### Bronte Outscores Water Valley Nine

Bronte's independent baseball team won their first game Sunday from Water Valley, 13-10, as J. B. Arrott pitched seven innings of 5-hit baseball. He was relieved in the eighth by Bill Simpson who pitched only one inning before turning the mound over to Marvin Corley with the bases loaded. Arrott held up especially well under pressure. Three times he set Water Valley down with the bases loaded. Both Simpson and Corley ran into trouble in the ninth. Water Valley came back for five runs before Corley could put out the fire. However, big Marvo ended the game by striking out Water Valley's most potent hitter with the bases jammed with the tying runs.

Speed and power at the bat also accounted for the Bronte victory. Bill Herron led in the offense by cracking three singles, and walking once. In addition to the above, Hercules Herron also stole six bases and batted in three runs. Judge Sandusky, another Bronte speed demon, stole second, third and barely missed stealing home. Judge also batted in four runs on three clean singles. J. L. Alexander was the only other Bronte player to hit safely more than one time. Alexander parked a high pitch off Shaw, that sailed over the left fielder's head and against the fence for a ground rule two bagger. J. L. also stole two bases and drove in two runs with a single in the sixth inning.

The only other extra base hit was a double by Gerald Sandusky. His hit was the big part of Bronte's insurance rally which was staged in the eighth inning. Bronte scored six runs that inning off six consecutive hits. Card, Percifull, Corley, Miers and Simpson each hit one single to aid the cause of Bronte.

Water Valley's leading hitters were Abbott and Hanson who each had three hits in six attempts at the plate. Davey Jones also hit a home run over the Bronte center fielder with two men on base. Water Valley batted for a team average of .250 while the local boys batted out .359.

Everybody except Arrott was successful in getting at least one safety to help build up the hefty team's batting average. Umpires for the game were B. D. Franklin behind the plate and Roy Wilkins on the base paths.

Next Sunday at 2:30 p.m. Bronte will play the Goodfellow Field Sky-hawks on the local diamond. The Sky-hawks are tough and next Sunday's game should prove to be a thriller.

### Lone Star Gas Company Leases Land For Erection of New Processing Plant

Two acres of land on the Lowry estate, west of Bronte, have been leased by Lone Star Gas company for the erection of a processing plant. The gas firm will use the plant for making gas from the Bronte Field usable.

A gas company official said Wednesday that the plant will be equipped for dehydrization and desulfurization of gas which they obtain from the local wells.

City officials here in Bronte issued a franchise to Lone Star several days ago to operate here. It gives the firm exclusive rights to sell natural gas here and also gives it permission to use the streets and alleys of Bronte for lines.

It was also announced Wednesday that work will begin right away on installing lines here in town. Construction of the main line from the Bronte Field to Lone Star's main line, near Miles, has been completed.

The company has agreed to have the City of Bronte piped and gas ready for use by Sept. 1, 1950. About 190 subscribers were secured, all of whom put up a deposit and agreed to use gas.

An unconfirmed report Wednesday afternoon said that the company has leased office space in town.

Oil activity continued good in this area this week. New locations for wildcats as well as field wells were being made. Some wells were also being completed.

Humble No. 6 Mrs. Nannie Ash was drilling below 3,100 feet in lime and shale. Tool pusher C. E. Earnest of McQueen & Clevenger Drilling company said the drilling had been going good on this field test. It is a west offset to the same operator's No. 5 Ash, a producer.

Union Oil Co. No. 1-B Mrs. Daisy McCutchen was drilling Wednesday at 4,600 feet. Located seven miles west of Bronte south of the Robert Lee highway, this wildcat is being

Ten miles north of Bronte, Leftwich and Maxey No. 1 Charles Copeland this week had drilled to 5,445 feet. This wildcat is west of the proven section of the Fort Chadbourne Field.

Humble completed its thirteenth well in the Fort Chadbourne Field late last week. It was No. 7-B Odum. It flowed naturally 410.47 barrels of 46 gravity oil in 24 hours.

This well is located across the county line in Runtels County. Production was from 5,279 to 5,320 feet and the gas oil ratio was 1,277-1. It was also announced by Humble officials that production during May in the Fort Chadbourne, Winters, Bronte and Jim Adams Fields was 48,461 barrels of oil.

