School Board Petitions Filed

Petitions bearing the names of 19 men for positions on the Bronte School Board of Trustees had been filed in County Judge Jeff Dean's office Tuesday afternoon. The deadline for filing was midnight Tuesday night, with the election set for April 1.

The names of five men, Bon Spoons Noel Percifull, R. T. Caperton, John Coalson and Robert H. Sims, were presented to Dean this week, in addition to the ones previously announced. The seven present board members, Mack Powell, W. W. Millikin, Clifford Clark, Cecil Kemp, D. K. Glenn, W. H. Maxwell and Jesse Parker, have been presented for re-election. Sid Evans, James Lee, Charlie Boecking, C. L. Brown, Aubrey Denman, Cullen Luttrell and Bill Wrinkle will also be on the ballot.

An entire board of trustees will be elected this year since it is the first regular election following a consolidation action.

The election will be held Saturday, April 1, in the City Hall at Bronte.

Members of the Greenhand chapter conducting team of the Bronte chapter of Future Farmers of America proudly returned Sunday from the state FFA contests in Huntsville, winners of the third place banner. The contests were held Saturday and the Bronte lads were beaten only by Luling and Huntsville.

Twenty-three teams composed of 230 boys, competed in the contest. They represented some 741 teams in Texas. J. T. Henry, vocational agriculture teacher, accompanied the boys to Huntsville Friday.

Coke County also had another winner to be proud of. The Greenhand FFA quiz team from Robert Lee also won a third place banner in that contest.

B. F. Bridges & Son Rambouillets Make Excellent Records This Show Season

Sheep bred by B. F. Bridges & Son of Bronte made enviable records in shows over the state this season. Their sheep took three grand championships, won reserve championship honors in two shows and took first place honors in their class at five shows.

At the beginning of this season the local Rambouillet breeders sold four of their prize lambs to club boys. Two of them went to Harley Waggoner of Blackwell and two were bought by Bridgford Bros. of Colorado City.

Grand championship honors were taken at the annual fat stock show at Blackwell by Waggoner, and sheep shown by the Bridges themselves won the same honors at the Coke County show at Robert Lee and at the San Angelo show.

Bridgford Bros. showed the reserve champion at Angelo, Waggoner had the reserve champ at the Sweetwater six-county show, and Bridges & Son showed the reserve champion at Robert Lee.

In addition to these high honors, Bridgford Bros. took first and third places at the Colorado City show, second at the Fort Worth fat stock show, eighth at the San Antonio

show and first at San Angelo.

Besides the honors mentioned above, Waggoner took first and second at the Blackwell show, second place at the Nolan County show and first place at the Sweetwater six-county show.

According to Louis Bridges, the lambs which were fed out by the Colorado City brothers gained faster than Southdowns and Suffolk-Rambouillet crosses which were fed in the same lot. The two lambs bought from the Bronte breeders gained 122 pounds in six months and four days.

Bridges said that Waggoner's lambs showed remarkable gain, also, gaining 10 pounds in one 14-day period. The four lambs which were sold were dropped between July 1 and 4, 1949.

These club boys really did well with their lambs, was the way Bridges put it this week. He said that in addition to a great deal of prize money, Waggoner won a \$125 educational trip which he will take next summer.

Louis Bridges lives on the ranch operated by the local father and son. It is located southeast of Bronte just south of the Colorado River, and east of the San Angelo highway.

Richards, Davenport Wells Extend 2 Fields

Oil news northeast of town held the limelight this week, one well in Coke County and one in Runnels, only ten miles from Bronte coming in. The two tests west of town in the Bronte Field were drilling ahead also.

Barnsdall No. 2 Harris Davenport was completed this week for a 24-hour potential of 152.29 barrels of oil. Production was from 5,330 to 5,360 feet through 240 perforations. A later test produced 100 barrels of oil in 12 hours. Gas-oil ratio was

822-1. Completion of this well gives the Davenport field a three-quarter mile southwest extension.

No. 2 Davenport is located 660 feet from the south and west lines of the east 738 acres of league 475, Seth Clark survey. It is approximately ten miles northeast of Bronte, east of the Blackwell highway.

The other test, which extended the Fort Chadbourne field one and one-fourth miles southwest, was Hiawatha and Plymouth No. 1 Tad Richards. It was tested Sunday and flow-

ed 44 barrels of high gravity oil in four hours before being shut in to construct storage. No. 1 Richards is 467 feet from the northwest and 902 feet from the southwest lines of G. Villareal survey 280.

