Percifull and Keeney Wells Completed in Bronte Field

Hickok & Reynolds No. 3 J. A. Percifull had reached 5,173 feet in the Caddo lime Wednesday. Operator plans to complete the well as a gas producer from this section. No drillstem test was planned and Wednesday night work was begun on running an electric log and setting casing. The No. 3 Percifull is a twin

well to the No. 1 Percifull, an oil producer from the Palo Pinto formation.

Lone Star Production Co., an affiliate of Lone Star Gas Co., has an interest in this well and plans to develop a gas field west of town.

Humble No. 4 R. E. Hickman was drilling Wednesday night at 3,325

feet in lime and shale. McQueen & Clevenger has the drilling contract.

A daily potential of 295.02 barrels of 46.1 gravity oil for Humble No. 2-B Olive Mae Keeney was announced the first of this week. Gas-oil ratio was 175-1 and flowing pressures were 190 pounds on the tubing 280 pounds on the casing. Production was through a 16-64 inch tubing choke and open hole. Producing formation was from 4,316 to 4,365 feet which is the total depth.

Hickok & Reynolds No. 4 E. C. Rawlings is a 4,500 foot test to be made in the Bronte Field. It will be 440 feet from the north and east lines of northwest quarter of section 453-1A-H&T.C. survey.

Barnsdall No. 2 Harris Davenport was drilling below 2,900 feet in shale and lime.

Humble No. 1-C Odom Estate was completed this week for a daily flow of 230.64 barrels of 45.6 gravity oil. This Humble well which extends the Fort Chadbourne Field more than two miles toward Bronte, produced through a quarter inch choke from 5,328-40 feet in the Strawn section. Flowing tubing pressure was 240 pounds. Rowan Drilling Co. had the contract.

Fred Manning, Inc., of Fort Worth has scheduled a test in the Fort Chadbourne Field beginning immediately. It is the No. 2 S. L. McNay, located northeast of Bronte and scheduled to drill to 6,200 feet or production.

Humble No. 2-B and No. 3-B Mrs. Sallie Odom have begun drilling in the Fort Chadbourne Field. Wood Associates of Wichita Falls have the contract for the No. 2-B and Rowan Drilling Co. of Abilene is drilling the No. 3-B.

Another location in this field is N. P. Powell of Tyler No. 3 Sallie Odom, scheduled to drill to 5,400 feet. Warren Oil Corp. of Wichita Falls No. 1 Hensley unit is planned to drill to 5,400 feet. Location is about 15 miles from Bronte.

Reports have been circulating this week that several more rigs are moving into the Fort Chadbourne Field in a short time. Bronte people are particularly interested in this field as it is located only approximately ten miles from town.

South of Robert Lee, Providence No. 1 S. E. Adams was drilling at 6,160 feet in lime, chert and shale.

In the A game, the Longhorns could not pierce the Academy defense and trailed 9-0 at the close of the first quarter. St. Joe led 14-4 at the half and the Longhorns could not check Yancey, the Knights' high pointer and fell farther behind, trailing 27-14 at the end of three.

Yancey of the Academy beat the strings for 11 points to take high scoring honors. Trammie Fair scratched 8 and Koegel 6. Earl Rusk led Bronte with 6.

In the B game, the Longhorn B team was beat out in the last quarter of a nip and tuck ball game. The locals led 6-4 at the quarter and 13-10 at the half. The Academy pulled up to a 16-16 tie at the end of the third and went on to win 27-23. Zuber tallied 9 to spark St. Joe's B team, while Lyndon Waldrop and Vance Winn each chunked in 8 points for the Longhorn B.

Willis Smith to Seek Reelection To Clerk's Job

Willis Smith, Coke County and District clerk, this week authorized The Enterprise to announce his candidacy for reelection to this post. Smith authorized this paper to say that "I have tried faithfully to serve Coke County as a fair and impartial county official and to carry out the duties of the clerk's office to the best of my ability. If reelected to the position, I will continue to serve the citizens of Coke County in every way I can and to the best of my ability."

Local Man Named To Hospital Job

Caswell Haseldon of Bronte was named business manager for the new Coke County hospital, it was announced this week. Haseldon recently returned to Bronte from California.

The announcement, made by County Judge Jeff Dean, also said that an X-ray machine has been ordered from a Dallas firm and that room furniture has been contracted for from a Dallas firm, also.

Dean reported that the contractor expects to complete the hospital building in March and that the hospital should be in operation by the latter part of April. No other personnel of the hospital has been hired.

J. T. Henry, local vocational agriculture teacher, and Gerald Sandusky are in Houston this week attending the Houston Fat Stock show and livestock exposition. Sandusky has two entries in the show.

The March of Dimes drive on the east side of Coke County appeared to be getting underway with a little more steam this week, with some active plans for raising money being made.

The four cafes here, Cactus Cafe, Jones Cafe, City Cafe and Bronte Cafe, announced Wednesday that they will all charge ten cents for

coffee Friday and Saturday, with the additional five cents going to the March of Dimes.

Jars will be placed near the cash registers in the cafes and when a customer pays for a cup of coffee, a nickel will be dropped in the jar.

A. J. Bilbo, who is in charge of the March of Dimes in western Coke County, said Wednesday that he has

received word that the drive in this county has been extended for an additional two weeks or longer, if necessary. Bilbo said that workers on the west side have turned in between five and six hundred dollars, and that some money is still out. He pointed out, however, that his workers are not through with the drive and that more funds will be raised to aid victims of infantile paralysis.

Members of the Bronte Lions Club pledged themselves Wednesday to raising ten dollars each for the drive. Members of some of the women's clubs in Bronte also plan to help in the March of Dimes.

Plans were also being made to have workers out in town this week-end soliciting donations.

J. M. Rippetoe, county chairman of the drive, has called a meeting for Monday night, Feb. 6, when reports from workers will be received and plans made for carrying the campaign to a successful conclusion. The meeting will be held in the city hall and Rippetoe urged that everybody who is interested in the March of Dimes be present.

Rippetoe said that everyone should contribute liberally to the fund as Coke County is in debt some \$4,000 for bills of polio victims in 1949. Three new cases of the disease were reported in the county last week. "With so many cases in the county last year, and with these three additional cases this month, we should all give to the March of Dimes just as liberally as we possibly can. To do so may be the means of caring for your own child," Chairman Rippetoe added.

1362 Poll Taxes Issued in Coke

Paul Good, Coke County Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector announced Wednesday that he issued 1362 poll tax receipts up until February 1. Sheriff Good said that this compares unfavorably with the 1461 which were issued last year. Deadline for paying poll taxes was January 31.

He estimated that there will be about 300 overs and unders who will be eligible to vote this year, bringing Coke County's total of qualified voters to about 1650.

Good said also that state and county tax collection had come in good this year, with about 95 per cent of the assessed taxes being collected. He said this is an exceptionally high percentage.
