### MOST TAXES COLLECTED, SAYS SHERIFF

Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector Paul Good has really been taking in money for Coke County this month. He reports that about 80 per cent of the collections were in before Nov. 1 giving the early payers a three per cent discount on their taxes.

During October \$179,190.19 was collected of the \$232,377.67 which was due. The amount collected pays more taxes, of course, than the figures indicate because of the three per cent discount.

Sun Oil Co. was the big taxpaye in the county again this year with \$93,000 tax bill. Good said that their taxes alone ran more this year than the total tax roll figure was back during the depression.

Last Thursday was the record breaking day when Sun Oil's check came in and the sheriff took in a total of \$100,136. Early this week he deposited the money which had built up to \$124,348.51. This was the largest deposit which has ever been made at the local bank by one person at one time, said B. D. Snead, eashier.

Good said that he greatly appreciates the way people are coming in and paying their taxes and that he hopes the remaining taxes will be paid before the Feb. 1 deadline.
