Red Cross Needs Help

A great deal of help is needed in the Coke County Red Cross drive, according to H. A. Springer, county chapter chairman, and Ben Oglesby, 1949 fund chairman. The drive is lagging, Springer said, for the lack of volunteer workers to solicit donations.

Springer urged that anyone who will help with the drive either to contact him at the West Texas Utilities office or Oglesby at the Bronte Enterprise office.

Coke County's 1949 goal is set at \$708, which is a small part of the \$60,000,000 goal set for the entire nation. More than half of Coke County's quota will be retained in the county for local use and the remainder will be sent to the national Red Cross.

R. R. Commission Decision Unknown

Humble Oil & Refining Co.'s request for field rules in the Bronte Field has not been heard from since the hearing ended last Friday in Austin. The members of the commission have apparently made no decision on the matter.

In the hearing, Humble was accused of seeking rules that would force small land owners to enter unitization agreements. The company asked that production be based 100 per cent on acreage and that the production unit be set at 40 acres.

Attorneys for Bronte citizens and small operators asked that a production formula be adopted which would be based 50 per cent on acreage and 50 per cent on the well. This plan would permit enough production to allow small land owners and lessors to obtain some benefits from the oil under their land, the independents argued.

Field rules discussed at the hearing apply only to the Palo Pinto formation, and S. M. Bunnell, Humble geologist, said that he doubted the Palo Pinto production extending into the Bronte township. Most of the afternoon session was taken up with technical testimony by Humble's engineer, Burton Atkinson, and Bunnell.

The hearing Friday found the Railroad Commission with at least three proposals for proration, production, and spacing.

Discovery of oil at a lower depth Wednesday in the Placid No. 1 Robert Forman may cause the whole hearing procedure to be repeated on rules for the lower pay.

BRONTE'S NEW FIRE TRUCK IS READY

C. E. Bruton, city councilman, said yesterday that the new fire truck which was recently purchased will be ready for delivery and use next week. The truck is a new GMC and was purchased from Morgan Pontiac company of Ballinger. Malcom Morgan, of that firm, gave the City of Bronte a substantial discount on the purchase price in order for the city to purchase the truck.

A San Antonio firm furnished the fire fighting equipment. Bruton said that the City Council wants to thank all the citizens of Bronte for their patience concerning the delivery of the truck, and that the city fathers have done everything possible to get delivery at an early date without sacrificing the quality of the materials and work that were used in equipping the truck.

Placid Forman Produces Oil from 4,975-94 Feet

Placid No. 1 Robert Forman discovered production Wednesday in an unidentified sand at a lower depth than the other portion of the Bronte Field. Placid's log showed a white quartz sand with a show of oil from 4,982 to 4,994 feet.

On a drillstem test which was run from 4,975 to 4,994 feet, gas came to

the surface in 10 minutes and at the rate of 46,000 cubic feet per day. The tool was open for 105 minutes. Recovery was 1,090 feet of high gravity, green pipeline oil from a sand in the Pennsylvanian at the base of the Canyon lime.

There was 20 feet of gas cut drilling mud in the bottom and no water.

Senator Hardeman Warns Bronte and Robert Lee to Ask For Plenty of Water

Senator Dorsey Hardeman last week in exclusive statement to The Enterprise warned citizens of Bronte and Robert Lee when they have the opportunity, to ask for plenty of water. The Senator from this district said that regardless of who builds the dam on Oak Creek that the two Coke County towns are very likely to need an abundant water supply.

"I believe that if these two towns are to keep pace with the growth

they are going to have the opportunity to enjoy, they should make arrangements for a water supply that will care for towns of a size which exceeds their wildest dreams," the Senator from San Angelo said.

He went on to say that he believes Coke County is headed for an unprecedented period of prosperity and growth, and pointed out the extreme importance of plenty of water. He said that the proposed dam on Oak Creek seems to be the most likely spot for securing water.

