Pruitt Wildcat Makes Showing; 2-B McCutchen Flows on Test

Oil news was good in the Bronte vicinity again this week. A wildcat, Humble No. 1 Noah Pruitt, recovered oil on a drillstem test. Union No. 2-B McCutchen, offset to a producer, flowed on a drillstem test. Lion Oil Co. No. 1 Runie Waldrop was nearing what was hoped to be a pay section.

A drillstem test was run early Tuesday on the wildcat Humble No. 1 Noah Pruitt. Recovery was 480 feet of oil and oil cut mud and 222 feet of salt water. Section tested was from 4,374 to 4,414 feet, the Palo Pinto section. Gas came to the surface in 28 minutes. Operator was drilling ahead after the drillstem test, and Wednesday, had reached a depth of 4,560 feet in lime and shale.

Union Oil Co. No. 2-B Daisy McCutchen apparently is going to make a better producer than No. 1-B McCutchen, the Cisco sand McCutchen field opener. On a drillstem test Wednesday morning gas came to the surface in three minutes and oil flowed in ten minutes. Section tested was from 3,958 to 3,980 feet. It was estimated by observers that the well flowed at the rate of 25 to 50 barrels per hour.

Lion Oil Co. No. 1 Runie Waldrop, wildcat near the Hayrick community, northwest of Bronte, was drilling Wednesday morning at 4,030 feet. Operator was expecting to drill into the Cisco sand section any time, where it was hoped pay would be found.

In the Bronte Field, it was expected that a rig would be moved in to drill Hickok & Reynolds No. 1 McQueen-Forman in the near future.

Northeast of town, in the Fort Chadbourne Field, Humble No. 1 Wiley-Bolin flowed an estimated 30 barrels of oil per hour on a drillstem test from 5,387 to 5,404 feet in the Gray sand. It is projected in the Odum section of the Strawn. Some salt water was also recovered on the test.

Humble No. 1 Odom-State was swabbing to test the Ellenburger early this week. Production was coming from 5,690 to 5,700 feet. No results had been announced Wednesday.

Sunray has staked location for their No. 5 Harris Davenport in the west part of the Fort Chadbourne Field. Sunray company recently bought the interest of Barnsdall Oil Co. in the Fort Chadbourne area.

Fort Chadbourne Field two producers completed in the last week. E. A. Poe and T. W. Murray No. 4 Odom flowed 550 barrels of 46 gravity oil in 24 hours. Gas-oil ratio was 1,100 to 1.

Fred M. Manning No. 8 S. L. McNay has been finished for a daily flow of 240 barrels of 40 gravity oil.

Humble started oil to running through a new 8-inch pipeline this week from the Fort Chadbourne Field to their pump station at Ballinger. The line terminates at the Odom "C"

lease in the south part of the field. It was also announced that a 7 1/2 mile extension to the line would be started between October 1 and 10. This extension would take the big line to a point near the No. 1 Wiley-Bolin well in the Coke County part of the field.

Forty-five wells have been completed in the field. They have a daily allowable of 5,035 barrels per day. The line from the field to the Ballinger station will carry about twice that amount of oil.

EIGHT RESERVISTS FROM BRONTE REPORT FOR DUTY AT FORT SAM

Eight reservists of this area, four of them from Bronte, left here Tuesday morning, Sept. 5 at 4:45 for Fort Sam Houston at San Antonio. This reserve unit was organized last March and is a part of the Army Quartermaster Corps. It is attached to Fort Sam Houston at San Antonio.

Those who were included in the call were: Dwain Pruitt, Francis Pruitt, Bon Spoons, Wayne Rogers, Frank Dean Bryan, Oliver Johnson, Jarvis Moragne and Carson Easterley.

The group left Bronte on the 4:45 bus and traveled to San Angelo where they transferred to a train which took them to Fort Sam Houston at San Antonio.

All of the men from Bronte are married and have families. Dwain Pruitt has been co-owner of the Humble Service station in Bronte. He has

one child, Francis, who has been associated with Pruitt's store here, has two children. Bon Spoons, owner of the Cosden station and wholesale business here, has two children, Frank Bryan, who has been operating a grocery store in Robert Lee, is married and has one child, Oliver Johnson, who farmed near Blackwell, is not married. Jarvis Moragne, who has been in the insurance business, is married and has two children. Carson Easterley recently transferred to the Bronte unit from Winters.

The unit has been on active duty since September 4, but did not report at San Antonio until Sept. 5. All of the men in the group are veterans of World War II.

3 AUTO ACCIDENTS IN BRONTE VICINITY DURING THE PAST WEEK

The vicinity of Bronte has been the scene of three automobile accidents during the past week. Two of the wrecks occurred in the city limits and the other was between town and the river bridge.

Most serious of the three accidents happened Tuesday night about midnight when a 1950 Mercury driven by Mrs. Myrtle Frances Nowlin, of Dublin, overturned just north of Jones Grocery and Cafe on Highway 277. The car was headed south when the accident occurred.

Mrs. Nowlin and Mrs. Maude Wylie of Sweetwater were in a San Angelo hospital recovering from injuries. They were carried to San Angelo by a Clift ambulance. Apparently the new car collided with guard posts along the highway before turning over. Damage to the car was estimated at \$2,000. There were other occupants in the car but none was

injured seriously enough to require hospitalization.

No details were learned concerning an accident which occurred Friday night of last week, when a late model Chevrolet collided with a switching freight train at the crossing on Main street. One report said the driver of the car was from Odessa.

Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Arrott were the victims of the third accident here this week. They were driving toward Bronte from their ranch south of here when their pickup turned over this side of the Colorado River bridge. Neither of the Arrotts was injured and damage to the pickup was light.

RAINS SOAK BRONTE AREA DURING WEEK

Bronte had an inch of rain during this week when showers fell Sunday and Monday in this vicinity.

Considerably more rain fell during the week at surrounding places. C. N. Webb reported 2.85 inches of rain on his place south of here. A total of 2.5 inches fell on Earl Box's place about nine miles north of Bronte. C. E. Arrott reported over two inches of rainfall at his ranch and Jess Percifull said he received one and one-half inches on his farm west of town.

Winters received a cloud burst of more than six inches, and eight inches was received between Winters and Norton.

First meetings of teachers will be Friday and Saturday, Sept. 8 and 9. Registration of students will be on Monday, if plans work out and classes will begin immediately after registration.
