Humble Completes Two New Wells in Bronte Territory

Humble Oil & Refining Co. this week completed two producers in the Bronte area, one in the Bronte Field and one in the Fort Chadbourne Field. Both the new wells are in Coke County.

Humble No. 6 Mrs. Nannie Ash flowed 102.9 barrels of 45.1 gravity oil in 24 hours. Production was through a quarter-inch choke from open hole below 4,350 feet. The Palo Pinto pay section was treated with 500 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 448-1 and flowing pressures were 100 pounds on the tubing and 350 pounds on the casing. The well is located 660 feet out of the southwest corner of section 453-1A-11&12C, on the southwest side of the Bronte Field.

The other producer, Humble No. 4 Mrs. Sallie Odum, is a west offset to Barnsdall No. 2 Harris Davenport in the west part of the Fort Chadbourne Field. It flowed 29.4 barrels of oil naturally in four hours to rate a daily potential of 176.4 barrels.

Union WHD Club Meets in Jackson Home

The Union Home Demonstration club met in the home of Mrs. S. O. Jackson Friday, June 23, at 3 p.m. An interesting report was made on the June meeting of the county council.

Mrs. Veremuna Barron, the HD agent, instructed those present on children's clothing. A refreshment plate was served to Mmes. W. J. Gideon, H. Phillips, C. E. Bruton, F. S. Higginbotham, J. R. Johnson, Edna Butler, V. C. Lammers, Barron, two children and the hostess.

Production was through a quarter-inch choke and 64 perforations in five and one-half inch casing casing from 5,286 to 5,298 feet, in the Strawn formation. Gas-oil ratio was 1,703-1 and flowing pressures were 350 bottomhole and shutin pressure after one hour was 775 pounds. Location of the well is 582 feet from the northeast and 2,345 feet from the southeast line of the west 722 acres of Seth Clark survey 475.

Union Oil Co. of California No. 1-B Mrs. Daisy McCutchen was drilling below 6,260 feet in lime and shale Wednesday. It is located west of Bronte on the south side of the Robert Lee highway.

Southern Minerals No. 1 Herring, west-southwest of Tennyson, was drilling this week below 3,000 feet, it was reported.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field in Runnels County, Fred M. Manning, Inc. has staked a 6,000 foot venture. It is No. 6 S. L. McNay. It is to be located 1,320 feet southeast of Manning's No. 5 McNay, a producer.

Humble No. 1 C. C. Cave was drilling the first of the week at 5,270 feet. It is located two miles north of the Fort Chadbourne Field opener. Humble No. 8-B Mrs. Sallie Odum was drilling at 5,245 feet in lime and shale.

Richard King, Jr. has set pipe in his No. 1 Tad Richards at 5,240 feet, the top of the Odum pay for the area. No drillstem test was to be run, a report said, because of the poor condition of mud.

SWEETWATER LETS CONTRACT ON OAK CREEK DAM FOR \$300,000

Contract to build a dam to create a lake on Oak Creek in Coke County was let to Harry Campbell, Fort Worth contractor, Wednesday by the City of Sweetwater.

The proposed dam will be located approximately ten miles northeast of Bronte on the Odum Estate. Much controversy has surrounded the project because of the hot oil play which is now going on in the area.

Campbell's bid on the project was \$300,653.28. This bid covers only construction of the dam itself and does not include the work of clearing and leveling the land or of digging necessary channels.

Work on the proposed reservoir is expected to begin within ten days after signing of contract.

Campbell's bid calls for completing the dam construction within 180 working days. The complete project which Sweetwater has been working on for the past two years, is expected to be completed within 12 months.

Supplemental contracts, such as building oil well mounds, re-locating and raising the railroad dump and filling in of a gap on the project site also went to Campbell. The supplemental contracts are not included in the dam construction bid which the Sweetwater city officials accepted.

Bronte citizens are interested in this project, as Sweetwater has agreed to allow the city to obtain municipal water from the lake. The Upper Colorado River Authority has pledged its assistance in getting a pipeline laid from the city limits to the lake site. Water which will be caught by the dam is said by engineers to be among the purest and best to be found anywhere.

