Oil News Centers on Wildcats to the North

Main oil news on this side of the county this week was concerning the locations north of Bronte. Humble No. 2 Sallie Odom was preparing to test the top of the Ellenburger, at the last available report. They were running pipe to 5,812 feet. The wildcat has reached a total depth of 6,374 feet in granite. If the Ellenburger fails, operator plans to plug back to the Strawn where good shows were

encountered. No. 1 Odom is producing from the Strawn section.

Barnsdall No. 1 Harris Davenport, 1 1/2 miles north of Fort Chadbourne, was swabbing after perforating 5 1/2 inch casing with 180 shots at 5,512 to 5,530 feet. This wildcat found good shows at several depths on the way down, also.

Humble No. 2 Lowery Estate was drilling Thursday morning at 3,940 feet in lime and shale. A spokesman said that testing was not likely before Monday.

Rice No. 1 Stephenson was drilling below 5,350 feet after encountering water on a drillstem test at 5,300 feet. Operator plans to go to the Ellenburger and test that section. This wildcat is located south of Bronte, across the Colorado River.

In western Coke, Sun staked their No. 9 J. B. Walker. Sun No. 9 Brannan has cemented 7 inch casing on bottom at 5,983 feet.

The convention began Thursday night of last week and ended Saturday at noon. A program with such speakers as Attorney General Price Daniel and Speaker of the House Durwood Manford was enjoyed by more than 125 newspaper people from over West Texas.

DEMONSTRATORS FOR LANDSCAPING NAMED

One woman from each home demonstration club in the county has been named as a landscape demonstrator for the next year and will work with the county home demonstration agent, Miss Vernemna Freeman, to set up demonstration landscaping. The women who have been selected for next year include: Mrs. Allen Jameson, Silver; Mrs. J. W. Labenske, Hayrick; Mrs. Edna Butler, Bronte; Mrs. O. B. Jacobs, Robert Lee; Mrs. L. E. Smith, Bronte; Mrs. T. M. Wylie, Jr., Robert Lee; Mrs. Lam Lasswell, Ft. Chadbourne; Mrs. Taylor Emerson, Bronte and Mrs. Zack Toungat, Tenyson.

Miss Freeman has devoted the first two weeks of August to visiting the landscape demonstrators. The demonstrators receive special instructions, follow extension recommendations in developing demonstrations of farming, ranching and homemaking to meet the needs of their families. In turn, they pass the information on to their neighbors. Since each member of the clubs cannot carry out all the principles of landscaping, the demonstrators from each club were selected.

In her visits during August, Miss Freeman helped the demonstrators plan the landscaping of their home and surrounding grounds on graph paper. These plans will be used later to locate trees, shrubs, gardens, bulb beds, service features, water conservation means and other things about the home grounds. They will also be used in teaching the club members how to draw plans of their own home grounds.

Consolidation Election Set for Tuesday, Aug. 23

An election will be held Tuesday, August 23, in the City Hall at Bronte to invite Maverick Common School District No. 7 to consolidate with the Bronte Independent County Line School of Coke and Runnels Counties. At the same time an election will be

held at Maverick to decide whether or not Maverick wishes to come to the Bronte School.

Voters will cast their votes in Bronte at the City Hall, and in Maverick at the school building. This election was made possible by

a ruling of the attorney-general of Texas that an election must be called when a petition had been presented to county officials. This ruling overruled the consolidation of Maverick with Norton which was done by Runnels County officials.

Some facts which will be of interest to voters have been assembled for Enterprise readers as follows:

The 1948 evaluation of the Maverick School District was \$193,850, while the bonded indebtedness was \$4,000 at 5 per cent interest, retiring in 1965 with payments of \$250 annually, plus interest.

The evaluation of the Bronte District at the same time was \$1,732,525, which included besides Bronte, Oak Creek and Brookshire, which consolidated with Bronte April 2, 1949. Bronte's bonded indebtedness was \$18,300, with enough in the sinking fund to retire approximately \$3,000, which is planned in the near future. This leaves about \$16,000 indebtedness, plus \$3,531 of Oak Creek indebtedness, which was assumed from Norton by Oak Creek.

Bronte's tax rate is \$1.00 per \$100 evaluation, while Norton has a rate of \$1.50. Norton has an evaluation of \$354,831 and a bonded indebtedness of \$20,000, according to the Election Order.

Bronte Schools to Start September 5

Supt. J. L. Carroll of the Bronte Schools announced this week that school will begin September 5. Supt. Carroll said that local schools will have 15 teachers this year and that new courses in Band and Safety Education will be added to the curriculum.

Juniors and Seniors will register September 2. This is necessary in order to arrange schedules for the upper classesmen, Carroll said.

On August 22 Coach Price wishes to have a meeting of all boys who want to play football during the coming season.

