# **Total Resources In Bronte Bank Now** Over Two Million

Total resources of the First Na tional Bank in Bronte are now \$2, 048,164.38, according to the statement of condition issued by the bank Nov. 1. L. T. Youngblood, president of the bank, said this is an all-time high for the local bank. Youngblood said that when the bank started back in the 20's they had about \$25,000 in capital and approximately \$100,000 in deposits, making a total of \$125,000 in assets. Today the capital structure of the bank totals almost that much.

On the present statement of condition, the loans and discounts total \$442,297.07, and the total demand deposits are \$1,934,471. 34.