Town Is Sprayed With DDT Solution

Citizens of Bronte were suddenly awakened in the wee hours Sunday morning by what some said sounded like a General Sherman tank. However, it was only a fogging machine giving the city a good dose of DDT.

The machine made its way through the entire town leaving a fog of the solution which gives a 97 per cent kill of all insects within a range of 300 feet. The spray is said to be very effective in keeping down disease germs and, at the same time, is absolutely harmless for human beings to inhale.

Mayor H. O. Whitt said the primary factor in spraying the town was to help prevent another epidemic of polio such as Bronte has already experienced.

SCS Group See Range Grass Grow

W. E. Burns, a member of the Coke County Soil Conservation District board of supervisors, invited a group of his neighbors and the Robert Lee veteran agricultural class to observe the conservation work applied on the Green Mountain watershed and also observe range sites and range vegetation on his ranch located on Paint Creek.

"The group, consisting of about 23 land owners and operators, gathered at the Edith store and observed the conservation practices applied on the watershed. The group saw level broad base terraces with ends partially closed and diversion terraces designed to move the water, and slow down the time of concentration," Burns said.

"The land owners and operators attending the tour observed native and introduced grasses seeded in a waterway on M. B. Wandlowe's farm. The waterway was seeded in May, 1949, to a mixture of K. R. Bluestem, Buffalo, Blue grama, Sand, Weeping and Lehmann Love grasses, and Blue Panic. These grasses have made a wonderful growth. In many places these grasses are three to four feet high and so thick that they offer resistance to walk through," Burns pointed out.

From Green Mountain the conservation group tour was continued by observing gulley stabilization, bottom, upland and hills and ridges range sites.

A. V. Sheppard, work unit conservationist, lead the discussion on the range sites and range vegetation to be found growing on the ranch. Sheppard pointed out to the group the succession of range vegetation. He pointed out the poor vegetation being replaced by good and fair vegetation, and good and fair vegetation being replaced by good and choice vegetation.

Joe George Wilkins has seeded 19 acres of Blue Panic grass. The grass was seeded in rows and various amounts of 45 per cent superphosphate was applied to the new seeding. The grass will be managed to furnish summer grazing. Blue Panic is an introduced grass that is showing good promise as a cultivated grass. The grass is a perennial grass that will furnish early summer grazing.

Foster Price has finished construction of a ranch pond on his lower ranch five miles northwest of Edith. The pond was designed to give better distribution of livestock water. "By having better distribution of livestock water, I can take better care of my range grasses and also prevent trampling of the grass around the watering places; thus, do a better job of preventing soil erosion," Price said.


