Voter registration cards should be in hands of voters

New voter registration cards for Castro County have been mailed out.

The cards, which were mailed last weekend, are good from Jan. 2 of this year until Dec. 31, 2003.

Castro County Tax Assessor/Collector Billy Hackleman said that the cards will have city precinct numbers (if applicable) and school districts, which is a fairly recent development.

"We just started listing the districts two years ago," Hackleman said.

Hackleman said that once the card is received, the voter is encouraged to check the information to see if it's correct. If changes are to be made, the changes should be made on the back and the card must then either be mailed back or brought back to the Castro County

"We can't take corrections over the phone," Hacklemaan said. "We must have signatures."

He said that one thing that needs to be watched for is 911 addresses.

"About half the county has gone to 911 addresses," Hackleman said. "We won't have all the new addresses yet, so if the address is not correct, please put the corrections on the back and



Holloway to run for 64th District Judge

Plainview attorney Paul Holloway has announced that he is Court Judge.

Holloway started practicing law in Plainview in 1994 and has worked at his current location since 1998. After graduating from law school in 1989 from Baylor University, he went to work for several Houston law

He emphasized that he has broad experience in every major area of practice falling within the subject matter jurisdiction of the District Court Judge, that is, civil trial, criminal trial and family law.

Holloway, 43, was born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He graduated from John F. Kennedy High School in 1976 and worked in

grocery store management before obtaining an Associates running for 64th Judicial District Degree from Kirkwood Community College in Cedar Rapids.

By JOHN HASSELMEIER Mike Fontenot, a member of in Castro County last week, said that something he saw after Wednesday night's presentation at the Dimmitt High School Auditorium really touched him.

"I was signing autographs and I saw this girl crying and she was holding on to three of her friends," Fontenot said. "I thought there was something

"I asked 'what's the matter?" Fontenot said. "She said 'My three friends just accepted Jesus as Lord'. She was crying tears of joy."

The John Jacobs Power Team is a Christian-based strength team and four members of the 28-member team came to Castro County, including Carey Leighow, Adam Brassfield, David Smith and Fontenot.

In addition to the presentations, the foursome also gave the program at Thursday afternoon's Dimmitt Rotary Club meeting.

Leighow, a native of Missouri, originally served as a bodyguard for Jacobs. He said that Jacobs got the idea for the

Team when he showed, after being trained by a prison guard, the John Jacobs Power Team how to break out of police "A year later, the Power prisoners, each of whom made decisions for Christ. As it turned out, Jacobs' roommate at the time could tear a telephone book in half and that's how the Power Team began.

Brassfield said that he had always wanted to be a member of the power team.

"When I was seven years old, I saw the Power Team in Garden City, Kansas," Brassfield said. "After the show, I sat on John Jacobs' lap and got a picture made.

"(Several years later), I had gotten married and just lost my job and I didn't know where I was going to turn," Brassfield said. "God said 'Take a stab at it (the Power Team). I told Todd King (a member of the Power Team) that I thought God had called me to the ministry."

As for Fontenot, he had heard about it in his hometown of China, Texas (near Beaumont) and decided to place a call.

"I got ahold of the secretaries and she asked for a resume," Fontenot said. "I asked 'why do

I need a resume to serve Jesus Christ?'

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






Brassfield said that numerous applications come the Power Team's way.

"The Power Team probably gets 1,000 resumes a month,' Brassfield said. "They're striving to get on the Team and it's just not their divine appointment. This is something set up by God, ordained by God."

Leighow said there have been times when a principal will wish them "good luck" beforehand and come back amazed at the attentiveness of the students.

"There have been several schools where we've been told 'Power Team, good luck.'," Leighow said. "They say 'We haven't been able to hold a school assembly here. The kids booed the people off the stage. They cuss at them. They throw things.

"At the end, they've come up with tears in their eyes," Leighow said. "They say 'I don't know how it happened. This has been the best school assembly we've ever had.""

As for the foursome, they're not amazed.

"What makes the difference in our school assemblies is that God is there," Leighow said. "Even though we can't say His name, he's still there."

"There has not been one assembly that we haven't prayed beforehand," Brassfield said. "We put God before everything. That's commanded by God."

During school assemblies in America, the team is not allowed to use the name of God, but they are actually encouraged to do so overseas.

"Overseas, they're hungry for the truth," Leighow said. "You can preach the gospel in schools. The first thing they ask us to do is come into their school and peach."

Leighow said the group was in a school in South Africa where a shooting had taken place.

"A television news reporter said 'We only thought things like this happened in the United States'," Leighow said. "It (the statement) shows what the United States is turning into.

"There's school shootings all over the place," Leighow said. "These kids have no hope. No one's telling them the truth. We believe the greatest mission field in the world is America's public schools."


