Come to the Lions Big Auction Sale

Two New Locations in Bronte Field This Week

Two new locations have been made in the Bronte Field the past week. One of them is Hickok & Reynolds, Inc., and Dan Auld No. 3 E. C. Rawlings. It is located 660 feet from the south and 738 feet from the west lines of the northwest quarter section 453-1-A-H&TC. It is a west offset to No. 2 Rawlings. This well will be completed with cable tools after casing was set on the bottom at 4,389 feet.

George Callihan, Abilene contractor, had the contract on No. 2 Rawlings and will also drill No. 3.

The other location made this week was Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 Lowery Estate. In a telegram from the Houston office of the Humble Co., a copy of which was sent to Mrs. Charlie Keeney, administrator of the Lowery Estate the following was stated:

"Satisfactory to make location for

Olive Mae Keeney, et al, 4,500 foot budgeted Bronte Field well, Coke County, Texas. Lease No. 76407 to be located 660 feet from the north and west lines of southeast quarter Section 453, Block 1-A-H&TC Survey." It was reported that the McQueen-Clevenger rig which is now working on the No. 2 Ash will drill the Lowery Estate well.

It was expected that the Humble No. 2 Nannie Ash would be completed Thursday after setting casing a few days ago. No figures were available at press time on how much the well was making.

Southern Minerals and Seaboard No. 1 Albert N. Rawlings, wildcat 5 1/2 miles southwest of No. 2 Ash, was drilling at 1,065 feet in shale.

Last report was that the prospective well to test the townsite of Bronte has been delayed by failure to get the required dry hole money subscribed. Most of those who are familiar with the oil business said that they thought the money would be forthcoming in the near future and that the well will be drilled on the site behind the Bronte Tractor Co.

Placid No. 1 Robert Forman apparently was broken down Wednesday afternoon. A report by those who were at the site said that workers were having machinery trouble. The Forman well was re-cemented early in the week.

J. K. Wadley No. 1 Sam Gray was drilling below 4,130 feet. A drill-stem test early in the week at a shallow pay showing yielded no oil.

Plans were being made Wednesday to move the cable tool rig off of Hickok & Reynolds, Inc., and Dan Auld No. 1 Warren and to move a rotary rig over the hole for deepening. Casing was cemented early this week down to the Palo Pinto section where salt water was encountered. Wilbanks Drilling Co. of Big Spring has the contract to drill the Warren well deeper.

Trucks to Pick Up Trash Over City; People Asked to Put It in Containers

City officials announced Wednesday that a truck will start picking up trash over the city Monday or Tuesday of next week. Any and all kinds of trash will be picked up and hauled off by the trucks provided that it is in barrels, boxes or some container so that it can be easily handled.

City officials requested further that everyone have the trash at an accessible place where the workers can get to it without climbing over fences or other obstacles. It is pre-

ferred that the containers be placed in the alleys behind houses, except in those cases where the alley is blocked by something.

Anyone who has not had his trash collected by Friday of next week is requested to call the new street and alley commissioner, J. M. Rippetoe, who will see that the truck calls at every one's place.

Rippetoe said that residents of the city can help a great deal in the move to get the trash collected by cooperating in the placing the trash in containers and by having it at a place where it can be easily picked up. He urges the cooperation of all the people in order to rid the town of unsightly collections of tin cans and other refuse.

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
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A formidable deterrent to war took shape last week when the representatives from 12 countries met in Washington and signed the historic Atlantic Security Pact.

The nations included are: the United States, Canada, Great Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Denmark, Norway, Iceland, Italy and Portugal.

To make the agreement effective, the United States Senate must ratify it, as must the parliaments of other signatories.

The importance of this move cannot be overestimated. It is a bold effort to promote the cause of world peace and to counteract the power and program of Russia and her Communist allies.

This collective action was forced upon the western powers by the Soviets who, by the abuse of the veto power (they have cast 30) in the United Nations, have thrown road blocks in the way of efforts to use the U. N. as a means of settling international disputes.

Groping for an alternative to which the western powers could rally their united efforts for security and peace, the Atlantic Pact turned out to be the answer. For it provides a possible means of concerted action which cannot be subjected to an arbitrary veto by the Soviet Union.

Briefly, the pact provides that an armed attack on any one or more of its members shall be considered an attack against all, and the promise to assist the victim of attack with such action, including armed force, as is deemed necessary to restore and maintain the security of all.

The life of the pact is 20 years, subject to review and renewal after 10 years.

As evidence of the importance of this action from the American standpoint, witness the views of three observers:

John Foster Dulles called it "the most important international decision since the Monroe Doctrine."

Roscoe Drummond, one of America's most respected political analysts, said that joining the Security Pact "will be the most meaningful decision the United States has taken in foreign policy."

Constantine Brown, another distinguished authority, described it as "the most sensational . . . ever presented to the United States Senate." He pointed out that it will put us directly into an alliance with a number of European countries and requires, within the provisions of our constitution, that we join them in resisting any armed aggression.

The real purpose behind it all is, of course, to provide a formidable deterrent to war. It is a warning to any potential aggressor that it is unsafe to start a war.

As was expected, the pact has been bitterly denounced by the Kremlin, and that attack was echoed in the United States by Henry Wallace, leader of the Commagressive Party. The latter spoke over a national hook-up, demanding that we appease Russia and do nothing that might hurt her feelings.

Of course, Wallace has never raised his voice in criticism of the agreement of the Soviet Union and her six satellites of Iron Curtain Europe, when those countries met in Silesia in October of 1947, and agreed to act in unison thereafter, and named the Marshall Plan nations as their target.

Just the signing of an agreement, of course, will not do the job. It will take more than that. The United States will be called upon to provide military equipment to the other nations. There is a limit to our ability to do that. But observers are saying that surplus materials left over from the war, with some added, will be a lot of help in the hands of our allies.

In any event, Uncle Sam, if the Senate ratifies, will have taken another firm stand for world peace, and this will put the Kremlin on notice that if she attempts to knock off western nations, one at a time, that kind of monkey-business will mean war.

4,000 CRIPPLED CHILDREN AIDED BY STATE IN '48

Almost 4,000 Texas children from more than 225 counties have received beneficial services and aid to happy, normal living under the Crippled Children's Division administered by the State Health Department, during the calendar year 1948. This information is shown by the annual report issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

According to Dr. Cox, the most commonly treated conditions are late effects of acute poliomyelitis, cerebral palsy, osteomyelitis, tuberculosis of joints, cleft palate, harelip, and club-foot. Although the services are provided for children from birth to 21 years, the largest group treated were from the age bracket of 5 to 14 years.

The help given these crippled children represents 3,747 clinic visits, 43,433 days of hospital care, 2,897 days of convalescent home care, and 4,986 doctor's visits.

"As long as sufficient state funds are available, any crippled Texas child of normal mentality, under twenty-one years of age, whose parents or guardians are unable to pay for proper care, is entitled to the help of the Crippled Children's Division," Dr. Cox said, "if his doctor believes that it is reasonable to expect the child can be improved through hospitalization, medical or surgical care, artificial appliances, or through a combination of these services."

Parents of crippled children should make application for this assistance by completing application forms, which should be signed by the physician and approved by the County Judge. The application is then mailed to the Crippled Children's Division, Texas State Department of Health, Austin, Texas.

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
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BROOKSHIRE BROWSINGS

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
