Sweetwater Cottonoil Gives Gin Building for Youth Project

Final negotiations were made Monday whereby the Sweetwater Cottonoil Mill and Planers Gin Co. made a gift of the old gin building north of the postoffice to the Bronte Lions Club.

R. M. Simmons made the gift on behalf of the directors of the cotton concern, and Lions President Steve Badley and members, J. T. Henry

and C. E. Arrott were on hand to accept the gift.

The building, which is 20 by 72 feet, will be used to construct feeding barns and corrals for the Bronte High School FFA Chapter, of which Henry is sponsor. Mr. Simmons said, in making the gift, that he felt that the materials could be used to better advantage if given to the Lions

Club for the construction of feed barns and pens than if the company used the materials elsewhere.

The gin which was formerly housed in the building has not been used for several years. However, part of the building has been used for storing feed.

Lions President Badley began the movement several weeks ago which ended in obtaining the building. After meeting with Mr. Simmons and obtaining favorable comment from him, Badley returned to Bronte and, with Lions Henry and Arrott, worked out plans showing how the materials would be used if the gift were made.

These plans were presented to the board of directors of the cottonoil mill and the decision was made to donate the building to be used in helping the youth of the Bronte area.

Henry said Wednesday that his boys will begin work in the very near future toward dismantling the structure. He said that they will build a barn approximately 30 by 60 feet and several pens of various dimensions to care for their needs.

The facilities will be used for boys who live in town and do not have places to care for their projects, and to feed out stock belonging to the FFA. The organization now owns two gilts and will raise their own pigs to be fed. Plans call for feeding sheep and calves, also. They intend to feed about 15 pigs next year.

Construction of the pens and barn will be on property belonging to the local athletic association. Tentative plans call for them to be located northwest of the football field. They expect to have the barn and pens completed for use next fall.

Cottonseed Emergency Purchase Program Put Into Effect

The Coke County production and marketing administration committee has been authorized to purchase cottonseed through approved ginners or direct from farmers and store the seed on ground until proper storage can be secured. Under pink bollworm regulations seeds cannot be transported across county lines.

The County PMA committee has been authorized to purchase cottonseed for the Commodity Credit Corporation direct from producers at a rate of \$46.50 per ton. Payment to producers will be made by sight drafts drawn on Commodity Credit Corporation by PMA county officers on the basis of producers vouchers.

Farmers who wish to sell their cottonseed direct to the PMA county committee should see their county committeeman or come to the AAA officer for a more complete explanation.

Secretary, Mrs. Arrott, asks that everyone who is interested in participating in the Blue Cross hospitalization insurance sponsored by the bureau, should be at the meeting on Nov. 10, or see her before that date.

Bronte Gets up to Four Inches of Moisture and Cool Weather This Week

Saturday, Sunday and Monday brought cloudy skies and a soaking rain in this area. A much as 4½ inches was reported south of town and four inches was the report here in town for the entire rainy spell.

Ranchmen were rejoicing because of the rains, but cotton farmers were none too happy with it, as the moisture stopped picking and probably lowered the grade of much of the cotton which was still in the fields.

Mayor H. O. Whitt said that the city lake on the Ballinger highway was overflowing and that Lake Knierim rose about four feet.

Tuesday and Wednesday brought sunny skies and rising temperatures. The thermometer dropped to the low fifties during the rainy weather over the weekend.

Humble Ash and Odom Set Casing This Week

Humble No. 4 Ash set pipe Wednesday at 4,415 feet in the Palo Pinto line. This well is west of the No. 3 Ash and south of Hickok and Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 1 J. L. Keeney. It is west and slightly south of Bronte.

Present plans call for moving the rig of McQueen and Clevenger Drill-

ing Co. from the No. 4 Ash location to a new location on the Lowry Estate. This location will spot a joint well and will be shared by the Lowry Estate and R. E. Hickman. Two plots of land, belonging to the two interests have been pooled in order to furnish sufficient acreage for two wells.

Humble No. 3 Odom, northeast of town, has made good showings in the last few days on several drill-son tests. The last one on which a report was received was run Wednesday morning. Section tested was from 5,520 to 5,550 feet in the Strawn formation. Gas showed at the surface in three minutes and the well flowed for approximately 30 minutes, before it was shut in. From all indications this well will make a good one, some of the oil men around here have said. A report Thursday on the No. 3 Odom said casing was being set.