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

The English critic and essayist, William Hazlitt (1778-1830), once said, "Prejudice is the child of ignorance." Without question prejudice has no place in a civilized society, because it leads to attitudes and actions based on conclusions that are preconceived, rather than information that is factual. Prejudice is usually associated with bigotry and hatred, but prejudice in itself is not necessarily bad. It can be good, if we are prejudiced toward the right things and in the right way. The real danger is that we often let our emotions get in the way.

Some time ago, Mr. Robert C. Howe, principal of the North Kansas City High School, was in Little Rock to address a conference of school administrators and I had the privilege of being in the audience. During his speech he shared something he called "Written With Prejudice", and I enjoyed it so much I asked him for a copy. If you have youngsters of your own, or grandchildren, I believe you will appreciate it, as well.

First, a mother is speaking: "Dear Teacher, Please find attached to this note one six year old boy, much cleaner and quieter than usual and with new hair cut and blue jeans. With him go the prayers of his mother and father. He's good at creating airplanes and chaos, very adept at tying knots and attracting stray dogs; he especially likes peanut butter, horses, the westerns, empty boxes and his shirt tail out. He is allergic to baths, bedtime, taking out trash, and coming the first time he's called. He needs to be taught and spanked, loved and

RULES AND REGULATIONS I. GENERAL

Lambs Billy Copeland

1. All entries must be sent to the Young Farmer Vo. Ag. Dept. Dimmitt High School, 1505 Western Circle Drive, by 5 p.m. on Jan. 18, 2002. Any incomplete, unsigned or late entry will be fined \$25

2. Entry fee-to be used for bedding, show explases, etc.: \$15.

All livestock must be in place by 4 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 24, 2002 and no earlier than noon Wednesday. Weighing will begin at 4:30 p.m. All entries must 4. All animals must be weighed at the time of entry by the officials. Only one

weigh back will be allowed if the animal does not make the limits set. This weigh back must be within one hour of the first weighing or at the discretion

5. All animals must receive state validation from the County Agent or Ag Teacher

6. Each exhibitor will not be allowed to enter or show more than three steers, three barrows and three lambs. An exhibitor will be allowed to sell no more than three animals and only two animals in any division. If an individual shows more than three animals, he must notify the Superintendent immediately after judging as to which three animals he will place in the sale.

The number of animals that will be sold through the auction will be as follows:125 barrows, 125 lambs, , or 75% of the total animals that are weighed in, whichever is the smaller number. Due to the decline in the number of steers and heifers, up to 15 head will sell; or 75% of the total whichever is greatest. 8. The percent of the animals to be sold will be figured on each class. If an animal eligible to sell is pulled, the next animal in line from that class will sell. This will be at the discretion of the Superintendent.

9. There will be no floor this year. 10. All livestock will be sifted by weight.

11. Two showmanship trophies will be awarded for Steer, Swine and Sheep. The senior showmanship will be for exhibitors aged 14 and over, and the junior showmanship will be for exhibitors aged 13 and onder. The animals must have been owned, fitted and groomed by the exhibitor for the exhibitor to be eligible

for a showmanship trophy 12. No steer will be allowed in the show that has not been owned as of July 1. Barrows and lambs must have been owned as of Nov. 1.

13. Only active 4-H and FFA members are eligible to show. All livestock entered in the show must have been fed under the supervision of the Castro County Agent or Vocational Agriculture Teacher of Dimmitt, Hart or Nazareth High Schools and must be so certified by one of the above on the entry card. 14. To be eligible to show, all 4-H club members must be enrolled in a Castro County 4-H club under the supervision of the Castro County Agent. All FFA members must be enrolled in a Castro County school. All exhibitors must reside in Castro County, be at least nine (9) years of age or in the third grade, and be enrolled in a public or private Elementary or Secondary school located within Castro County. Any exceptions must be approved by Dimmitt Young Farmers. 15. All animals must be reasonably dry and clean before weighing. Any animal not so, may be declared ineligible to show by the committee in charge of the

16. Animals are the responsibility of the exhibitor until they are loaded on the truck. Any animal left in the barn after trucks are loaded are the responsibility

17. The Dimmitt Young Farmers shall reserve the right to disqualify any exhibitor or animal for any reason that is deemed necessary. Also, the Young Farmers will not be responsible for any injury, loss or damage to persons or property arising from the Castro County Junior Livestock Show and Sale. 18. Exhibitors and show officials will be the only persons allowed in the show

19. Any animal sold on floor must have been entered in the show,

20. Any exhibitor found violating the rules may be subject to a fine up to \$200 and suspension from the County show for a period of one (1) year. The person signing the entry card may also be fined up to \$200. Entry cards will not be accepted from the offending organization until the fine is paid.