Humble No. 6-B Odum cemented five and one-half inch casing at 5,275 feet in the Odum line. Plans were to drill about 30 more feet after cement hardened.

Humble No. 8-B Odum was drilling around 1,700 feet in shale and shells and No. 9-B Odum was drilling below 4,470 feet in lime.

Fred M. Manning Jr., of Fort Worth has staked his No. 5 S. L. McMay in the northeast part of the Fort Chadbourne Field in northwest Runtels County. Plans call for testing to 6,000 feet if necessary.

Southern Minerals Corp. and Seaboard Oil Co. have applied for a permit to drill a wildcat in southeast Coke County, three and one-half miles southeast of Tenyson.

Spudding in the new wildcat is planned for June 8 and testing will go to a depth of 5,600 feet. The test is to be the No. 1 R. H. Herring, and it will be located 660 feet from the north and west lines of section 121, Washington County Railway Co. survey. It is about a half-mile west of the Coke-Runtels line and one and one-quarter miles north of the Coke-Tom Green line.

Of interest to people in the Robert Lee vicinity is a wildcat which has been staked on the Lem Cowley place, about five miles southeast of Robert Lee. Drilling is scheduled to begin in the near future.

## Rural Telephone Meet Tonight at 8 o'Clock

A meeting has been called for tonight (Friday, June 9) at 8 o'clock for all persons interested in obtaining rural telephone service in Coke County. County Agent Travis B. Hicks said that an out-of-town speaker will be on hand to explain the plan for working out a rural phone cooperative. The meeting will be held in the Aggie Building.

A similar meeting was held in Robert Lee Wednesday night at the court house, but due to the small number

of farmers present from the "east side", the meeting has been called for tonight.

Committeemen appointed for the east side of the county at the Wednesday night meeting were as follows: D. K. Glenn, Bronte; James Arrott, Tenyson; Aubrey Denman, Union; Pete McDonald, Fort Chadbourne; Johnny Copeland, Olga; J. D. Huffaker, Juniper; and J. W. Lahrenske, Hayrick.

A group of about 12 counties in

West Texas have been working together to obtain a loan for the purpose of building and setting up an REA telephone cooperative along the same plans as were used to set up rural electric service.

It is explained by those who will conduct the meeting tonight here in Bronte that if a county survey is made and application sent in before July 1, the request will receive consideration in this year's appropriation. Otherwise, it would be delayed a year, until next year's budget is set up.

It is stressed by leaders in this movement that regardless of whether a farmer or rancher is now getting telephone service, he should attend this meeting. The cooperative would be for everyone who is interested in obtaining good rural telephone service. If a man has already spent his money on a line, and now receives service, he can have his line appraised by the co-op and receive compensation for it, and be a member of the cooperative. The co-op would also aim to reach every person in the county. Cost for service has been estimated to be about \$3.50.

Hicks urged that everybody who would like to see people who live in rural areas have better phone service attend the meeting.

### BRONTE-SAN ANGELO HIGHWAY CLAIMS 2ND VICTIM IN 10 DAYS

L. W. McMahan, truck driver from Houston, was burned to death at 10:45 Monday night when the heavily loaded transport truck he was driving crashed into a bridge on highway 277 about 14 miles south of Bronte. McMahan perished in the flaming wreckage from which he was unable to escape.

The truck, owned by the Monarch Finer Foods Company, and its load of canned goods were completely destroyed by the blaze which lasted until midnight. The truck was headed north and had not overturned, but pieces were scattered over a wide area.

Officers believed Tuesday that the driver apparently fell asleep at the wheel just before the truck left the highway and smashed into the bridge.

Joe Webb, of Tenyson, said that he heard an explosion about 10:45 o'clock from the living room of his home two and one-half miles north of the scene of the accident. He and his brother, Waydell Webb, and two friends arrived a few minutes later. They said that it was evident the driver was beyond aid when they reached the truck.

### MORE RAIN FOR BRONTE

This section of West Texas received more good rains during the last week, making crop prospects good.

