FORMER BRONTE MAN LEADS DRIVE TO RESCUE LOST BATTALION ON KOREAN BATTLE FRONT

Although relatively few Americans are fighting in Korea as yet, and although the United States is not officially at war, the Korean battle has become a personal thing to many, and has already come "close to home" for some Bronte and Coke County citizens.

Already, a Bronte boy, J. W. Athey, now of Dallas, has distinguished himself in the battle. Athey, son of Mrs. Mabel Athey of Dallas, was born and reared in Coke County and attended the Bronte schools. He is a grandson of Mrs. M. A. Scott and has numerous other relatives here. Athey also participated in World War II and was wounded twice while serving in the European theater of war.

A story in the Dallas Morning News this week told of the part Athey played in freeing the American unit which was trapped on the Kum River front.

Believing his many friends and el-

atives here will be interested in the dispatch, which originally came from the International News Service, we are printing the story from from the Dallas paper below.

"A Dallas sergeant commanded one of two tanks which smashed a North Korean road block and freed men in a trapped American unit on the Kum River front, it was reported Monday.

He is Sgt. J. W. Athey, son of Mrs. Mabel Athey, 1215 N. Haskell Ave.

Maj. Gen. William Dean, commander of the 24th Infantry Division, himself led the makeshift relief column which allowed survivors of the trapped 19th Battalion to escape, the International News Service reported.

Two tanks, one commanded by Sgt. Athey, the other by Lt. Roland Richmond, Ft. Riley, Kansas, spearheaded the relief column, which included four half-tracks, four jeeps,

and a truck with less than a platoon of infantrymen.

Gen. Dean's jeep led the way to within a mile of the southern roadblock. Heavy machine-gun fire forced him to halt and send the two tanks ahead, the INS reported.

The general ordered Lt. Richmond and Sgt. Athey to clear the roadblocks, consisting of burning vehicles piled in the road. Red machine-gun fire from 1,000 yards peppered the area.

Six times the tanks charged but they could not break through the flaming barrier.

Concussion grenades shook the tanks but did not stop them. Then wounded men from the trapped unit staggered and crawled around the roadblock. Gen. Dean's four half-tracks were knocked out, so the wounded were loaded aboard the tanks and taken to safety. The tanks made several trips and carried out about 50 men. A wounded colonel of the trapped 19th had one tank left, which he directed through the now-weakened road block. Limping, he led the rest of his outfit to safety.

Gen. Dean declared he was extremely proud of his 24th division men.

Sgt. Athey is a 36th Division veteran of World War II who saw fighting in Italy, France, and Germany, said his mother.

Sgt. Athey, 25, was reared in Bronte, Coke County, where he left high school to enter the army early in World War II.

After the war he came to Dallas, where he was for a time a motorman for the Dallas Railway and Terminal Co.

He re-enlisted last November and was married last January 28. He was sent to Japan in February. His wife, the former Miss Mary K. Kennedy of Dallas, now lives in Denver, Colorado. She had planned to join him in Japan this fall.

Politics was warming up in Coke county this week with the all-important election coming up this Saturday. Little interest has been shown in politics in the county until the last two or three weeks.

In county politics McNeil Wylie and Jeff Dean head the slate, both seeking the office of County Judge. Dean is seeking reelection to his second term.

On the ballot for County and District Clerk are Weldon Fikes and Willis Smith. Smith is the incumbent.

Jeff Blair and Paul Good are seeking election to the post of Coke County Sheriff and Tax Assessor-Collector. Good now holds the office.

Otis Smith and Claude Ditmore, Commissioners from precincts 2 and 4, the Bronte and Tennyson precincts, are unopposed, as is T. R. Harmon, candidate for Commissioner of Precinct 3. Henry Varnadore is opposing J. W. Service for Commissioner of Precinct 1.

A complete sample ballot is being printed elsewhere in the paper.

The election will be held at the city hall in Bronte with D. K. Glenn as the election judge. E. D. Little is the Tennyson election judge; W. D. (Pete) McDonald, judge at Fort Chadbourne and J. W. Labenske at Hayrick. Other election judges in the county are Lem Cowley, Robert Lee, Ralph Garvin, Edith; C. G. Munn, Walnut; Homer Cornelius, Juniper; R. B. Allen, Silver; Eugene Brooks, Lameta; Tom Schooler, Wildcat; R. V. Copeland, Olga; A. M. Counts, Divide; and Horton Devoll at Sanco.

