U. S. ARMY NEEDS SECOND LIEUTENANTS

Second lieutenants having all but disappeared from the muster rolls, the Army is now taking steps to replenish the supply. Captain Wayne Hall, Station Commander of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Main Station in Abilene stated today.

Appointments as second lieutenants, men and women, with at least two years of active duty, opportunities for commissions in the regular army, are now open to both civilians and to members of the regular army and the organized reserves.

Civilians must have had at least one year of military service between December 7, 1941 and June 30, 1947, be between 19 and 32 years old, and have a minimum of two years in an accredited college or university.

Army personnel with two years of college and one year of service between those dates are also eligible, but the age brackets are 21 to 28 inclusive.

Members of the military establishment who lack two years of college credit may be appointed second lieutenants if they were warrant officers or non-commissioned or petty officers of the first three grades; platoon or staff sergeant, or petty officers second class and up.

Civilians may make application at the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting Station at 15 East Concho Avenue, San Angelo, Texas.

Two Coke County Pioneers Pass Away

Uncle Jim Williams Dies Here Wednesday; Funeral Held Thursday

Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 P. M. Thursday for J. J. (Uncle Jim) Williams, Bronte resident for 42 years, at the First Baptist church here. Uncle Jim, as he was affectionately called by all who knew him, died at 2:50 a. m., Wednesday, at the age of 94 years, 10 months and 27 days. He had been in ill health for the past year, but became seriously ill three weeks ago.

Mr. Williams was born in Granada,

Miss., Feb. 14, 1854, and came to Texas at the age of 21. He was married to Margaret Ella Dear, Jan. 15, 1878. The couple have three surviving children. They came to Bronte in 1902 from Falls county. Mr. Williams was a stock farmer until his retirement.

For the past five years he had lived with Mr. and Mrs. A. D. Miller. Mrs. Miller is a niece of the late Mrs. Williams, who preceded her husband in death on Dec. 2, 1935.

Uncle Jim was the oldest deacon in the local Baptist church. He was always present for both Sunday School and church services, some of his friends said.

Survivors include the three children, J. W. Williams, Comanche; Mrs. W. B. Crenshaw, Sweetwater; and C. C. Williams, Pomona, Calif.; one step-son, W. O. Dear of Floydada; 27 grandchildren, 36 great grandchildren and two great-great grandchildren.

Pallbearers were some of the grandchildren. All of Mr. Williams' friends were named honorary pallbearers. Final rites were conducted by Rev. C. R. Blake, former pastor here, assisted by Rev. V. D. Price, pastor of the First Baptist now, and Rev. Alvin R. Mauldin, pastor of the Methodist church. Interment was in Fairview cemetery with Clift Funeral home in charge of arrangements.

BRONTE FARMER CONSTRUCTS WATER SPREADING SYSTEM

Edward Cumbie, a district co-operator of the Coke County Soil Conservation District has planned and is now applying a water spreading system on his farm east of Bronte. Cumbie will pick all runoff water from about ninety acres of rangeland and spread it on forty-five acres of cropland. To develop the water spreading system it was necessary that Cumbie construct a diversion terrace 2,000 feet long, two miles or ridge type level, closed end terraces. By use of a vegetative water channel 600 feet long the water will be metered behind each terrace and be trapped and soak into the ground. Cumbie plans to seed Buffalo grass in the channel to stabilize the soil in the waterway. "I believe that the extra water that I can add with the water spreading system will insure a good crop every year," Cumbie said.

The Coke County Soil Conservation District was organized because the land owners recognized the ever decreasing production of their cropland as well as the deterioration of their rangeland along with the rapid rate of soil erosion.

The district is a political subdivision of the state, operating under a certificate of organization and comparable only to counties, cities and independent school districts. Five local land owners constitute the governing body. The land owners are charged with the administration of the district which is independent. It is answerable only to the citizens of Coke County Soil Conservation District. The objective of the district is to treat each acre of land in accordance with its needs and to use it to produce those things it's best adapted to produce. R. B. Allen, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, points out.

The Board of Supervisors has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with the United States Department of Agriculture whereby all the resources of the Soil Conservation Service are made available to the district. The responsibility for the program and plan of work rests with the farmers and ranchers themselves. Soil Conservation Service technicians who assist the district collect information on soils and erosion for use in helping the farmer or rancher to develop a complete coordinated conservation plan. Then they help apply that pro-

M. A. (Allen) Butner, prominent Bronte citizen, passed away at 1:40 a. m. Sunday at Karen-Gayl hospital in Bronte. Mr. Butner has been in ill health for the past three years, but he was able to carry on his business until the last few weeks. He was 58 years old, being born in Rockwall county in 1890. He came to Bronte in 1901 and has lived here ever since.

Mr. Butner had been a stock farmer, his place being about three miles

north of Bronte. He was very active in civic affairs of the community. He was secretary-treasurer of the Federal Farm Loan association for over 20 years and was a director of the First National Bank of Bronte.

He was married to Miss Edna Rawlings, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Rawlings, in December, 1912. Surviving are the widow; one daughter, Mrs. D. K. Glenn of Bronte; two grandchildren, Don and Eddie Glenn of Bronte; one sister, Mrs. Vela McQueen of Wichita Falls; one brother, Bob Butner of Bronte.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 p. m. Monday at the First Methodist church in Bronte. Services were conducted by Rev. B. H. Bahmfalk, pastor of the Bethel Methodist church of San Angelo, assisted by Rev. Alvin Mauldin, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church. Interment was in the Fairview cemetery at Bronte, under direction of Clift Funeral Home. Pallbearers were O. H. Willoughby, F. S. Higginbotham, L. T. Youngblood, Joe Rawlings, T. F. American Republic No. 1 Jess Percifull was drilling at 1,680 feet in shale. Humble No. 1 R. E. Hickman was drilling at 2,730 feet in shale. These two wells are offsets to the Hickok & Reynolds No. 1 E. C. Rawlings, opener of the Bronte field.

C. L. Norsworthy No. 1 Bob Mims was drilling at 7,295 feet in shale and sand.

Sun No. 2 Tubbs was drilling at 5,892 feet in shale and sand. Sun No. 7 Fred Jameson was drilling at 6,289 feet in lime and coring. Sun No. 1 Cummings was rigging rotary equipment preparatory to drilling.

Sun No. 1 C. C. Millican drilling at 3,190 feet in shale. Sun No. 14 H. H. Jameson drilling at 3,160 feet in shale. Sun No. 3 Brannon was drilling at 3,410 feet.

Plymouth Oil Co. Thursday filed application with the Railroad Commission to drill their No. 1 P. W. Millican. The well will be located 12 miles west of Robert Lee on section 231, block 2, H&TC survey.