Bronte received better than an inch last Sunday night. Robert Lee had .75 inch; Winters had .50; San Angelo received an inch; Abilene had .76; and Tenyson had about the same amount as Bronte.

Farmers were having some trouble with small crops being covered up, but not much complaining was heard, because they were all glad to see the ground soaking up additional moisture.

Even where crops were up, some farmers were planning on re-planting in order to kill the weeds which have come with the large amount of rainfall received this spring and summer.

The county tank truck from the San Angelo Fire Department was called to fight the flames. When the body was rescued from the charred wreckage, investigators were unable to determine the dead man's identity until officials were contacted in Houston. The body was taken to San Angelo in a Johnson Funeral Home ambulance and was later sent to his family home in Houston.

This was the second fatal accident that has occurred between Bronte and San Angelo in the last two weeks. The first was that of Otis Richman, who was killed four miles south of Bronte Thursday night, May 25.

### Coke County Pioneer's Last Rites Held Thurs.

Funeral services were conducted Thursday at 3 p.m. at the Robert Lee Methodist church for Mrs. V. L. Gilbert, 80, Robert Lee hotel and property owner. Mrs. Gilbert died Tuesday night of a heart attack at her home. She was stricken in bed and died upon the arrival of a physician summoned by her husband.

She was born in LaGrange, Tex., Dec. 9, 1869, the daughter of pioneer Brown County settlers.

On June 23, 1887, she was married to Jeff D. Davis at Indian Creek in Brown County. They moved to Coke County three years later, living in a dugout across the Colorado River from Robert Lee.

In 1889, they moved into Robert Lee and built a hotel. Mrs. Gilbert continued to operate the hotel after her first husband's death in 1936.

She was married to Mr. Gilbert in September of last year. Survivors besides her husband are two sisters, both of whom live in Brownwood, and 47 nephews and nieces.

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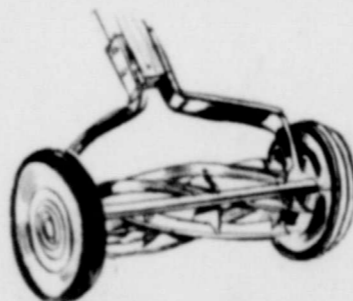
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### "Story Telling" Fabrics In Revival



Originating in the Far East long ago and reaching their artistic peak in France in 1759, toiles or "story telling" fabrics are now having their biggest revival in two hundred years.  
The very first in a series of new "Americana" toiles called "Johnny Applesseed" depicts the well-loved American folk legend of Jonathan Chapman, children's hero who dedicated his life to planting apple orchards throughout the wilderness of the mid-West. It is printed on inexpensive bonded Glosheen, all purpose high count cotton fabric, and designed for the homemaker looking for a fresh approach to Spring redecoration.  
In the early American room setting shown above, the Waverly print is used for two full shirred draperies which match the "Johnny Applesseed" wallpaper. The cherry double bed and barrel boudoir chair are covered with a color-coordinated sister Glosheen print named "Apple Harvest," in vermicelli quilting. Walls are painted to match the apple leaf green of the fabrics; double rust ruffles are of white and red Glosheen.

### Adult Work Shop to Be Held at Blackwell

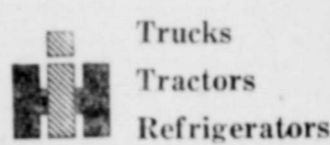

## Give A New Look to Your Old Chairs



New life for this ugly old chair begins with regluing creaky joints and placing chair in clamps to dry. Then put on a pillow case type cover of sturdy fabric.



Next step is anchoring a layer of cotton batting to rough cover. Then pin new fabric to padded chair frame, cut to size and baste with wetting between layers as shown above. Tacking flounce to chair frame, after seat is unscrewed, is shown at left. Ruffle can be made by shirring on machine or crimping in with tacks.

