Tests Going in All Directions From Bronte; 1 Richards Flows

Bronte was practically surrounded this week with tests going down in all directions from here. Tests west, south, southeast, northeast, and north of town were progressing.

A report Wednesday afternoon said that Hiawatha and Plymouth No. 2 Tad Richards flowed on a test from the open hole to a depth of 5,282 feet, the total depth. Seven-inch casing was set and cemented at 5,245 feet in line. On a drillstem test early this week the No. 2 Richards re-

covered 130 feet of very heavily oil and gas cut mud. The well is located south of the No. 1 Richards which extended the Fort Chadbourne Field to the south. The No. 2 well extends the field even further toward Bronte.

Seven miles west of Bronte Union Oil Co. No. 1 Mrs. Daisy McCutchen was rigging up to begin their 7,500 foot wildcat. Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west line of the northwest quarter

of section 445-1A-H&TC. It is one mile east of the same company's No. 1 Jim McCutchen, Ellenburger failure, which had some shows.

South of Bronte Southern Minerals and Seaboard No. 1 Greenland was drilling at 5,908 feet in line. Southeast of Bronte, near Maverick, Spartan No. 1 Levy Lee was drilling Wednesday below 1,800 feet in lime and shale.

Elsewhere in the Fort Chadbourne Field, Lester & Duffield and Pair & Piper No. 2 S. L. McNay was completed for a daily potential of 423 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,150-1. This well is a quarter mile extension of the Fort Chadbourne Field to the north.

Humble No. 4-B Sallie Odum was completed for a daily flow of 288.29 barrels of 44.2 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,200-1. A new location in this field is Burdell Oil Co. of Snyder No. 1 Zaida Sowell. It has been located about one-half mile west of Hiawatha No. 1 Richards and the same distance southwest of Humble No. 2-C Odum, now drilling.

A. V. Sheppard Explains SCS District Set-Up

Austin Sandusky and a group of his neighbors met last Tuesday afternoon to discuss the Coke County Soil Conservation District and the assistance the district offers land owners in planning and applying a complete coordinated soil and water conservation program.

A. V. Sheppard, work unit conservationist, explained how the district was organized, that the board of supervisors are the governing body, how they are elected, and their duties to land owners and operators. The district is a sub-division of the state government and was organized by land owners and is administered by land owners, Sheppard explained. The federal government realized several years ago that if soil erosion and deterioration was stopped land owners and operators would have to do the job. All federal agencies are set up to assist land owners and operators with putting conservation on the ground, Sheppard said.

Charlie Copeland, who ranches three miles south of Blackwell, developed a ranch conservation plan on his ranch last week. The plan was developed to treat each acre according to its needs. The plan included such practices as range improvement, protecting crop stubble, seeding of cover crops such as Dixie Wonder Winter peas, rye and vetch, contour farming, controlling of outside water, and construction of level broad base terraces. Personnel of the Soil Conservation service assisted Copeland with the development of the plan.

Ed Cumbie seeded five acres of Hubam sweet clover last week. Cumbie seeded the clover as a soil enriching crop to loosen up the soil on a plot he plans to seed alfalfa this fall. The clover roots will penetrate the subsoil bringing up nutrients to the surface of the soil to be available to the crops grown following the clover. Seeding of native and introduced grasses got under way last week. Preston Davis seeded 15 acres of Blue Panic. James Allen seeded 15 acres of Blue Panic and Bryan Yarbrough seeded 15 acres of the same grass.

Notices Will Be Sent Producers on Acreage Review

Beginning Thursday morning, May 4, 1950, at 10 o'clock, Coke County cotton farmers will be called on to meet with the Marketing Quota Review committee for hearing and determinations of their application for review of 1950 cotton acreage allotments.

Each producer who filed an application for review will be notified by letter of the place and time when he is to appear before the review committee.

Each day there will be about 30 or 40 producers who will be called on to be at the PMA office to meet with the committee. Due to the amount of work the committee will have it will be impossible to have every producer who signed an application for review to appear on one day. There will be about 10 or 15 producers who will be notified to appear at 10 a.m. on May 4 and 20 or 30 to appear at 1 p.m. on May 4. This amount will be called in each day until every application is reviewed.

When the notice is received, it is to the farmer's advantage to be present on the date of the hearing, with evidence to support acres planted in the years 1946, 1947 and 1948.

After a careful study of the first demands of this union, a Presidential Fact Finding Board on May 21, 1943, reported to President Roosevelt that there was no need for an extra fireman on diesel locomotives.

Again, on September 19, 1949, after a second hearing on the union leaders' demands, a second Board reported to President Truman that: "there presently exists no need for an additional fireman... upon either the ground of safety or that of efficiency and economy of operation."

Safety Record of Diesels is Outstandingly Good

Although the railroads accepted the Board findings, the union leaders have brazenly rejected them. They represent that an extra fireman is needed for "safety" reasons. Here's what the Board had to say on that point:

"The safety and on-time performance of diesel electric locomotives operated under current rules have been notably good..."

"Upon careful analysis of the data submitted on safety, we have concluded that no valid reasons have been shown as a support for the Brotherhood proposal under which a fireman would be required to be at all times continuously in the cab of road diesels. The proposal must be rejected."

The real reason behind these demands is that the union leaders are trying to make jobs where there is no work. In other words, a plain case of "feather-bedding."

The railroads have no intention of yielding to these wasteful make-work demands.
