Most all of the eastern part of Coke County has been soaked with rains in the past several days. About .80 inch fell late last week and better than an inch fell at Bronte Tuesday night.

The rain Tuesday hit about 6 p.m. and was accompanied by high winds for awhile. Loud claps of thunder and spectacular lightning made up an electrical display for Bronte citizens.

Rain was much heavier north and south of Bronte than it was in town. Judge H. M. Robinson reported receiving a "heavy" rain at his place north of town. Tennyson residents said they received from three to four inches.

### Voters Approve Assumption of Oak Creek Bonds

A very slim turnout approved the assumption of \$574 of Oak Creek school bonds by the Bronte school district, in an election last Monday at the City Hall.

The count was 45 for the bond assumption and none against. The election was made necessary because of an error in the amount of indebtedness assumed in the election last September when Bronte and Oak Creek Schools consolidated. It was necessary to assume the added indebtedness in order to secure approval for the \$20,000 bonds which were voted recently to remodel and repair the local school buildings.

Supt. J. L. Carroll was in Austin this week with the election returns. He hoped to get the matter cleared up so that the repair work can proceed.

The management of the Texas Theatre in Bronte, reported this week that somebody has been doing extensive damage to seats in the local theater.

A piece of the leatherette covering which somebody had taken from one of the seats was brought by The Enterprise office Wednesday. The piece of material had been cut out and the Wojtek brothers, owners of the theater, said that four other seats in the theatre had been damaged beyond repair.

They are offering a \$25 reward for the apprehension and conviction of anyone damaging or defacing their property here.

If a grown person is the guilty party, such action is absolutely inexcusable and it's hard to find words to describe them.

The Texas Theatre here is far above average as a place of entertainment for a town the size of Bronte. Everyone who patronizes it should realize that a great deal of money is invested in the building and fixtures. Why not show a little appreciation for this place of entertainment instead of the discourtesy which has been shown?

Entries were coming in at a rapid clip this week as the deadline approached for West Texas youngsters to sign up for the Bronte Kid Rodeo which will be held this weekend.

Dates for the rodeo are Friday and Saturday, August 4 and 5. The rodeo itself will begin each day at 6 p.m. and the parade will begin about one hour earlier, according to Rodeo Manager C. E. Arrott. Deadline for entering the events was Thursday, August 3.

This year, the rodeo will be in two divisions—one for boys and girls still in school and one for those out of school. There will be no entrance fee for the school children and an entrance fee of \$2.50 will be charged those boys and girls above school

## 4 New Locations Made

Another producer has been gauged in the Bronte Field for a daily flow of 86.55 barrels of 46.1 gravity oil plus 2-10 per cent water.

Production was through a quarter inch choke and open hole between 4,330 and 4,372 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 411-1. The hole was treated with 500 gallons of acid. Location is 660 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of an 88-acre tract in C&MRR survey 5. It is 1,216 feet from Humble No. 1-B Brunson, a producer.

Humble No. 2 Brunson, which is a south offset to No. 1-B Brunson, was drilling Wednesday at 2,450 feet in shale and lime. Surface casing was set at 615 feet.

The rig was up and drilling was underway this week on Union Oil Co. No. 2 Jim McCutchen, west offset to the same company's No. 1-B Daisy McCutchen, recent new discovery seven miles west of Bronte.

American Republics has staked location for a south offset to the No. 1-B McCutchen. The test will be No. 1 Daisy McCutchen. It will be

1,980 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of section 445-1A-H&TC.

The Texas Railroad Commission has set August 16 for a hearing of Union's application for a new field designation and discovery allowable.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field, northeast of Bronte, Fred M. Manning No. 6 S. L. McNay has been completed for a 24 hour flow of 432 barrels of 42 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 951-1.

Humble has completed its No. 14-B Sallie Odum for a 24 hour flow of 439.61 barrels of 44.5 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,015-1.

In the Coke County sector of the field, Sunray has announced that it will drill No. 4 Harris Davenport.

Humble No. 18-B Sallie Odum has also been staked. It will be 2,927 feet from the north and 644 feet from the east lines of J. A. Davenport survey 544. It will be 1,325 feet south of No. 12-B Odum, a producer.

Fred M. Manning No. 8 S. L. McNay will be 1,980 feet from the

southeasterly and southwesterly lines of Maria C. Zaniga survey 298. Location is 1,320 feet from the same operator's producer, No. 4 McNay.

Humble has started work on its 8-inch pipe line from the Ballinger pump station to the "C" lease in the Fort Chadbourne Field. End of the 8-inch line will be in the south part of the field in Runnels County. The main line will be about 30 miles long. Twelve more miles of 4-inch line will extend over the field and into the Coke County section of it. Oil coming from the field is now being trucked out.

