Tax Election Not To Change Rate in Bronte, Oak Creek

An election to set the tax rate for the new Bronte independent county line school district has been called tion proposes to set the tax rate of \$1.00 on state and county valuations. A bond assumption election will also be voted on.

The election is made necessary because Bronte is now a new school district and the tax rate must be the same over the new district. Supt. J. L. Carroll explained that the tax rate in the Oak Creek and Bronte territory will not be raised as the tax rate has been \$1.00 for some time. If passed, the election will raise the tax rate in the Brookshire district from 75 cents to \$1.00 and in the Mays district from 50 cents to \$1.00.

The election will be held in the city hall with Mrs. Noel Percifull, Mrs. Will Thomason and Mrs. C. L. Brown of Brookshire in charge of the voting.

Carroll also explained that the sinking fund rate is 30 cents which is included in the \$1.00 rate. He said that the bonded indebtedness of the district is \$21,000 with approximately \$3,000 in the sinking fund now. This will lower the bonded indebtedness to around \$19,000.

Supt. Carroll said he wishes to emphasize that this new tax rate will not raise taxes for Bronte people and that it is necessary to have the tax rate set in order for the schools to draw any state aid. He urges everyone to vote on the proposal.


