## Percifull and Odom Wells Show Good

One well was completed this week in the Bronte Field. Hickok & Reynolds No. 2 J. A. Percifull was running casing late this week preparatory to completing the well. A drill stem test Tuesday yielded 1,800 feet of oil. Total depth is 4,435 feet, and the bottom 22 feet were tested. Gas came to the surface in seven minutes.

The rig which drilled the No. 2 Percifull, which is owned and operated by D. L. Rose & Son of Albany, will reportedly move across the property line due east of the No. 2 Percifull on the O. R. McQueen property where the Hickok & Reynolds No. 2 McQueen will be drilled.

Humble's well on the R. E. Hickman property was still having trouble with water breaking in, at the last report. They have cemented the water bearing section eight times but have been unable to check the tremendous flow of water. The royalty on this field well is owned jointly by the Lowry Estate and R. E. Hickman.

Humble completed their B-1 Odom Estate this week and apparently it will be a good producer. A drillstem

test run the first of the week brought gas to the surface in three minutes and the well started flowing in two hours. It flowed at an estimated rate of 20 barrels per hour for seven minutes when it was shut in. Tool was open a total of two hours and seven minutes. Section tested was from 5,486 to 5,515 feet. Plans were to drill another ten feet and run another test. Results of the second test were not learned.

Barnsdall Oil Co. was busy this week digging slush pits and rigging up to begin drilling their No. 2 Harris Davenport. It is in the Fort Chadbourne field, northeast of Bronte.

Barnsdall No. 1 Findlater-Webb was drilling below 3,000 feet this week. Location is south of Bronte about six miles.

## Six FFA Chapters Here Today for District Contests

FFA teams from Big Lake, San Angelo, Robert Lee, Eola, Eden and Bronte are competing today in the District Leadership contests for FFA chapters, here at Bronte. Contests are being held in the agriculture building here. They are to begin at 10 a.m.

J. T. Henry, local agriculture teacher, said this is the first time Bronte has been the host school for the district.

Two divisions of each contest will be conducted. There will be contests for the FFA group and the Greenhand group in each of the following subjects: chapter conducting, farm skill demonstrations and FFA quiz. Banners will be awarded to the winners in each division.

## W. J. Cumbie Rites Held Sunday at Robert Lee Church

Last rites for W. J. (Will) Cumbie, 76, were held Sunday afternoon from the Robert Lee Baptist church, with the Rev. Fred Blake of Brownwood officiating. Burial was in the Robert Lee cemetery.

Mr. Cumbie died at his home in Robert Lee at 2:25 Saturday afternoon after an illness of six weeks. He was a retired businessman, farmer and former Coke county tax assessor.

He was born Feb. 12, 1873, at Henderson and came to Coke county with his parents, the late Rev. and Mrs. R. M. Cumbie, in 1890. He was married to the former Miss Ollie Walton at Bronte in December, 1894. He farmed north of Bronte for some time until he was elected Coke county tax assessor in 1914 and held the office until 1920. He then went into the merchandising business until 1941, when he retired.

He was a member of the Hayrick Masonic lodge and the Robert Lee Baptist church. He was a senior deacon in that church at the time of his death.

Survivors are his wife, three daughters, Mrs. H. Lamont Scott, Mrs. J. C. Snead, Jr., and Mrs. Gerald C. Allen, all of Robert Lee; two brothers, R. E. Cumbie and I. M. Cumbie, both of Bronte; three sisters, Mrs. H. R. Wilkins of Bronte, Mrs. J. L. Wallace of Franklin, and Mrs. Cova Collier of Abilene; six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

## Bronte Merchants Are Getting Ready for Christmas Season

### 1950 COTTON QUOTA FOR COKE SET AT 4,492 ACRES; MORE THAN 1949

The 1950 cotton acreage allotment for Texas counties was announced last week by B. F. Vance, chairman of the State Production and Marketing administration committee. The Coke county quota was set for 4,492 acres for 1950. The 1949 cotton acreage in the county was 3,570 acres.

### TIPS ON BAKING, STORING FRUIT CAKES GIVEN

Christmas and the holiday season are here and now is the time to make your fruit cakes for the season, make it and store it, for proper storing will give it that good mellow flavor—the thing all cooks want in their cakes.

The preparation of the fruits for the cake is important and this job should be done the day before you plan to bake the cake. Cut the citron, orange and lemon peel in very thin strips, the cherries in half and the pineapple in thin wedges. Wash the raisins and currants and spread out to dry. Cut up the nuts coarsely with a sharp knife.

The baking pans should be readied before you start mixing up the cake. Grease and line them with oiled brown paper. Set the oven at 250 degrees so it will be ready when you have prepared the cake. Then proceed mixing as for any other cake. Divide the flour in half and mix part of it with the fruits—this keeps them from sticking together—and finish mixing the cake with your hands. Place the batter in the pans with your hands and press down firmly. This firming helps to get a compact solid cake and one that is easy to slice.

The time allowed for baking is very important, about 45 minutes per pound for the larger cakes. A seven pound cake would need to bake for approximately five hours at 250 degrees. Heavy brown paper tied over the top of the cake pan while it is cooking will help keep the cake from getting too dry and brown.