Humble No. 2 O. L. Johnson, south outpost to the Bronte field, was set to drill the plug Thursday morning. Casing was set at 4,338 feet, on top of the Palo Pinto section. Completion is expected in a day or so. McQueen & Clevenger is drilling this well, which will extend the Bronte field a quarter of a mile to the southwest if it produces.

Hickok & Reynolds No. 4 E. C. Rawlings, which is being drilled by D. L. Rose & Son, had progressed late Wednesday to 2,290 feet. It is scheduled to go to the Palo Pinto pay section. The No. 1 Rawlings, which is a twin well to the No. 4, will be drilled out and gas production from the Strawn will be attempted.

The Fort Chadbourne field was further extended, to the northwest this week when Lester & Duffield and Fair & Piper No. 1 S. L. McNay flowed at the rate of 4.5 barrels per hour.

Two new locations were staked this week in the vicinity of the Davenport field in Coke County. Barnsdall No. 3 Davenport is 2,100 feet from the north and 4,000 feet from the east lines of league 475, Seth Clark survey. It is one-half mile northeast of the recently completed No. 2 Davenport.

Warren and Humble have staked location for their No. 1 Chas. Copeland. It will be 2,100 feet from the south and 3,000 feet from the west lines of Holleman survey 306. It is 4,000 feet north of the No. 3 Davenport.

Humble No. 1-D Sallie Odom was drilling this week below 5,000 feet. Completion is expected within the next few days. Rowan Drilling Co. has the contract.

Belva Receives Life-Size Portrait of Self

Belva Karen Rippetoe this week received a life-sized portrait of herself, done in pastels by Virginia Fitzgerald, San Antonio artist. The seven-year-old cancer victim has never seen Miss Fitzgerald but the portrait was done from other pictures. Virginia Fitzgerald is president of the River Art group in San Antonio and she decided to do the portrait when she read newspaper accounts of Belva's brave fight for life.

Belva was painted with her doll "Toni" in her arms and is very proud of the portrait, saying that is the she "used to look" before she lost so much weight. She now weighs only 41 pounds, compared to 54 pounds in December. The picture was delivered to her by T-Sgt. Wesley Lechert of Goodfellow AFB Friday.

Her father, J. M. Rippetoe, says he believes the child is at least holding her own and she was given her second injection of glyoxylide Saturday. She had one injection of the drug of hormone content six weeks ago. It is the latest of a series of treatments which the Rippetoes have tried in efforts to save the child's life. Rippetoe said the first injection seemed to help her some. Belva receives presents, cards and letters in each day's mail which always makes her happy. Her latest gift is a life-time pass from Slim Starling of San Angelo to either of his drive-in theaters, the Starlite and Twilite.

Tad Richards Celebrates New Oil Well On His Land with Barbecue Monday

One of the master party-givers in this section of Texas stoked up the fires and barbecued a few hundred pounds of beef Monday. Tad Richards was celebrating the discovery of oil on his land, northeast of here.

Hiawatha and Plymouth No. 1 Richards flowed 44 barrels of oil Sunday after the third run of the swab and after being acidized with 250 gallons. The first hour it flowed eight barrels, the second hour, ten, the third hour, 12, and the fourth hour, 14 barrels of oil. It was then shut in to await construction of storage facilities.

Tad said he would have tried to throw a really "good" barbecue but he didn't know he was going to have it until late Sunday afternoon. In spite of the fact that he "didn't have enough time" he managed to serve barbecue, beans, son-of-a-gun, potato salad and coffee to about 100 persons.

Guests were amazed that he could "cook up" such a meal on such short notice.

Mr. Richards' friends from Bronte, Winters, Blackwell, and other communities in this area were present to celebrate with him. Oil officials and

members of the drilling crew were also present.

The discovery of the No. 1 Richards brings the Fort Chadbourne field more than a mile closer to the city limits of Bronte, making the field nearly six miles long. Richard King, Jr., of Edinburg originally had the lease on this block, but he turned half of the 1,291 acres to Hiawatha and Plymouth, the deal calling for a drilling contract. Delaware Drillers were contractors on drilling the producer. King is president of that firm.

Food for the barbecue was prepared at the big two-story white ranch house of the Richards. After everything was ready, the food was hauled to a shady spot on the edge of the creek which runs through the place. There the crowd enjoyed Tad's hospitality and good food.