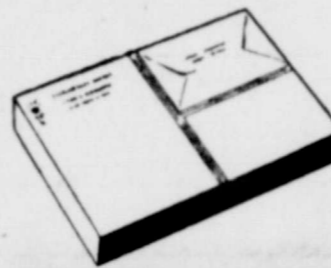

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## TO THE VOTERS OF COKE COUNTY:

The 51st Legislature, Regular Session, 1949, passed S.B. No. 287 which was approved and became effective on March 24, 1949. I quote in part:

"There is hereby appropriated, allocated, transferred, and credited to a fund to be known as the Farm-to-Market Road Fund of the State Highway Department, - - - the sum of \$1,250,000.00 per month. The State Highway Department shall use the funds herein made available for the construction of Farm-to-Market Roads - - - meaning roads in rural areas - - - school bus routes, rural mail routes - - - and just a part of the designated State Highway System. - - - the roads shall preferably serve as public school bus routes or rural free delivery postal routes or both - - - the roads shall be capable of early integration with the previously improved Texas Road System and at least one end should connect with a road already or soon to be improved on the State System of Roads. - - - The funds shall be expended on a system of roads selected by the State Highway Department after consultation with the Commissioners' Courts. The selection shall be made in a manner to insure equitable and judicious distribution of the funds and work among the several counties of the State."

You will please note that there is not one provision in S.B. No. 287 that pertains to the building of State Highways; on the contrary, this law specifically states that no funds authorized by this law may be used on a State Highway.

Therefore, the construction and completion of State Highway No. 158 from Robert Lee to Edith should not have interfered with the Farm-to-Market Road Program for Coke County.

I have made inquiry through the County Judge's Office of Coke County, the State Highway Department and from members of delegations that have attended hearings before the State Highway Commission, as to the status of the Farm-to-Market Road Program for Coke County.

I find that the present County Judge of Coke County entered into an agreement with the State Highway Commission, that if the State Highway Commission would allocate funds for the completion of State Highway No. 158 from Robert Lee to Edith, then Coke County would give up its State Farm-to-Market Road Program for a number of years.

I maintain that the road from Robert Lee to Edith has long been recognized as a designated State Highway and that it would have been completed without the forfeiture of the rights of Coke County to participate in this much needed State Farm-to-Market Road Fund. The County Judge of Coke County could have and should have secured this last section of State Highway No. 158 on its own merits as a State Highway.

For each and every year that this agreement, as made by the present County Judge, remains in force, the school bus routes and rural roads of Coke County will be and are being penalized \$65,000.00 in State Funds through the forfeiture of this Farm-to-Market Road Program. The Road and Bridge Funds of Coke County are being run deeper and deeper into debt in a vain and an unwise attempt to overcome the loss of this Farm-to-Market Road Program.

When a County Judge commits his county to a specific State Highway Program before the State Highway Commission, it is next to the impossible to overcome or change that commitment. The present County Judge of Coke County has made a commitment before the State Highway Commission, forfeiting the rights of Coke County to participate in the State Farm-to-Market Road Program.

If elected, regardless of the commitment or agreement that the present County Judge of Coke County may have made, I will immediately place before the State Highway Commission a Farm-to-Market Road Program for Coke County. I will continuously and unceasingly work to regain the rights of Coke County to participate in this State Farm-to-Market Road Program.

I will sincerely appreciate your careful consideration of my candidacy and your vote.

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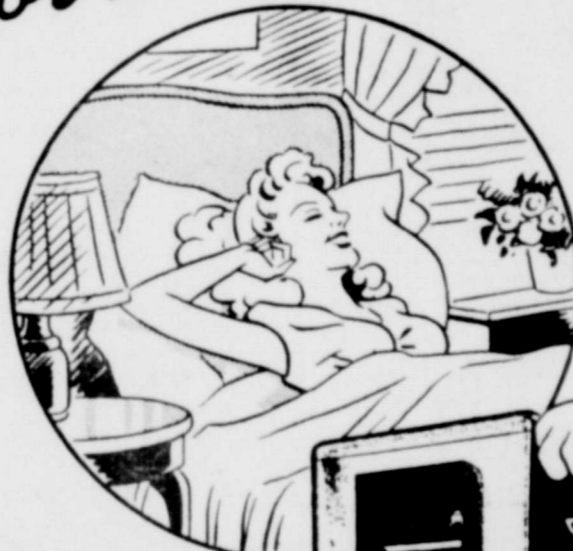

Mesquite Control Discussed by Ag. Dept. Specialist

(Editor's Note: the following letter was received by M. G. Gilreath of Bronte. Mr. Gilreath thought it would probably be of interest to Enterprise readers, and brought it to the newspaper office. We are running it for those who are interested in controlling mesquite.)

