement used in selection of materials, fit and becomingness of the style to the contestant and choice of accessories.

Mary Dean Cresap of Bronte won a second place award in the senior coat division.

Some 500 persons attended the show in the San Angelo college auditorium and the tea which followed in the college home making cottage. The show was under the direction of Mrs. H. C. Noelke, area contest chairman.

POSSIBILITIES OF DAMS FOR BRONTE, ROBERT LEE TO BE DISCUSSED

Possibility of UCRA construction of two small dams to provide municipal water supplies for Robert Lee and Bronte will be discussed tonight at a meeting of UCRA officials and the city officials of Bronte and Robert Lee.

The proposed dam for Bronte would be along East Kickapoo Creek according to engineering reports from the Lubbock engineering firm of Parkhill & Cooper who recently completed the surveys. The Robert Lee dam would be built immediately northeast of the town on Mountain Creek.

Preliminary surveys indicate that the Bronte job would cost approximately \$111,780 and the Robert Lee project would cost approximately \$78,975 and another \$35,000 for a water treatment plant and \$45,560 for distributive system expansion.

The UCRA would construct the dams and the cities would purchase the water at the reservoirs.

Equipment Arrives For Two Offsets To Hickok & Reynolds No. 1 Rawlings

Excitement concerning oil development around Bronte ran high this week as equipment arrived to begin drilling two offsets to the field opener, Hickok and Reynolds No. 1 E. C. Rawlings.

The rig was up Thursday for Humble No. 1 R. E. Hickman and equipment was arriving Thursday morning

for the American Republic No. 1 Jess Percifull. Drilling is expected to get underway in the next few days.

Sun No. 1 P. W. Millican 12 miles west of Robert Lee, released their rig Thursday morning after swabbing and the well's kicking off. On a six hour test it flowed 120 barrels of oil through a quarter inch choke. Casing pressure was 375 pounds and tubing pressure was 25 pounds. Oil and gas ratio was 1,400 to 1, and the oil being made was 40.8 gravity.

Sun No. 13 H. H. Jameson on a six hour test flowed 32.5 barrels of oil through a quarter inch choke. It is expected that a potential will be taken the last of this week.

Sun No. 4 J. B. Walker was preparing for completion having reached a total depth of 6,306 feet.

In Nolan county Sun-Seaboard No. 1 Mamie Haney, west central Nolan county wildcat, had reached a depth of 7,402 feet. A drillstem test recovered 6,000 feet of sulphur water with no shows of gas or oil. The well is located 11 miles south and slightly west of Sweetwater and about 16 miles north and slightly east of Sun No. 1 J. W. Arledge, opener of the Arledge (Marble Falls) field in northern Coke county. It is expected that the wildcat will be plugged and abandoned.

BUSINESSES WILL CLOSE ARMISTICE

Most of the business establishments in Bronte have indicated that they will observe November 11, Armistice Day, as a holiday and will be closed on that day. Merchants ask that everyone attend to their business in town on Wednesday, so as not to be inconvenienced by the closing.

BRONTE LIONS HEAR YOUNGBLOOD SPEAK ON DAM PROSPECTS

The Bronte Lions club, meeting in regular session Wednesday at noon, heard UCRA Chairman L. T. Youngblood give a brief talk on the prospects for a dam on East Kickapoo creek, east of here, to provide a municipal water supply.

Lion Youngblood pointed out that the prospects for the immediate construction of the big dam on the Colorado above Robert Lee are not too good, and that smaller dams at Bronte and Robert Lee may be the answer to the two cities' water supply needs.

He said that it may be possible to work something out with the city commissions of the two Coke county towns in a meeting to be held here tonight.

Lockhart, well-known educator and who later ranked high in military circles, died, about 13 years ago.

She also recalled the fact that there is only one year's difference in their ages and that their birthdays are on Nov. 3 and Nov. 5, respectively. Until the girls were about seventeen years old, they always celebrated their birthdays with a joint party on Nov. 4 so it is quite a coincidence that Mrs. Lockhart happened to visit here on their "party" night, Nov. 4.

CHRISTMAS PARCELS SHOULD BE MAILED

Christmas packages for Army and Air Force personnel and Department of the Army and Air Force civilian employees stationed overseas should be mailed between October 15 and November 15, Major General Edward F. Witsell, The Adjutant General, who operated the Army's postal system, has announced.

If the suggested mailing period is used, there is more definite assurance that Christmas packages will arrive just before or during the holiday season.

Gifts should be packaged securely, General Witsell advised, in box materials of metal, wood, or very strong fiberboards. He also recommended that the addressee's name, together with a list of the contents be written on a slip of paper inside the box. This will enable delivery to be made if the outside address should be obliterated in handling.

The address should be placed directly on the box or wrapping and not on gummed labels, which may become moist and lost from the package.