Election results from over the county will be obtained by the Enterprise as soon as they are available and will be posted in front of the Enterprise office Saturday night.

Draft Board 118 to Furnish 32 Men

Tom Green, Irion and Coke counties, which compose Draft Board 118, are being asked for 32 men to be examined in the first draft call, State Selective Service reported last week.

The 32 men will be part of the 4,020 Texans who will take examinations in August to furnish the 1,005 men for the September Texas quota.

Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, told the 137 local boards by mail of their physical examination quotas. These calls should have been delivered early in the week and processing will begin immediately.

The September draft call on a national scale calls for some 20,000 recruits.

Under the present law men between the ages of 18 and 26 must register and be classified by their local draft board, keeping the board informed of any change of address.

Although the law requires every youth must register within five days after reaching his 18th birthday, he cannot be drafted until he is 19.

Because most of the 24 to 25 year old men who are registered are exempted because of prior service, it is expected that the first draft call will have to be taken mostly from the younger men.

Reservists in the organized unit at Bronte were anxiously waiting to see if their unit is going to be called to active duty. Late news bulletins indicate that several such units as well as National Guardsmen, Naval and Marine Reservists may be called for active duty.

Little Labrado Has Trouble With Spanish

Little three-year-old Labrado Dominguez is having some difficulties since his return home from the Warm Springs polio hospital in Gonzales. The little Mexican boy was admitted to the polio hospital before he was a year old and has just recently been returned to his parents.

While in the foundation hospital, the child learned to speak English. Therefore, he does not understand the Spanish which is spoken by most of the Mexicans who live here in Bronte, including his parents.

Labrado is reported to be much improved and his parents and friends in Bronte expressed their thanks to everybody who contributed to them in any way in the two years he was in the hospital and since his return home.

Six Wells Completed In Area Past Few Days

Several wells were completed in the Bronte area the past week, one in the Bronte Field, one seven miles west of town and four in the Fort Chadbourne Field.

Humble No. 7 R. E. Hickman has been completed for a daily potential of 166 barrels of 45.9 gravity oil. It is located in the south part of the Bronte Field. Gas-oil ratio was 360-1. Flowing pressures were 175 pounds on the tubing, 325 on the casing. Production was through a quarter inch choke and from open hole between 4,298 and 4,344 feet. The producing section was acidized with 500 gallons.

Union Oil Co. of California No. 1-B Mrs. Daisy McCutchen has been completed from the Cisco sand, believed to be the Swastika section of the Pennsylvanian, for a daily flow of 179.2 barrels of 42.6 gravity oil. This is a new pay for Coke County.

Production was through a quarter inch choke and flowing tubing pressure was 120 pounds. Gas-oil ratio for the flow, which came from 3,950 to 3,965 feet, was 300-1.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field, Humble No. 1 Wylie-State was completed for a 24 hour flow of 399 barrels of oil. It is a northwest extension to the field. Production was from 5,418-64 feet in the lower Strawn. Gas-oil ratio was 1,200-1. Location is one and three-quarters miles west of the discovery well and one mile north of Humble No. 1-C Odom.

Humble No. 12-B Sallie Odom flowed 389.3 barrels of pipeline oil in 24 hours after being treated with 1,000 gallons of acid. It produced from 5,413-44 feet.

Lester & Duffield and Pair & Piper No. 3 S. L. McNay has been completed in 11 hours for 113.16 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil. This new well is in the northeast part of the Fort Chadbourne Field.

Richards has been completed in 21 hours for a flow of 110.2 barrels of 45 gravity oil. Production was through a 1 1/2 inch tubing choke from open hole from 5,242-82 feet.

In the Bronte Field Humble No. 2-B J. L. Brunson was nearing completion. Wednesday the field well was drilling at 3,700 feet.

Southern Minerals No. 1 R. H. Herring, wildcat southeast of Tennyson, was preparing to test Wednesday from 5,509 to 5,616 feet. Seventy-five feet of slightly gas cut mud was recovered on an earlier test from 5,436 to 5,509 feet.

Deep Rock No. 1 L. E. Cowley, wildcat four and one-half miles southwest of Robert Lee, was also preparing to test from 5,280 to 5,292 feet.