"It is poor management and invites ill feeling and litigation for the water supply of one city on one watershed to be controlled by another city on a different watershed. Whether the City of Sweetwater or the Upper Colorado River Authority builds the dam, Bronte and Robert Lee should exercise caution not to ask for too little, too late when applying for their future municipal and industrial water needs.

"If the citizens of Coke County permit the administration of the waters of Oak Creek to fall into the hands of a city on a different watershed, the citizens of Coke County will have then and there given away their birthright. Coke Countians must decide now and for all time whether they wish to be the landlord of the Oak Creek reservoir or the tenant," Hardeman concluded.

A demonstration of the new Farm-all C will be conducted by the Ballinger Truck and Tractor Co. on the Otis Smith farm, north of Bronte, Thursday, March 17.

Raymond Berryhill, manager of the Ballinger firm, said this week that they will show the new tractor doing various jobs which are necessary to successful farming in this section. He invites all farmers and others who are interested to be on hand next Thursday for the demonstration.

HAYRICK HD CLUB TO SPONSOR SINGING AT SCHOOLHOUSE TONIGHT

The Hayrick HD Club voted to sponsor a community singing at the Hayrick school tonight, Friday, March 11, at their regular meeting last Thursday, March 3, in the home of Mrs. Aubrey Denman.

Miss Veremema Freeman, county home demonstration agent, met with the club and gave a demonstration of "Taking Hens." Cake and punch were served to five members, Mmes. W. G. Cresap, E. B. Fletcher, J. The test was through a 3/4 inch choke. Bottomhole pressure built up to 1,900 pounds in 20 minutes and flowing pressure was 300 pounds.

Meanwhile Humble No. 1 Nannie Ash apparently has extended the Bronte (Palo Pinto) Field a half mile to the south. Thursday morning Humble was coring ahead at 4,442 feet. Two drillstem tests earlier showed production. A test Monday from 4,330 to 4,360 feet brought gas to the surface in 12 minutes. The tool was open for 1 1/2 hours and recovery was 2,790 feet of oil and no water. Test was through a 3/4 inch choke.

Another test Tuesday from 4,360 to 4,379 feet through a 3/4 inch choke recovered 480 feet of oil and 30 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud. Testing was to be resumed at a lower depth Thursday.

Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld have staked another location, a south offset to their No. 1 E. C. Rawlings. The well will be the No. 2 Rawlings. George Callahan has the drilling contract.

No word was available on Yarborough & Son No. 1 Addie Fletcher, but some reports said that testing on that wildcat would occur most any time.

SILVER GIRL IS SELECTED AS COKE "GOLD STAR GIRL"

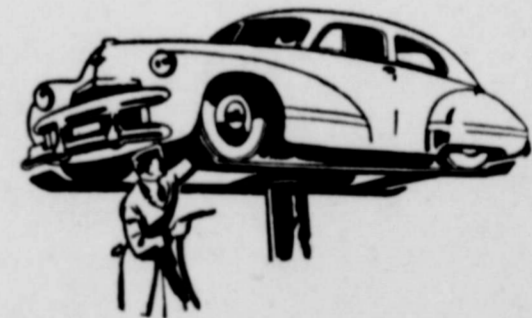

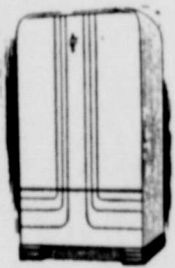

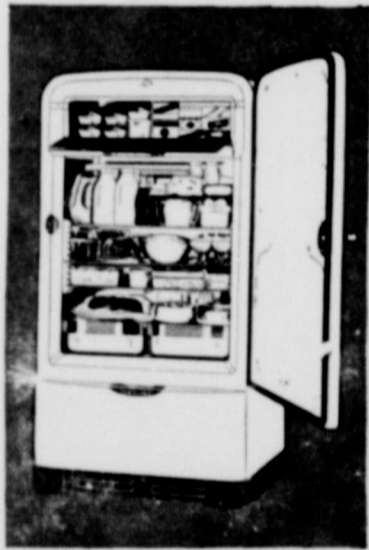
The next meeting will be March 19. Lesson for that meeting will be the 3rd chapter of Acts.
