000 bonds for the Veteran's Land Program plus additional appropria tions for increasing the staff of the office to facilitate the handling of oan requests will be urged before Vick of Waco, candidate for lieuter ant governor of Texas.

"This increase in bonds and staff allotments can be handled without a penny cost to the Texas taxpayers, Senator Vick said. "Of the \$25,000, 000 bonds issued last year, \$5,000,000 have already been used, another \$10. 000,000 in bonds have been cashed leaving only a \$10,000,000 surplus with thousands of loan application crowding the loan staff.



age was \$1593.98. The five year period saw a 65 per cent decrease in egg sales, a 34 per cent decrease in sale of dairy products but a 131 per cent increase in sale of cotton. The 1944 average for cotton sales was \$294.60 and the 1949 average 487 per cent decrease was registerthe 1944 average of \$94.45 and the 949 average \$16.25.

On the expense side of the acincreased \$126 with the average Feed expenses increased 19 per cent; farm gas and oil expenses increased 60 per cent; repairs and maintenance costs have increased 63 per cent; automobile upkeep costs have increased 110 per cent and taxes have gone up 84 per cent over the 1944-1949 period.