Farmers May Get Pre-Measurement On Cotton Land

Coke County cotton farmers can arrange to have their 1950 cotton allotment acreage measured before planting time.

This pre-measurement service is available to all cotton farmers who need this service to determine the correct amount of land to be planted to cotton so their allotment will not be in excess.

The rate for pre-measurement services has been established at \$5.00 per farm plus \$1.00 for each plot to be planted to cotton plus two cents for each acre in the allotment.

To get pre-measurement services, a cotton farmer will have to make a written request to the county PMA committee and make payment at the time the request for pre-measurement is made.

Farmers wishing to use this service must make their request before April 15. Measurements will be made as soon as possible after the requests are received.

Preston Smith Announces for Lt.-Governor

Preston, 38-year-old Lubbock business man, entered the political arena this week by announcing his candidacy for Lieutenant-Governor. Smith is a three-term veteran of the Texas House of Representatives. He was first elected in 1944 to represent District 119.

Smith served four years as a member of the appropriation committee and has also served as chairman of the sub-committee on higher education. He is a firm believer in the application of sound business methods in the operation of state government.

Smith was born on a Williamson county farm and stayed with farm life until 1931. He has six brothers and six sisters.

Much of his career in the House has been devoted to championing the cause of Texas' rural people. He authored the rural hospital bill and co-authored the rural telephone bill. He has been active in the fight for farm-to-market roads and soil conservation. He has supported all veteran legislation.

Of his hospital plan, Smith says, "This measure will go a long way toward solving the doctor shortage in small communities. If the counties will vote bonds for hospitals and lease them to young doctors, who have not the financial means to build their own hospitals, the younger men will not be so inclined to go to the larger towns where facilities are available."

Commenting on his race for Lieutenant Governor, Smith said, "Much of Texas' population is centered in rural areas and small communities. Unless you have lived on a farm or in one of the very small towns, of which there are many in the state, you can't realize how much is needed.

SCS Supervisors Visit Ranches

The board of supervisors of the Coke County Soil Conservation District spent Tuesday morning, March 14, observing the growing of cover crop and seeding of adapted range grasses in the Bronte and North Bronte conservation group. C. N. Webb, chairman of the board, Bryan Yarbrough, vice chairman, W. C. Shamblin, secretary, W. E. Burns and Guy Denman, members, attended. A member of the South Sanco conservation group and James W. Allen, member of the North Bronte group, also observed some of the conservation work that is being applied as a part of the district co-operators' complete soil and water conservation plan.

E. J. Hughes, district conservationist of Big Spring, H. M. Ball, zone conservationist of Fort Worth, and A. V. Sheppard, work unit conservationist of Robert Lee attended the tour.

The group observed rye and vetch and Dixie wonder winter peas growing on James W. Allen's farm. The rye and vetch and peas seeded the

last of November. Allen told the group that he grazed 60 to 100 head of sheep, two horses, and two milch cows on 22 acres during the month of February.

The group observed a diversion terrace on John Coalson's farm that had been seeded to western wheat and weeping lovegrass. The diversion terrace was seeded to grass to control erosion and to aid in getting land plowed up back into production. The next stop was to observe a

year-old seeding of Madrid sweet clover on Mrs. C. H. Wilkins' farm. The clover produced about one and one-half tons of hay per acre. Mrs. Wilkins plans to harvest seed this year.

On D. K. Glenn's farm one mile south of Bronte the group observed cows and calves grazing rye and vetch. They also observed good grain sorghum stubble management. Glenn seeded the rye and vetch on land that was seeded to grain sorghum last year. The grain sorghum stubble was all on the surface of the soil.

The last stop was to observe re-seeding of adapted range grasses on Ed Cumbie's ranch located three miles east of Bronte. The re-seeding was on rangeland that had been pitted with an off set disc that would dig out a short shallow pit.

At each stop the advantage of the cover crops in a complete coordinated soil and water conservation program were discussed. The development of nodules on the roots and the amount and penetration of the root system was pointed out and discussed. The legumes are deep rooted plants that will penetrate the plow pan and bring up soil nutrients to be used by the future crops that are to be grown on the land.

