### RIPPETOE TO HELP FARMERS, RANCHERS DOCTOR LIVESTOCK

J. M. Rippetoe announced this week that he has turned over the prescription department of the Bronte Pharmacy to Elmer Hurley and that he will devote as much of his time as necessary to assisting farmers and ranchmen in doctoring their livestock.

### GI FORMS MAY BE SECURED FROM MAYOR OR AT POST OFFICE

Application forms for the National Service Insurance special dividend to be paid to veterans who carried their GI insurance for three months or more prior to January 1, 1948 may be secured at the local post office or from Mayor H. O. Whitt.

Whitt told the Enterprise Tuesday that he had the forms and would be glad to help veterans fill them out. He urged that anyone needing help in filling out the forms see him about his problem.

The dividends are expected to be paid during the first six months of 1950. Only one application is necessary regardless of the number of policies that the veteran had.

### Tax Election Not To Change Rate in Bronte, Oak Creek

An election to set the tax rate for the new Bronte independent county line school district has been called for Saturday, September 3. The election proposes to set the tax rate of \$1.00 on state and county valuations. A bond assumption election will also be voted on.

The election is made necessary because Bronte is now a new school district and the tax rate must be the same over the new district. Supt. J. L. Carroll explained that the tax rate in the Oak Creek and Bronte territory will not be raised as the tax rate has been \$1.00 for some time. If passed, the election will raise the tax rate in the Brookshire district from 75 cents to \$1.00 and in the Mays district from 50 cents to \$1.00.

The election will be held in the city hall with Mrs. Noel Percifull, Mrs. Will Thomason and Mrs. C. L. Brown of Brookshire in charge of the voting.

Carroll also explained that the sinking fund rate is 30 cents which is included in the \$1.00 rate. He said that the bonded indebtedness of the district is \$21,000 with approximately \$3,000 in the sinking fund now. This will lower the bonded indebtedness to around \$19,000.

Supt. Carroll said he wishes to emphasize that this new tax rate will not raise taxes for Bronte people and that it is necessary to have the tax rate set in order for the schools to draw any state aid. He urges everyone to vote on the proposal.

J. D. Luttrell, manager of the gin, bought the cotton and paid thirty cents per pound for it. Williams had 4275 pounds of cotton on his truck. Ginning was free and the merchants made up a \$51 donation.

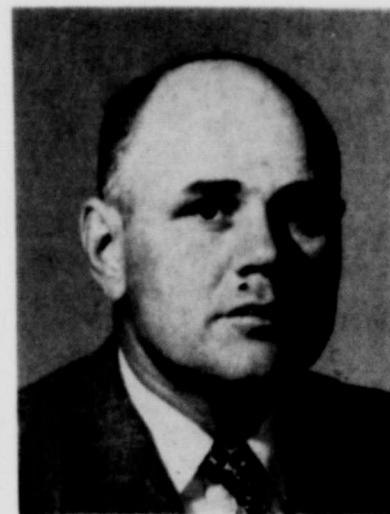
faculty will make preparations for registration Monday.

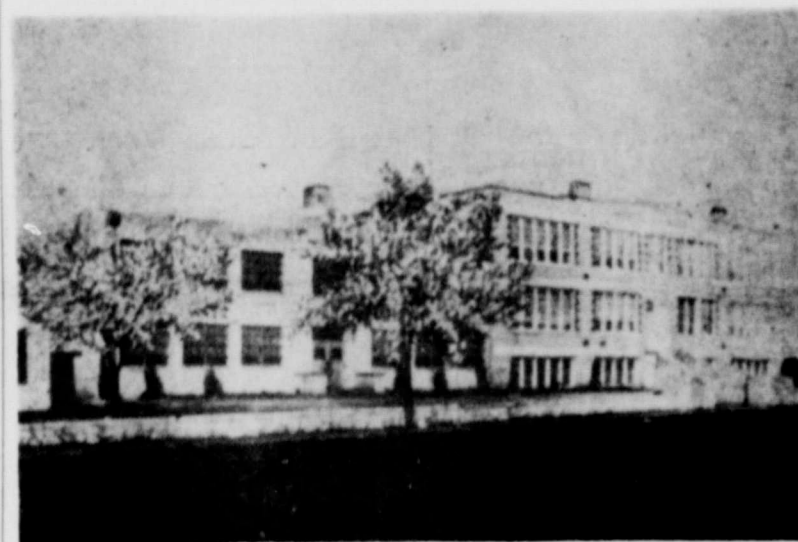

## Wind, Rain Do Small Damage Near Bronte

A driving wind and rain did some damage to property in the Bronte area Wednesday afternoon, hitting about 4:30. Rain was measured at about a half inch, falling in a few minutes.