Decorations, such as candied fruits or nuts, should be added when the cake has almost finished baking. Some cooks like a glaze on their cakes. To get it on a dark cake, brush the surface with a mixture of molasses and water and for the light or white fruit cake brush with honey and water or egg white and water about an hour before the baking time is up. When the baking time is up, remove the cake from the pan, but do not remove the paper from the bottom of the cake. After it has thoroughly cooled, wrap and tie it securely in waxed paper and it is ready for storage.

It should be stored in a clean, tight container. A few apples or oranges in the container with the cake will supply moisture to the cake as it mellows in storage.

Following is a recipe for white fruit cake recommended by Miss Louise Mason, extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A & M college:

One and a half lbs. blanched almonds  
Four lb. candied citron  
Fourth lb. candied pineapple  
Fourth lb. candied cherries  
Half lb. golden raisins  
4 cups sifted all purpose flour  
6 eggs

One and a half cups butter or oleo  
2 cups sugar  
1 cup milk  
1 teaspoon almond extract  
1 teaspoon cream of tartar

Cream the butter, add sugar gradually, and beat until smooth. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Combine with butter and sugar mixture and beat thoroughly. Dredge the fruit and nuts with part of the flour. Sift other flour and cream of tartar together. Combine fruit and nuts with the first mixture. Then add rest of flour alternately with the milk. Fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites. Add the almond extract. Bake in a slow oven (250-300 degrees) from three and one-half to four hours.

Bronte is rapidly taking on the Christmas look. Stores are decorating their windows, Christmas lights can be seen at night in the residential section of town, and all the kids are on good behavior in hopes that a jolly old fellow will not forget them December 25.

J. T. Henry and his Aggie boys have volunteered to string Christmas lights at the main intersections of town. They expect to have the lights up Monday and have them glowing cheerily by Monday evening.

Many stores in town have large stocks of Christmas trees. Most any size and price tree can be found for those who wish to purchase one. All sorts of fancy lights and other decorations for the trees and for the home are finding their way on to the counters of local merchants.

### Sanding Demonstration Held in Rives Home

A floor sanding demonstration was held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Rives, Jr., of the Friendship community on Friday, Nov. 18. A representative of Clarke Sanding Machine Co., Shelby H. Presley, gave the demonstration.

Presley informed the group that kerosene should be applied to the floor and allowed to stay on about 30 minutes before the sanding is started if the floor has previously been waxed, varnished or painted. If the floor has a heavy coat of old finish on it the kerosene should be left on it overnight in order to keep the old finish from sticking to the paper on the sander. Presley stressed the fact that no open fire should

be in the house and that the house must be open while this process is going on.

He began sanding by using a very coarse sand paper. He informed the group that if the floor was very rough the first sanding should be done crosswise of the boards and the second sanding should be done in the same direction the boards run.

The third or last sanding was done with a fine sand paper which left the floor ready to be finished. Any good wood filler was recommended. The application of this filler should be followed by an application of a good floor seal which should be sanded by using steel wool then a second application made and treated the same way. A coat of varnish may follow, but this is not necessary. A good wax is all that is needed on top

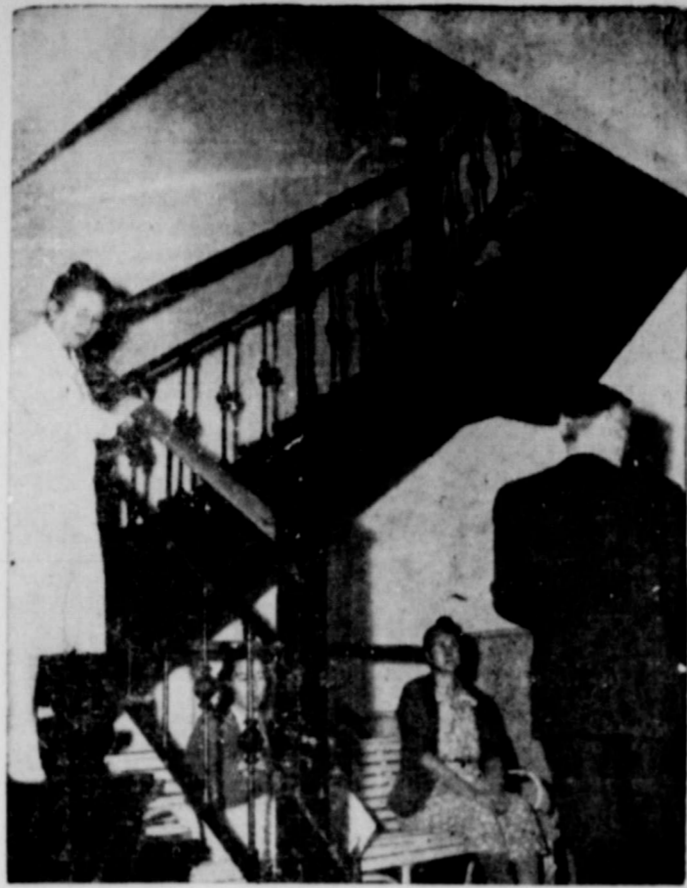
