## Business Census to Begin Monday

A representative of the Department of Commerce, W. L. Roy Wellborne, was in Bronte, Monday, and announced that his department is now busy taking a business census over the entire United States. Wellborne said that Howard T. Sheffey will be the enumerator of businesses here in Bronte here in Bronte and will begin taking the census Monday.

Wellborne pointed out that the census is required by law and urged that every business man in Bronte cooperate with the enumerator when he comes around for the needed information. He said further that the information is highly confidential and that the figures obtained from any individual business will never be released to anyone.

The object of the census is to get an over-all picture of the business situation in this section and of the entire country.

"These statistics will be useful in establishing potential markets, determining whether certain business fields are overcrowded, seeking investment possibilities, measuring merchandise outlets, setting up sales quotas and in deciding any number of other questions essential to better business practices," Wellborne pointed out.

Every business establishment in Bronte will be called on in the next few days and the enumerators hope to get a complete picture of the situation here in a few days.

## COKE WOOL JUDGING TEAM WINS FIRST IN CONTESTS

The Coke county wool and mohair judging team won first place in the elimination contests held Saturday in San Angelo and, with Menard, Crockett and Glasscock counties, will represent Districts 6 and 7 in the state contests at A&M college on June 13.

Sixteen teams were entered in the contests attended by 64 boys and county agents. The Coke team, composed of Wayne, J. B. and Le Drew Arrott, Allen Cobb and Bobby Gene Hood, piled up 1,358 points for first place. Menard won second place with 1,346 points; third was Crockett with 1,283; fourth was Taylor with 1,249 and Glasscock, fifth with 1,206. Taylor is not eligible for the state contests because two other teams of District 7 finished ahead of them.

Le Drew Arrott of the Coke team was second high individual scorer in the meet, passed only by Jackie Richards of the Taylor county team.

The teams judged 20 fleeces of wool and 20 fleeces of mohair and another class of four fleeces each.

## Three Die in Auto Wreck At Juniper Creek Bridge

Three persons lost their lives as the result of an automobile accident at the Juniper Creek bridge about eight miles south of Bronte. Miss Marjorie Anderson, 24, and Travis Dickey, 24, were killed outright and Robert Rice, 22, died in the local hospital Wednesday afternoon at 5:30 as a result of injuries. The accident occurred about 9:45 Monday night.

The three were riding in a 1940 Ford coach and traveling north toward Bronte when the car went off the left side of the road near the bridge. Missing the bridge completely, the automobile landed on the south side of the creek bank and leaped some 40 feet across the creek to the north bank and turned over several times. Officers said that after

inspecting the marks on the pavement, they believe that the right rear tire blew out, causing the driver to lose control.

Dickey was found dead in the automobile while Miss Anderson was pinned underneath the vehicle. A wrecking crew worked for more than an hour before her body was removed from under the machine. Rice was thrown clear of the wreckage.

The bodies of the three victims were all taken to the Clift Funeral Home here and were later moved to Patterson Funeral Home in Sweetwater.

Funeral services for Dickey were conducted Wednesday afternoon at the Highland Heights Methodist church in Sweetwater. Arrangements for young Rice were not complete Thursday morning. The body of Miss Anderson was shipped to her home in Green Bay, Wisconsin.

Among others, Rice was survived by a cousin, Mrs. Sam Spruell of Bronte.

## Mayor Proclaims May 28 as Poppy Day

Saturday, May 28, was set aside as Poppy Day in Bronte in a proclamation issued today by Mayor H. O. Whitt. The proclamation urged all citizens to observe the day by wearing memorial poppies in honor of those who gave their lives in the two World Wars. It stated:

"Now, therefore, I, H. O. Whitt, Mayor of the City of Bronte, do hereby proclaim Saturday, May 28, to be Poppy Day in the City of Bronte, and urge that all citizens observe the day by wearing the memorial poppy of the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary.