Residents of Maverick reported a "good" rain there, much more than was received at Bronte, and the area around Tennyson and Orient received about an inch. Robert Lee also received over an inch.

According to reports Thursday morning, hardest wind was south of

the Colorado river toward Tennyson. H. L. Manley reported that a chicken house at the place where he lives was blown over. The roof from a barn belonging to J. P. Arrott was also blown off.

The blow and rain were accompanied by brilliant lightning and deafening thunder. However, nothing was reported as being struck by the lightning here.

The rain was fairly general, according to reports from the Thursday morning papers, extending from north of Abilene to south of San Angelo. Farmers and ranchmen were glad to see the moisture, but in some areas where the rain was heaviest, they said it might cause some loss from cotton insects.

Supt. J. L. Carroll said that about 390 scholastics are expected this year, the largest number since the war. The Bronte school district comprises some 240 square miles and has a valuation of \$1,800,000. Added to the district this year are the districts of Oak Creek, Brookshire and Mays.

The school will begin with a faculty of 15 members and the possibility of the addition of a 16th teacher. For the first time in several years, band courses have been added to the curriculum.

Teachers elected for this year in the grade school are: first grade, Mrs. Nell Flores and Mrs. Frank Sayner; second grade, Mrs. Vera Thomas; third grade, Mrs. Lore Phillips; fourth grade, Mrs. George Anderson; fifth grade, Mrs. Chet Holcombe.

The sixth, seventh and eighth grades are to be departmentalized with Vershel Smith in charge of the sixth grade, Mrs. J. L. Carroll in charge of the seventh and Jack Price in charge of the eighth grade.

High school teachers are: Mrs. J. T. Henry, business administration; J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture; W. N. Gaddy, science and math; Vetal Flores, English and speech; Mrs. Royce Fancher, homemaking; and J. L. Carroll, superintendent.

Bus drivers will be T. G. Gleghorn, Mrs. T. E. Tidwell and Mrs. Nell Edminston. A fourth driver will be employed when completed plans for a route are made.

Lunch room workers for this year will be Mrs. W. M. Alexander, Mrs. T. E. Tidwell and Mrs. T. G. Gleghorn. W. M. Alexander will be the building custodian.

On the board of trustees for the Bronte schools are Mack Powell, president, W. W. Millikin, secretary, D. K. Glenn, Clifford Clark, Jesse Parker, Cecil Kemp and W. H. Maxwell.