The wildcat on W. S. Evans ranch, northeast of Bronte, was drilling this week at 3,000 feet.

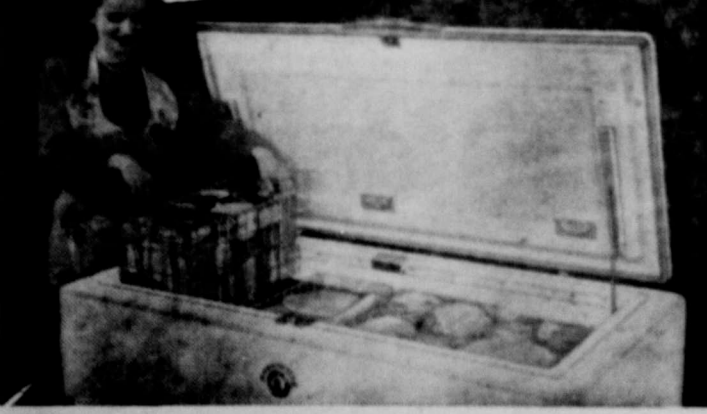

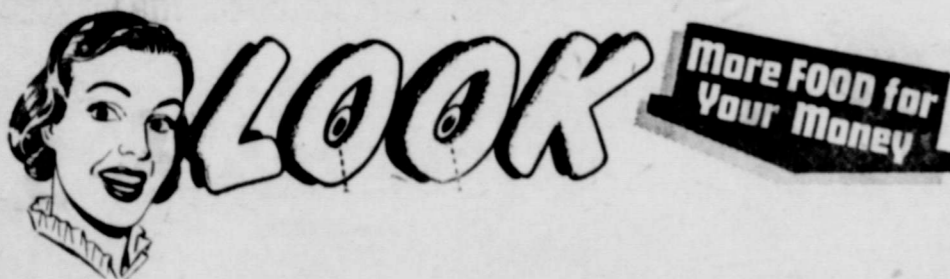

\$10,000.00 more money borrowed last month by Coke County to pay the July, 1950, bills, \$2,000.00 going to the Officers Salary Account and \$8,000.00 going to the Regular Road & Bridge Fund.

The next Tax Money available for Coke County will be the November, 1950, Tax Collection; therefore, Coke County will either have to borrow more money each month for the next five months or go on script, then Coke County will have to start the year 1951 on borrowed money.

For your information and consideration I list the deficits and borrowed money in the funds of Coke County as of July 17, 1950:

A total deficit borrowed money in these three funds in the amount of \$151,827.77 with only \$261.76 to the credit of the Coke County Account and with only \$528.18 to the credit of the Officers Salary Fund on July 17, 1950.

The Budget Law, Article 689-a, R.C.S. provides for a county budget and names the County Judge as the Budget Officer, charging him with the full responsibility of preparing the budget. When the budget has been prepared the Commissioners Court must provide for a public hearing, after this public hearing and after any corrections have been made, the Commissioners Court must then approve the county budget.

After the county budget has been approved by the Commissioners Court, no county funds may be expended except those provided for in the approved county budget. In case of grave public necessity, to meet unusual and unforeseen conditions the Commissioners Court may, by a majority vote, amend the budget from time to time.

I maintain that the present County Judge is directly responsible for the present financial condition of Coke County, for the reason that he has failed to put into force and effect the provisions of the County Budget Law.

I maintain that \$6,050.00 per year is a high and unreasonable salary to pay the County Judge of Coke County. If elected, I will on my own motion, cut the salary of the County Judge of Coke County to \$4,050.00 per year.

I maintain that \$39,814.50 per year is a high and an unreasonable salary schedule for Coke County to pay. If elected, I will recommend a salary schedule that will save the taxpayers of Coke County more than \$10,000.00 per year. If I have as many as two Commissioners to vote with me, this salary schedule will become effective on January 1, 1951.

If elected, regardless of the commitment or agreement that may have been made by the present County Judge, I will immediately place before the State Highway Commission a Farm-to-Market Road Program for Coke County. I will continuously and unceasingly work to regain the rights of Coke County to participate in the State Farm-to-Market Road Program.

If elected, as Chairman of the Commissioners Court, I will advise with and recommend policies to the Commissioners Court that will be to the best interest of all Coke County, a policy that will correct and improve this present financial condition of Coke County.