September 8, music aptitude tests will be given for those who wish to be in the band. Supt. Carroll said that a music company representative will be present that day to make rental and sales offers on musical instruments.

EIGHT MEN NAMED SCS COOPERATORS

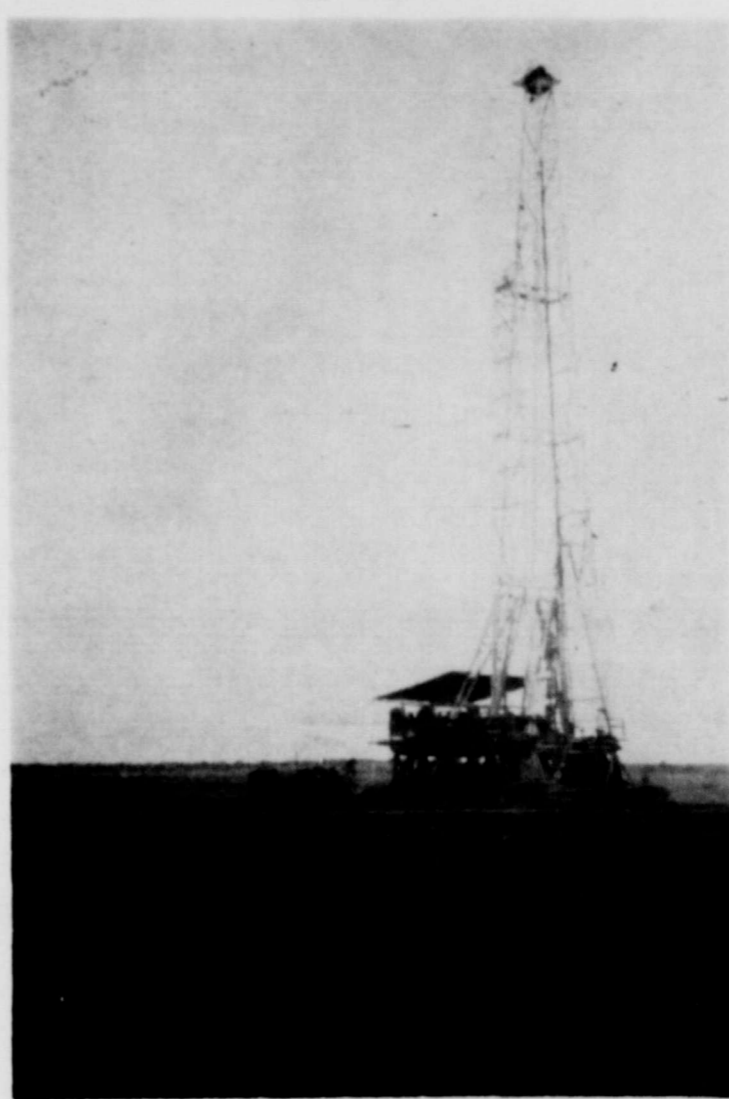
C. M. Anderson, Lee Parks, Royce Fancher, Preston Davis, James W. Allen, H. T. Parker, Henry Alsup, H. R. Holcomb became district cooperators with the Coke County Soil Conservation District when the Board of Supervisors approved their plans at a meeting Tuesday, August 9. The Supervisors checked plans to see if they were in keeping with their Program and Plan of Work. These land owners can receive assistance in applying these plans on the land. R. B. Allen, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, said.

Completing their complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan last week were J. N. Coalson, J. N. Walker, H. M. Robinson and J. A. Steppenson. These plans include controlling outside water, building terraces, range improvement, seeding of cover crops, and protection of crop residue. Personnel of the SCS Service assisted the landowners with the development of their plans.

J. N. Coalson believes level broad base terraces are necessary in any complete coordinated program. "This field was terraced 20 years ago, and I believe that the land is in better shape now than it was when the field was terraced. Our conservation work should be a complete plan and not just a one practice plan. A combination of returning the stubble to the soil, seeding of cover crop is just as important as terraces and contour farming," Coalson said.

Moving a rig of this kind without tearing it down is comparatively new in the drilling business, according to C. E. Earnest, tool pusher for the company. It saves lots of time and the cost is about the same as the old method of tearing the rig down and rebuilding at each new location, Earnest says. PTA Summer Roundup for Pre-School Children to Be at Hospital Aug. 23-24

Officials of the Bronte Parent-Teachers Association announced Wednesday that the Summer Roundup of Pre-School Children will be held in Bronte August 23 and 24 at the Karen-Gay Hospital.

Purpose of this free service to school beginners is to bring about correction of physical deficiencies and to immunize the child against communicable diseases. It also provides the parents with valuable information in child health. All of this leads up to the end of having school children in better physical condition so that they may get more out of their training in school.