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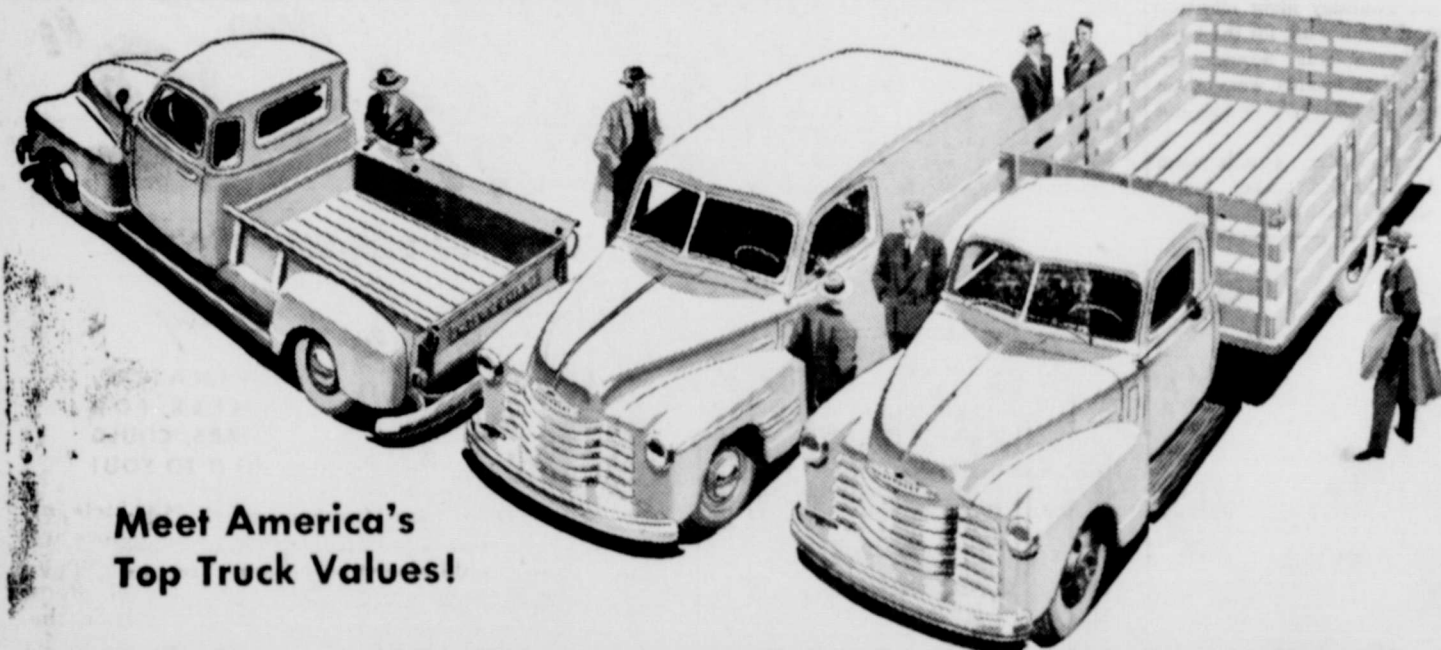

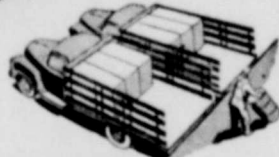

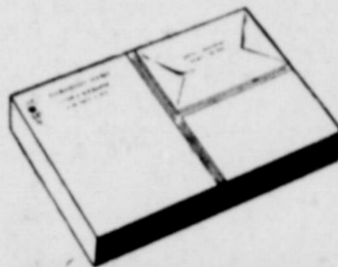
BRIDGE ON RIVER AT ROBERT LEE TO BE REPAIRED

ed in the way of worthwhile legislation for the rural areas. Texas needs the services which the rural population provides and the rural population needs better facilities for day to day living. As Lieutenant Governor, I will continue my efforts to see to that with other important legislation."

Smith also authored the bill, in the House, which would require all boards, bureaus and state agencies that spend state tax money to hold open meetings and to advise the press in writing in advance of such meetings. The measure passed the House but did not get through the Senate.

Smith has been a Lubbock resident for 18 years and has been in the theater business since 1936. His schooling includes a diploma from Lamesa high school and a degree from Texas Technological college in Lubbock where he studied auditing and accounting.

He married the former Miss Ina Smith, also a Texas Tech graduate, in 1935. They have two children. He is a member of the Methodist church, Kiwanis club and is a 32nd degree Mason.