Three Bronte Students Attend Summer School At Hardin-Simmons

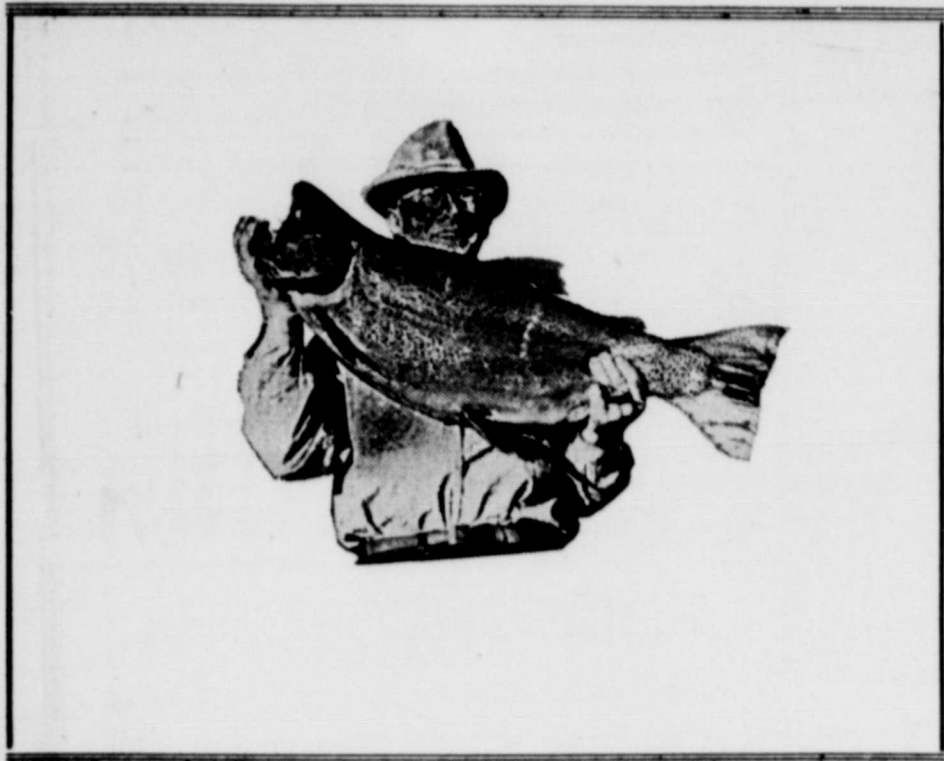

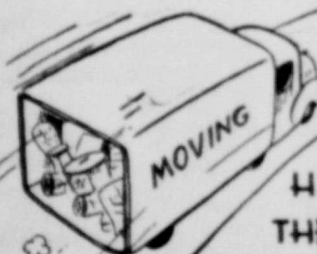

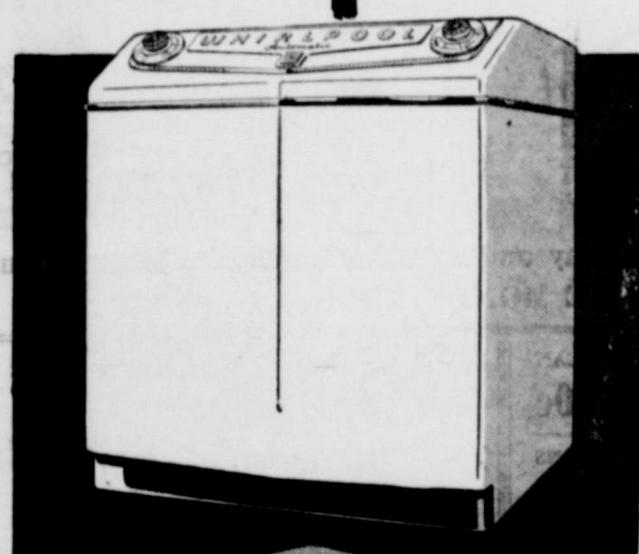

Baked Eggs in Toast Cups



Company variation of an American favorite, bacon and eggs, are these baked eggs in scalloped toast rings. Rashers of bacon, hot coffee, and extra enriched toast with preserves complete the menu.

Best way to wish your family a sunny good morning is with a good breakfast. Favorite foods include golden toast and scrambled eggs. For variation, try baked eggs in toast cups. You'll find the cups attractive and an easy way to serve a crowd or provide a special family breakfast.

They're this easy: drop an egg into each bread cup, then bake in muffin pans. The number of eggs desired are baked all at one time. Slide pans out of the oven and lift cups onto a warm platter for service. While the eggs bake, fry the bacon and make the coffee.

Bread rounds may be cut and buttered the night before and wrapped in wax paper, so that in the morning only a second is needed for breaking the eggs into the cups, adding milk, and putting them into the oven.

You'd want extra toast to serve with the egg cups and bacon. Temptingly lawned toast is an easy way to see that your family gets a good portion of the B-vitamins and iron they need daily. Six one ounce slices of bread per day provide about 1/4 of the daily minimum requirement for iron, even more of the thiamine and niacin needed for pep and all-around good health.

BAKED EGGS IN TOAST CUPS

12 slices enriched bread
Eggs or maximum
8 eggs
2 tablespoons milk
With a scalloped cookie cutter remove center portion from 6 of the slices. Use a smaller cutter to remove center portion from 6 of the slices. Brush each slice with melted butter or margarine. Place plain rounds of bread in bottom of muffin cups and top with a ring of bread. Break egg in center of each ring and add 1 tablespoon milk to each. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Serve with broiled bacon. Makes 6 servings.