A new location where operations were beginning this week is Barnsdall Oil Co. No. 1 Findlater-Webb, a wildcat west of the highway, between Bronte and Tennyson. It is in the C NE SW of section 3, HE & WT survey. This wildcat is projected to 6,000 feet with rotary equipment. Tools were being moved in and crews assembled Wednesday.

Another wildcat, northeast of Bronte, was completed recently on the pump for 24.82 barrels of oil in 24 hours. It is Barnsdall Oil Co. No. 1 Harris Davenport. Production was through 24 perforations in 5½ inch casing from 5,369 to 5,375 feet. The section was acidized with 250 gallons. The new pumper is 4½ miles west and slightly south of the Humble No. 1 Odom.

Over in Runnels County, a wildcat has been staked by T. W. Murray of San Angelo to drill the No. 1 Odom. Location is six miles northwest of Wingate, and plans call for a depth of 5,600 feet. Drilling is scheduled to begin by Nov. 22.

NELDA ANN SHEPPARD WINS STATE 4-H CITIZENSHIP AWARD

Nelda Ann Sheppard, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Delmar Sheppard, Robert Lee, is the 1949 Texas 4-H Citizenship Contest winner for girls. Floyd Lynch, state 4-H club leader of the Texas A&M College Extension Service, made the announcement.

Miss Sheppard has completed seven years of 4-H work; is a freshman

student at San Angelo Junior College, a National 4-H Club Congress trip winner in 1947, a Gold Star girl and a recognized leader in her community and county.

She has been president of her local club six times and has served one year as president of the county organization. Mrs. S. C. Schooley is the local leader of the Robert Lee Senior 4-H Club and Nelda is the junior leader. She is just as active in other school, community and church affairs as in 4-H. She has been a class favorite, class president, captain of the volley ball and basketball teams and pep squad yell leader. In 1949, she was treasurer of the sub-district Methodist Youth Fellowship and was on the program committee at their summer camp.

She says, "Long before Coke County had an organized girl's 4-H club program, I was interested in the work and had hopes that some day I, too, might become an active 4-H member. I had tagged along after my three older brothers; all were prominent members and feeding livestock was something that interested me. I got my chance in 1943 and joined. I fed 10 lambs for my first demonstration and the next spring I showed the champion lamb at our county show. I started my home economics work that fall and soon found it to be just as interesting as my livestock work."

"I would not take anything for my 4-H career," she adds. "It has meant more to me than any other organization that I have been associated with and feel that I am a better citizen because of the training I have received. Out of my work, I have received something far better than wealth—I have developed my ability to get along with my fellowman and I feel that this training and the experiences I have enjoyed will enable me to become a more stable and intelligent citizen when I take my place in the world."

The National Citizenship Awards are provided to honor Thomas E. Wilson, chairman of the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, Chicago. The two national winners, a boy and a girl, will each receive a \$200 college scholarship. Miss Sheppard's record will be entered in the national contest.

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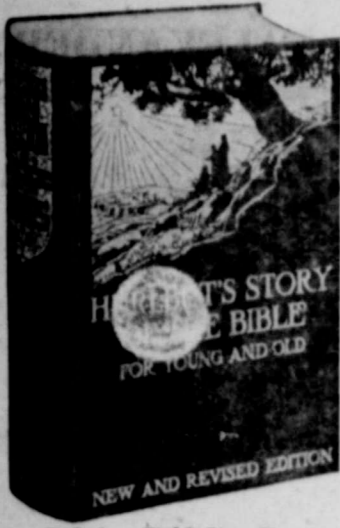

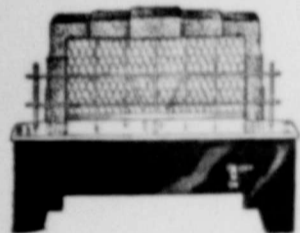

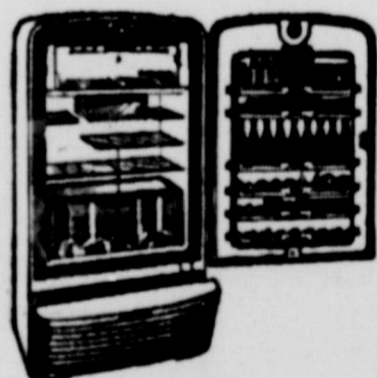