The Bronte PTA will furnish materials used in the Roundup, and Dr. John R. Harris will donate his time in checking the health of the children. It is expected that there will be about 40 beginners in the Bronte

schools this year, and PTA spokesmen said that they hope to have every one of the children present either August 23 or 24. The session in the 23rd will be from 3 to 5 p.m. and on the 24th from 9 to 12 p.m.

Mrs. D. K. Glenn, chairman of the PTA committee on this project, said that she wishes to urge all parents of beginning school children to take advantage of this opportunity to check up on their health - FREE.

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produce which is ultimately shipped in interstate commerce.

Agriculture workers are exempted, and the House bill will go a long way - if finally enacted - toward clarifying the law and limiting coverage to businesses and services that are actually engaged in or very closely connected with interstate commerce.

The Senate Agriculture Committee approved a provision which will include mohair in the farm program, beginning next year. The House has already included mohair in its version of the new farm bill. Until a final bill is passed and the Secretary of Agriculture begins a program there will be no way of knowing at what price mohair will be supported. It could be anywhere between 40 and 60 cents, average.

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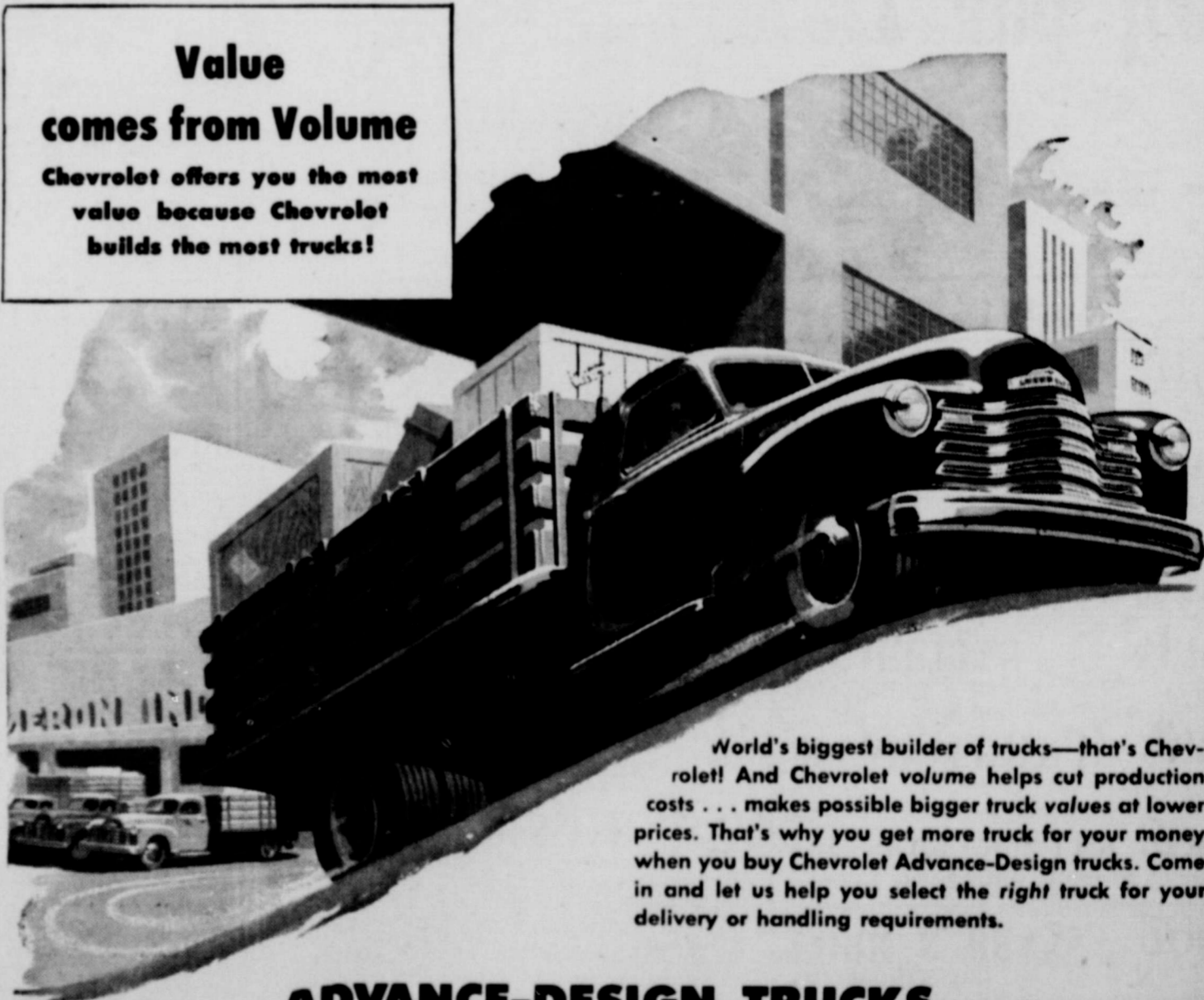
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