Ellenburger production was indicated this week in Nolan county west and slightly north of Blackwell. On a drillstem test from 7,117 to 7,132 feet, 900 feet of clean 46.6 gravity oil and 240 feet of oil and gas cut mud was recovered in Sun Oil Co. No. 1 J. Price Maddox. The new discovery is seven miles south and three miles west of Maryneal. It is 3 1/2 miles north of the Arledge (Marble Falls) Field in northern Coke County.

The rodeo will be staged two days this year and both performances will be at the Bronte Ball Park.

Anyone who wants to buy tickets to the rodeo should contact some member of the Bronte Lions Club. All the local Lions are busy selling tickets. Admission prices are 75 cents for adults and 35 cents for children under 12 years of age.

Arrott stressed the fact that the rodeo is open to all kids all over West Texas and that young entrants from neighboring towns are particularly invited to participate in the various events.

The rodeo is being sponsored by the Bronte Lions Club and the Bronte Athletic Association. Proceeds, after expenses are paid, will be used to improve the local ball park.

### Town To Need Spraying With DDT After Rain

Bronte is going to be needing another good spraying with DDT since the recent rains, city officials said this week. The city was thoroughly sprayed with the insect-killing solution several weeks ago and most persons say that they believe it helped immeasurably in killing flies, mosquitoes and other pests.

Mayor H. O. Whitt said this week that total cost of the first spraying was \$203.75. Monroe McCutchen collected \$308.50 to be used to defray the expenses. Of this amount \$101.54 is still on hand in either cash or materials which can be used. In other words, Whitt said, about another \$100 is needed to pay the cost of spraying the city again.

Whitt said that he would like to see the town sprayed and that he hoped some group would take it on themselves to raise the additional money needed.

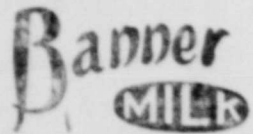

**The Earliest Coke County Settler**

For about three years the writer has been trying to find the earliest Coke County settler now living, and this is the fourth announcement that such party had been found; on each occasion it seemed that the question was settled and, on each occasion another pioneer has been found with earlier claims. Now, we come forward with Mrs. Sallie Fancher of Bronte, formerly Sallie Montiehl.

Mrs. Fancher was born at Thrifty in Brown County on January 16, 1863. She settled with her family on Oak Creek below old Fort Chadbourne just inside of the present line of Coke County in 1876. She married Henry P. Fancher in 1883. She is the mother of nine children, six of whom are still living. Since Mr. Fancher's death about 12 years ago, she has made her home with her children and is at present with her daughter, Mrs. Iva Richards at Bronte.

Mrs. Fancher remembers the Indians making raids on almost every moonlight night in Brown County. At one time she counted 12 warriors as they rode past her house. She remembers a raid on a farm of one of her neighbors and the killing of a little baby and the burning up of a little girl whose body was later found hanging to a tree. (The girl from the mother's side-saddle was used for a rope.)

She says that when she moved to Coke County, however, the Indian raids were about over. The late Garland Odum, with his new bride, Sallie, moved into the old Fort on Oak Creek. She saw the first schoolhouse built in Coke County (it was built at Rock Springs). She saw the country settled up and fenced up and remembers the buffalo-skinners and the days of the antelope. She was a neighbor and friend of all the old-timers as they came into the County and lived here.

Mrs. Fancher has been a member of the Methodist Church for 63 years. Her story is a panorama of history of this country from the days of Indians, buffalo and open range, the settlement and the change to an oil country; and, how wonderful it is. It is certainly an inspiration to listen to this beautiful and serene old pioneer relate facts which made up the lives of the old settlers. One cannot help but believe that women such as Mrs. Fancher are of a special quality. They came through the hardships and dangers of the early days, and not only kept a purity and nobleness which is out of this world, but, they found time to impart a part of their excellent personality to the civilization which they brought into being.

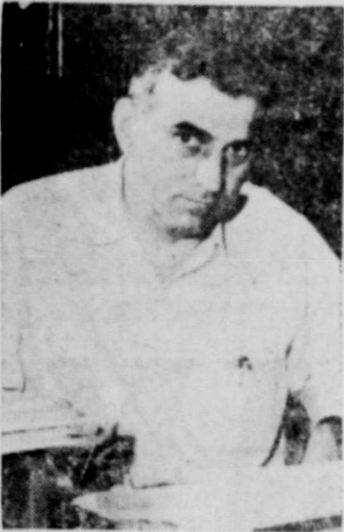

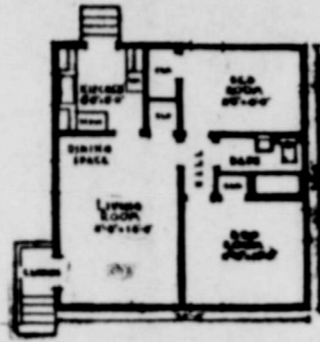