21. All protests must be in writing and be accompanied by a deposit of \$50 which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be delivered to the livestock show management immediately after occasion for such protest. The protest committee will consist of the Young Farmer officers and the various Division Superintendents. All committee decisions are final. The Castro County Junior Livestock Show and Sale and the Dimmitt Young Farmers are indemnified from any and all liability for all legal and other proceedings which may ensue from the committee's decision.

22. No animal may leave the stock show premises from the time of weigh-in

until after the show without the approval of the Superintendent. All take home animals must be checked out of the barns by noon on Saturday.

23. Each club will be responsible for cleaning their pen. If pens are not cleaned a fine of \$200 will be levied. Check will be held until fine is paid. All pens must be cleaned by 6 p.m. Sunday.

24. No change in the pattern of highlighting of any animal by painting or dyeing in all three barns will be allowed (water only).

No adults in show ring during show or classification.

26. Exhibitors ineligible to participate at the Castro County Junior Livestock Show due to the NO PASS AND NO PLAY rule cannot have another or others exhibit the animal or animals in question II. CLASSIFYING

Lambs will be weighed and classified at 4:30 p.m. on Thursday in the show ring. Steers will be weighed upon arrival at the show and classed by height and weight. Steer classes will be determined by the Superintendent. Hogs will be classified by owner. Any animal not classified at the proper time must wait until last to be classified. Hog weights must be turned in by 4 p.m. **Judging Schedule**

> Goats: 8 a.m., Friday Lambs: Immediately following goats Steers: Immediately following goats Friday Barrows: Following Steers Friday III. STEER DEPARTMENT

1. Only steers and heifers are eligible to show. 2. All calves in the show must weigh at least 900 pounds, however, 1,350 pounds is the top pay weight.

Reserve Grand Champion—Banner 4. If there is not enough of any one class to be placed in a separate class, they will be classed with another class.

Placings—Ribbons Grand Champion—Banner

IV. LAMB DEPARTMENT 1. Both wethers and Ewe lambs are eligible to show. 2. There will be a possibility of four breeds only, definitions of breeds are as

a. Fine Wool-This breed shall include only purebred grade Rambouillet or

Delaine or a cross between these two breeds. b. Fine Wool Cross—This class will include lambs sired by Suffolk, Hampshire,

Corriedale, or Columbia rams and out of fine wool ewes. Lambs that carry more than 50% medium wool breeding will go into the medium wool. The decision will be left to classifiers. c. Medium Wool class-This class shall include only purebred or grade Hamp-

shire, Suffolk, Corriedale, and Columbia or other medium wool cross. d. Southdowns-This class is only for purebred Southdowns or lambs that exhibit predominant Southdown characteristics.

3. Weight classes: Breed of lambs will be divided at supervisors discretion. There will not be a top weight but the maximum pay weight will be 130 lbs. 4. Lambs will be classified in show ring according to breed before weigh-in. A classifying judge will assist the Superintendent in placing the animals in the proper class. Classifier's decision will be final. 5. Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed will compete for Grand

Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show

6. Lambs wool should be uniform length no more than 1/4 inch in length. 7. Where four animals are not available to make weight classes, then lightweights and heavyweights will be grouped into a single breed class.

Placings—Ribbons Grand champion—Banner Reserve grand champion—Banner V. SWINE DEPARTMENT

1. Only barrows are eligible to show

2. Top pay weight will be 260 pounds. There is no minimum weight. 3. A weigh back may be done on any barrow at the discreation of the Dimmitt

Young Farmers. A 10 pound variance up or down will be allowed from write-in weight. Any barrow not meeting the weight will be disqualified. 4. No feeding in aisles. All feed will be dumped outside, on south side of barn.

5. It takes five head to make breed. Those not making a breed will be shown in the crosses. There will be eight breeds of barrows as follows:

a. Berkshires b. Chester Whites/Other Pure Breeds c. Durocs

d. Hampshires e. Spots

f. Poland Chinas

g. Yorkshires

h. Crosses 5. Weight Classes: Breeds of barrows will be divided by weight at the discretion

of the Superintendent. 6. At judges discretion, any obvious violation of classification will result in

disqualification of animal in question.

7. First and second place barrows from each class will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion of the breed.

8. Champion and Reserve Champion of each breed will compete for Grand

Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show. 9. Where five animals are not available to make weight classes, then light-

weights and heavyweights will be grouped into a single breed class.

10. Barrows will be sold at weigh-in weights.

1. Exhibitors selling livestock must have their animals ready to be brought into the auction ring when their number is called. 2. Sale order:

A. Grand Champion Steers, Barrows, Lambs B. Reserve Champion Steers, Barrows, Lambs

C. All breed champions

D. All reserve breed champions

F. 1/3 Barrows

3. All animals that are to be sold as take homes must be listed on the sale sheet prior to the sale.