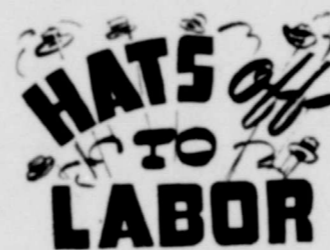

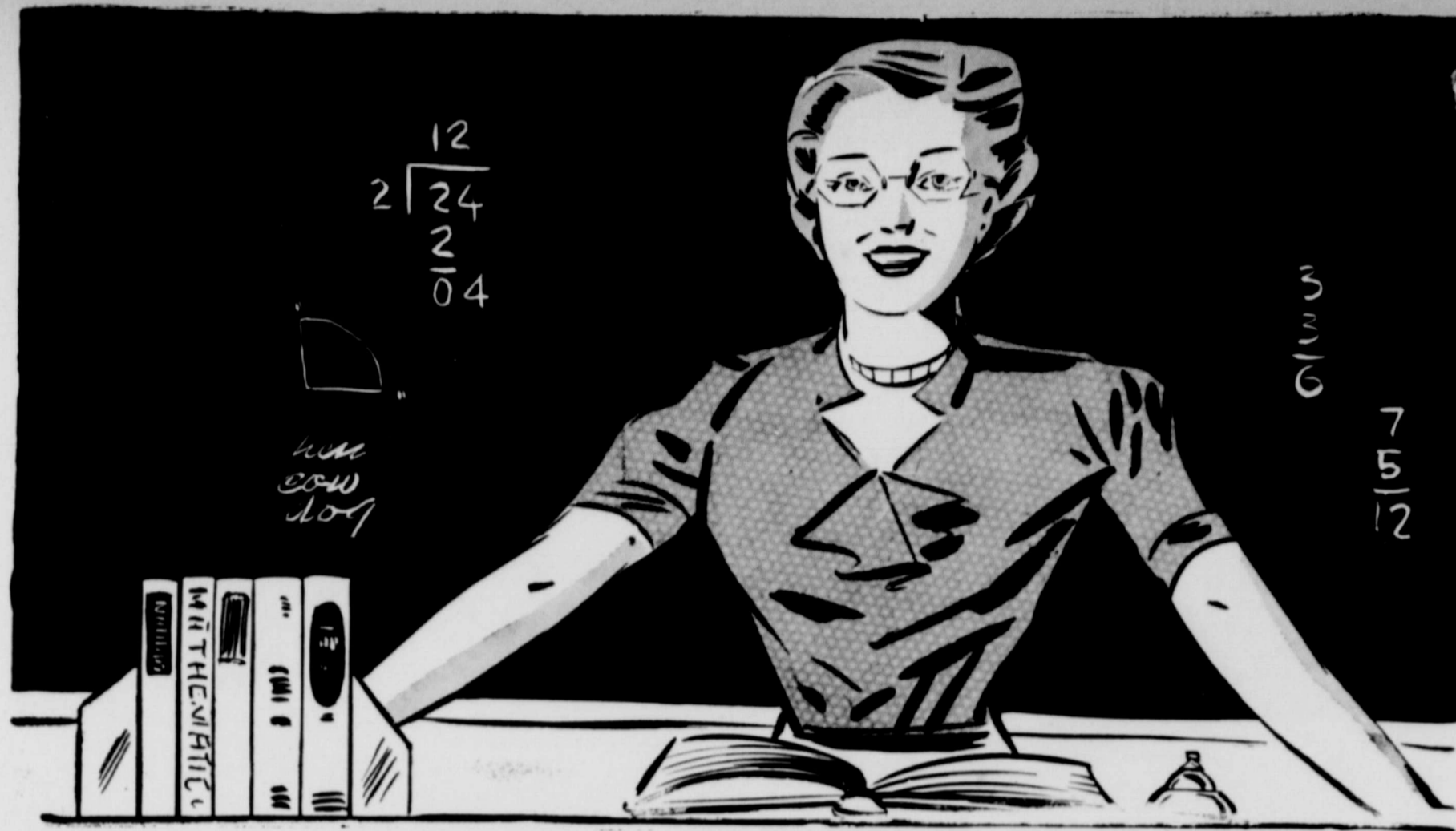

**NEWS FROM THE COKE COUNTY SCS**

"Complete deferment for the entire growing season is the best range management that a rancher can do for his range vegetation," said C. E. Arrott, who is cooperating with the Coke County Soil Conservation District and is a member of the Tennyson Conservation Group. "My range has made wonderful improvement this year because I deferred it during last year's growing season. By deferring last year, the range vegetation made a good growth and increased in plant vigor, matured a seed crop, and produced a good litter on the ground. A good vegetative litter is very important in range management," Arrott said.

Eight miles of terrace lines were run last week on Mrs. R. R. Ash's farm located two miles west of Bronte. The terrace system was designed to move outside water to a waterway to provide a method of

handling the water. The terrace system and waterway is a part of Cecil Ash's, operator of the Ash farm, complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan that she is applying on the farm. The terrace system and waterway was designed by personnel of the Soil Conservation Service.

An 1,800 cubic yard stock pond was completed last week on C. M. Anderson's ranch located seven miles south of Robert Lee. The stock pond was designed to give Anderson a better distribution of livestock water.

A 3,500 cubic yard stock pond was staked on Raymond Schooler's ranch located five miles southwest of the Edith store. The tank is a part of Schooler's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan he is applying in cooperation with the Coke County Soil Conservation District. The tank was planned to give Schooler a better distribution of livestock water.

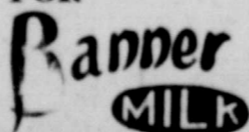

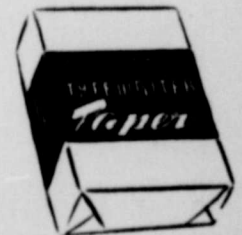

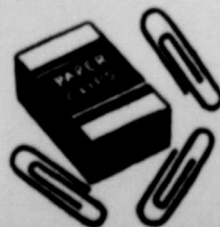