### TELEGRAM TELLS OF RED CROSS WORK IN RECENT DISASTERS

A telegram received Tuesday by H. A. Springer, chairman of the Coke county Red Cross chapter, from John C. Wilson at the American Red Cross headquarters in St. Louis, told of the Red Cross work in the recent tornado disaster at Amarillo.

The telegram stated that preliminary allocation of \$50,000 and help of eight full time disaster workers had been announced. The workers included doctors and nurses. Temporary headquarters were set up near the stricken area. Fifty pints of blood had been flown into Amarillo from the Red Cross blood center in Wichita Kansas and the Amarillo Red Cross canteen set up to feed rescue workers.

The telegram also instructed local workers to "accept contributions from those who wish to help the tornado victims. Individual groups and organizations wishing to make contributions are urged to send them to the local chapters where they will be dispatched to Amarillo and earmarked for relief and rehabilitation of homeless and injured."

Latest reports from the tornado-stricken area report six dead, 79 injured with 63 in hospitals. Seventy-five homes were destroyed and 350 homes damaged in a 12-block area in south Amarillo.

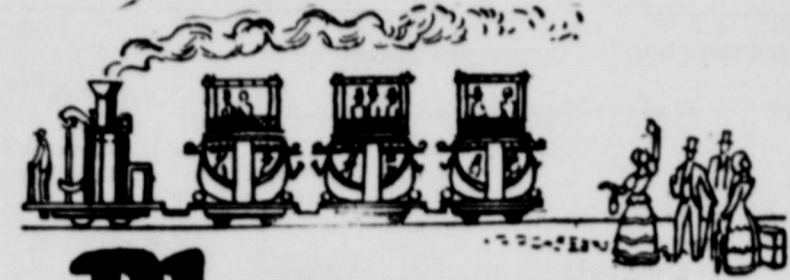

**PROGRAM ON CANCER IS WELL ATTENDED**

About 100 persons were present Tuesday night to see the films which were shown on cancer control and to hear the speech of E. E. Armistead, chairman of the Tom Green county cancer control chapter.

Mr. Armistead told his audience that "cancer is not contagious nor hereditary and is curable by radium, x-ray or surgical treatment. Ninety-five per cent of skin cancers are curable and the main thing is to get to the doctor in time." He also stated that sixty per cent of all cancer contributions will stay in the county for home use.

Mrs. H. A. Springer, program chairman, expressed her appreciation to all who helped with the program and to the school for the use of the building.

Miss Vernemna Freeman, county home demonstration agent, operated the projector and the county 4-H club girls ushered and distributed literature to the audience.

The films were secured from the Cancer chapter in Houston.

**LAND OWNERS URGED TO GIVE GRASS A CHANCE**

Land owners should give their range grasses a fighting chance to come back after three years of drought, W. E. Burns, district supervisor of the Coke County Soil Conservation District, said. The best way to improve range grasses is to give them a chance to grow and increase in plant vigor and mature a seed crop. If the better range grasses such as Side oats grama, Blue grama, Little Bluestem, Buffalo, Canada Wild rye and Texas Speargrass are to make such improvement the land owner will need to use good range management, Burns said.

The best range management that any land owner can practice is deferred grazing. The grass and weeds that accumulate will aid in increasing the water intake during rains, reduce excessive temperature fluctuations, and control soil erosion, Burns continued.

Several district cooperators are trying to aid some of the better native and introduced grasses in becoming established by planting grasses this spring.

R. B. Allen, W. C. Shamblin, C. N. Webb, Guy Denman, Bruce Clift, W. E. Burns, and M. B. Wardlow, H. C. Grafa, Edward Cumbie are some of the district cooperators that have received district assistance with planting grass seed.

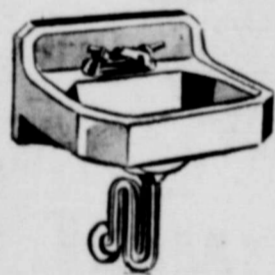