Spur, Texas May 16, 1950

Mr. M. G. Gilreath Box 272 Bronte, Texas

Dear Mr. Gilreath:

Your recent inquiry about mesquite control has been referred to me.

Mesquite may be successfully controlled by applying enough oil around the base of the plant to soak down and wet the buds that are present from 3 to 6 inches below the soil surface. This is generally about one quart per tree depending upon the size of tree and the soil type. It facilitates the application of the oil if the top growth is cut off but cutting the top growth is no essential.

We have developed a cheaper and easier method of controlling mesquite by the addition of the ester of 2,4,5-T to the kerosene or diesel oil. This method consists of spraying the cut surface and stumps or if the tree is left standing spraying the lower 12 inches of the trunk with a 0.5 per cent solution of 2,4,5-T in oil.

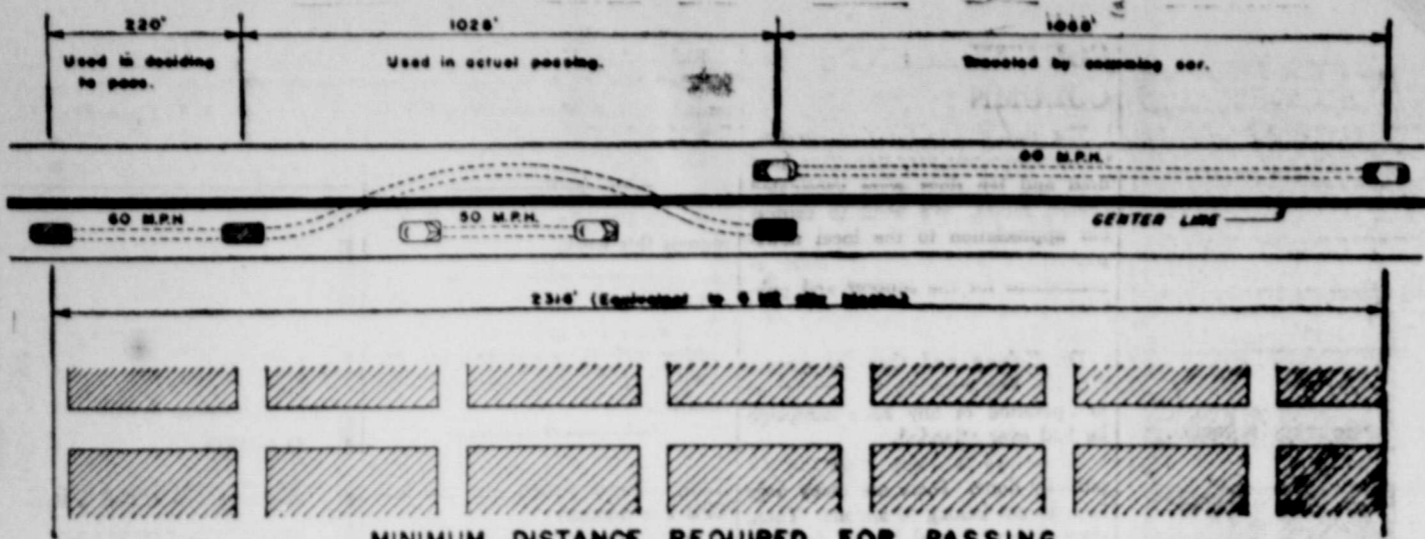
The spraying can be done with a knapsack sprayer and one gallon of solution is sufficient for about 20 trees. Your County Agent will help you mix this solution if you call on him.

35 PERSONS ATTEND TOUR

Thirty-five land owners and businessmen attended a tour to observe the growing of cover crops in the vicinity of Bronte Tuesday afternoon, May 30.

