Chairman Rippetoe expressed his appreciation to the workers throughout the county who gave their time and money to the drive. He was pleased with the improvement over last year's showing when Coke county gave only about \$122 to the March of Dimes campaign.

COUNTY VALUATION UP \$2,300,000 OVER LAST YEAR

Nine million dollars has been estimated as the Coke county tax valuation for 1949 as compared with \$6,700,000 for last year. The estimate was made Tuesday when Harry Pickett, of the Thomas Y. Pickett valuation engineers firm, met with County Judge Jeff Dean, County Clerk Willis Smith and Sheriff Paul Good Tuesday in Robert Lee.

In a Monday meeting the county commissioners court approved bills and selected the First National Bank in Bronte as the depository for the county and common school districts for the following year. The bid from the Bronte bank was the only bid submitted.

DEADLINE NEARING TO FILE CANDIDATES FOR CITY POSITIONS

According to Mayor H. O. Whitt, the deadline is nearing for placing names on the ticket for city offices. The city election will be held on April 5, and Whitt said that anyone desiring to place his own or someone else's name on the ticket must do so at least 30 days prior to the election.

The terms of Commissioners Cecil Kemp and W. W. Milliken expire this year. The term of another commissioner, D. K. Glenn, does not expire but must be filled for a term of one year due to the fact that he has moved outside the city limits. The terms of Commissioners C. E. Bruton, J. M. Rippetoe and Mayor Whitt carry over for another year.

Whitt said that formerly a petition carrying five per cent of the voters was required to place a name on the ticket but that now, the petition is not necessary and anyone who wants to run can have his name placed on the ticket by announcing his candidacy to the mayor 30 days prior to the election.

Red And White Super Market To Open This Weekend

I. M. Cumbie, owner of the Cumbie & Co. Red and White Store here, has announced that he will have the formal opening of his newly remodeled store this weekend.

One of the features of the opening will be a drawing, free to everyone, in which the store will give away five \$10 baskets of groceries. These drawings will be held Saturday at 10 and 11 o'clock in the morning and at 2, 4 and 6 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Cumbie said that anyone who wishes may participate in the drawings by registering at his store and being present for the drawings and stressed the fact it is not necessary to buy anything to be eligible to register.

Remodeling the store began about two weeks ago and the entire front has been remodeled. New display counters have been installed inside and the meat counters moved to provide more effective display of meats as well as to add more floor space to the store.

A much larger stock of groceries has been placed in the store and an advertisement elsewhere in this issue features some of the opening specials.

Another feature of the newly remodeled store will be a frozen food container, carrying a complete stock of frozen foods.

No. 1 Warren Recovers 600 Ft. Oil, 300 Ft. Water

On a drillstem test run Wednesday afternoon Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 1 Dr. R. J. Warren recovered 600 feet of oil plus 300 feet of salt water. The well was tested from 4,428-4,460 feet in the Palo Pinto lime section. The tool was open 58 minutes, gas came to the surface in 22 minutes and no gauge or estimate was made.

A Schlumberger survey was being run Thursday on the well after it had been deepened to 4,535 feet. Plans call for setting of seven-inch pipe on the bottom. It was reported that a section of shale was entered after drilling below the tested section, then lime was entered again.

Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld have applied for two more permits to drill offsets to their No. 1 Warren, but in view of test made on it Wednesday, no definite plans had been made for starting the wells. Applications were made for their No. 1 R. E. Hickman, located a quarter mile south of No. 1 Warren and 660 feet from the north and west lines of a 47.6-acre tract in the northwest corner of W. W. McCutcheon survey No. 6.

The other application made by Hickok & Reynolds was for their No.

2 Dr. R. J. Warren et al, located across the Robert Lee highway, 1,202.78 feet north of No. 1 Warren, and 660 feet from the south line and 512 feet from the west line of section 451, block 1-A, H&TC survey. It is an east offset to Placid No. 1 Robert Foreman.

Yarborough et al No. 1 Addie Fletcher was reported to be drilling below 2,000 feet and planning to set 10-inch casing at 2,500 feet about Saturday.

Placid No. 1 Robert Foreman was drilling at 3,341 feet in lime and shale.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 Ash was waiting on cement to set after setting surface casing at 1,025 feet.

Union No. 1 Jack Frost, four miles west and slightly south of Blackwell, recovered 45 feet of mud and a slight trace of oil and gas on a drillstem test Wednesday. A test earlier in the week showed more indications of production than the one taken Wednesday, which was made at 6,606 to 6,641 feet in the Ellenburger lime.

Application was made to drill on the Bronte townsite by C. Andrade III, No. 1 Mrs. Kate E. Cox, 32 feet from the south line and 56 feet from the east line of lot 8, block 56. The test is to be with rotary equipment to 5,000 feet.

Another application was made by Howard P. Bunch No. 1 fee, 25 feet from the north line and 70 feet from the east line of lot 2, block 20, Bronte townsite, 4,500 feet with rotary equipment.

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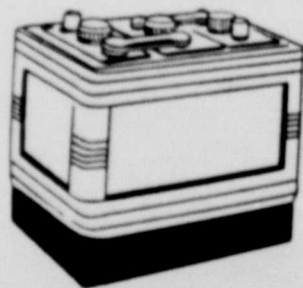

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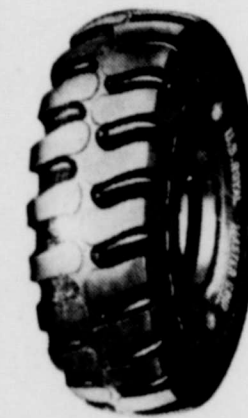

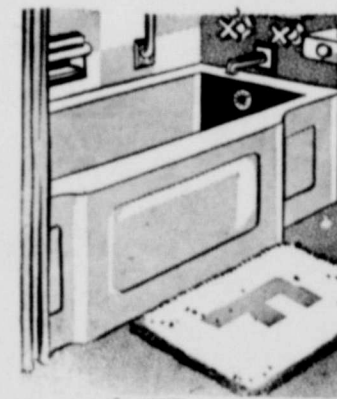