The group observed rye and vetch growing on D. K. Glenn's farm located two miles south of Bronte. Glenn explained, "I seeded this rye and vetch as an experiment trying to find some crop that would control wind erosion. This rye and vetch has controlled wind erosion, and I got a t

of good late winter and early spring grazing."

The group observed second year's growth of Madrid sweet clover on Mrs. C. H. Wilkins' farm just south of Bronte. She explained, "I harvested about one and one-half tons of hay per acre last year and grazed lambs in the fall. I am planning to harvest the seed this summer and to seed more land this fall to Madrid sweet clover."

Just north of Bronte on James Allen's farm, the group observed the growing of Dixie Wonder winter peas, rye, and vetch. Allen explained, "I grazed about 75 head of ewes and two milch cows for six weeks on this 22-acre field. I plan to seed a large acreage of these crops next year."

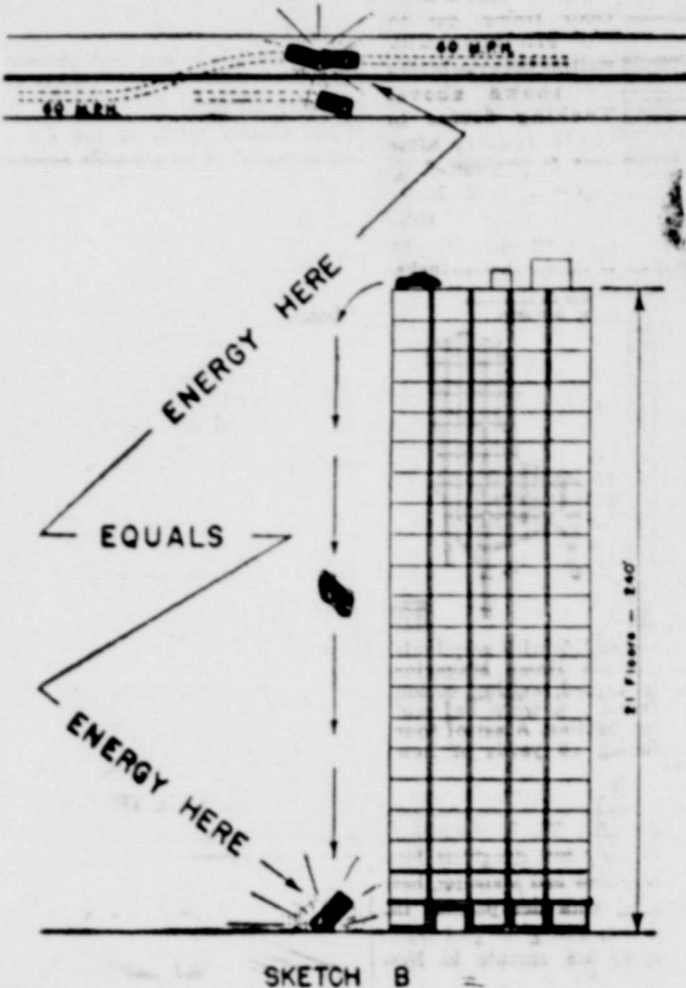
"After observing what we have seen this afternoon and realizing what adverse weather conditions these crops were grown under, the Board of Supervisors believe that cover crops definitely have a place in our conservation farming and ranching," Webb explained. "We are going to make mistakes and learn more about raising these crops as we grow larger acreages."

Plans were developed to conduct a range tour at a later date. The tour will be conducted to study the important range vegetation and explain the importance of vegetative cover in conservation ranching. C. N. Webb has announced.

Cotton farmers can now secure their applications for 1950 Smith-Doxey benefits, according to H. J. Matejowsky, in charge of the Abilene office of the cotton branch, Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Applications are available at gins, County PMA offices, County Agricultural Agents' offices, and at the Abilene cotton classing office, 1407 South First Street. Matejowsky points out that the farmers belonging to organized cotton improvement groups under the Smith-Doxey Act can get their cotton classed by U. S. Department of Agriculture without cost. Also, they can get free market news service. Groups should file their applications for Smith-Doxey benefits as soon as their cotton is planted to make sure that they are approved in plenty of time to get first bales classed. Applications must be filed with the Abilene cotton classing office before the deadline, August 15, 1950.
