Natural Gas Turned into Mains At Ceremony Last Thursday

Natural gas flowed through the mains of Bronte for the first time last Thursday when E. L. Buelow, San Angelo division manager of Lone Star Gas Company, opened the valve leading to the recently completed pipeline system.

Gas for the town is being supplied through the company's main line which comes from Miles and from three gas wells in the Bronte Field, west of town.

All city officials except Joe George Wilkins, who was unable to attend, and other local citizens were present for the ceremony which took place Thursday morning. Lone Star officials who were present included Buelow, J. R. Nelson, manager of the Miles, Rowena and Bronte division of the company, J. P. Parish, pressure manager, and Will Wood, land agent.

A few homes here have already been using gas and others are piping their places this week. Pipe and fittings dealers here report that they have had a brisk business on the merchandise. Several firms are busy doing the work for Bronte homeowners. One hundred and seventy-eight persons signed up to use the gas.

Large quantities of gas have been found in the Bronte Field, from which part of the town's supply will be

Atlas Sand and Gravel Plant, located on the Colorado River, southwest of Bronte, will be reopened within the next few days, according to Cecil Barnes, plant owner.

The plant will be under new management, both here and at the sales office in San Angelo. New machinery is also expected to arrive before the plant is opened.

B. A. Lightfoot, formerly of Abilene, is manager of the new plant. The sand and gravel works is located on the Johnson place about four miles from here.

WYLIE BULLDOGS POUND OUT 24-6 DECISION OVER LONGHORN TEAM

The Wylie Bulldogs pounded the Bronte Longhorns 24-6 last Friday night at Wylie. It was the football lidlifter for both schools. Not only did the Longhorns lose the game but they also lost the services of Big Bobby Clark for the remainder of the season. Clark suffered a broken foot in the first half of the game. However, not complaining, Clark played the second half also. He spent two days in the hospital due to this injury and his foot is now in a cast.

Despite the heavy Bulldogs' conquest of the Longhorns, Bronte's Gerald Sandusky stood out as "big college" material both offensively and defensively. Besides bucking the big Wylie forward wall for an average of five yards per try, Jarring Gerald was also the game's defensive demon. Backing a leaky Longhorn line, Sandusky cut down the Wylie ball carriers with many bone-crushing tackles. Marlin McCutchen, the other line-backer, also turned in very fine defensive work. Billy Paul Thomason and Bobby Lasswell turned in good defensive jobs up front. Bobby Joe Clark, although a first year boy, did a satisfactory job with Wylie's muscle man, a 220 lb. well experienced tackle.

McCutchen and Sandusky put on a good offensive blocking show. McCutchen really nailed several that would make a pretty picture for any scrapbook. J. Lee Ensor, another first year boy, played a fine game at end and bagged a pass from McCutchen that netted eight yards. McCutchen

demonstrated that he will be potent as a passer if the line can hold a little better. His tosses to Ensor and Sandusky and one aerial from Sandusky to McCutchen netted the Longhorns 104 yards in the air.

Wylie drove to their first touchdown early in the second quarter with T. R. Baack scoring from the one-yard line. Bronte came right back to knot the count at 6-6 as McCutchen climaxed a drive with an aerial to Sandusky that netted 20 yards. Sandusky did some fine brokenfield running on this play. In the third stanza Wylie went ahead 12 to 6. T. R. Baack crossed over from the four-yard line. Early in the fourth, Baack scampered 35 yards for another six points. Gerald Farr completed the Wylie scoring with a 14-yard scoring play. First downs favored Wylie 14 to 5.

Gob Franklin, playing offensive center almost entirely, had a perfect night at firing the ball back. Not once did a bad center lose ground for the Longhorns. Evans, Scott, Latham, Caudle, Brown and all the light and inexperienced linemen fought their hearts out against the strong Wylie eleven. Billy Jack Gentry and Lyndon Waldrop, both sophomores, show promise in the backfield. All of the boys show promise for the future as the entire squad will be back next year with the exception of Captain Gerald Sandusky. J. O. Bagwell, Norris Crowner, Donald Kaiser, and Dwain Bagwell will be added to the squad next year. These four are ineligible this year due to the transfer rule.

John Rusk, one of Bronte's better linemen, suffered an ankle injury in the first quarter and was out the rest of the game. However, Rusk will be ready to go against the Robert Lee aggregation tonight.

The Bronte Longhorns and Robert Lee Steers, who play two games each year, tee off here tonight in their first one at 8:00 o'clock. The Longhorns with "Big" Clark out of the lineup would have to be rated "underdogs" to their visitors.

While the Longhorns were succumbing to Wylie 24-6, Robert Lee was racking Sonora 13-6. Elsewhere in District 6-B, defending champion Hermleigh who is not expected to repeat lost a 19 to 0 verdict to New Deal.

The Longhorns, who won only three games last year, would like to better their record this year and hope to break into the win column tonight against their old rivals, the Robert Lee Steers.

339 Students Enrolled In Schools This Year

Classes were going at full speed in the Bronte Schools this week after much delay in getting started, due to repairs which were being made on the buildings. Three hundred and thirty-nine students enrolled at the

beginning of this school term. Of this number, 74 were in high school and 225 were enrolled in the grade school.

Supt. J. L. Carroll said Wednesday that about one more week would be required to complete the repairs on the buildings, but that the work would not keep school from going ahead.

Another date has been tentatively

set for the open assembly. The assembly will be Monday, September 25, providing repair work is near enough completed, Carroll said.

A reception has been scheduled for Tuesday night, September 26, by the Parent-Teacher Association. Honored guests will be teachers in the local schools. All school patrons are invited to be present and meet the teachers and inspect the newly remodeled building.

Supt. Carroll said that he wanted to thank the voters of this school district for making possible the repair work which has been done. "I feel sure that both teachers and students will be able to do better work than they would have done if the buildings had not been repaired," he said.

The school system is employing 16 teachers this year and several new courses have been added to the curriculum.

River Bridge at Robert Lee Open After Repairs

The bridge over the Colorado River south of Robert Lee was reopened to traffic Wednesday after having been closed for several weeks for repairs.

Traffic from Robert Lee to San Angelo has been detoured by way of Bronte while the bridge was out of order. The old bridge which had become dangerous for heavy traffic is being repaired by Wesley Hall of Brownwood. He is refooring, reconditioning, strengthening and painting the structure for a total cost of \$7,235.64.

There was no ceremony at the bridge opening as highway workmen removed the bars and discontinued the low water crossing which had been in use.

Humble No. 1 Noah Pruitt, wildcat northeast of Bronte, had reached a total depth of 5,530 feet in the Ellenburger with no shows. Numerous drillstem tests have been run on the wildcat, which is located 2½ miles from Bronte, but no production has been indicated. A slight show was encountered in the Palo Pinto, but no announcement has been made of the operator's plans for plugging back to it.

Humble No. 1 Schuch, wildcat in south-central Coke, was drilling this week at 3,518 feet. Lion No. 1 Runie Waldrop, wildcat near Hayrick, had reached a depth of 5,380 feet and was fishing for tools.

Humble No. 1 Wiley-Bolin, newly completed producer in the Coke County sector of the Fort Chadbourne field, has been completed for a 24-hour flow of 153.56 barrels of 46.9 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,350-1. Production was from the Fry sand from a perforated section at 5,390 to 5,402 feet.

No. 1 Wiley-Bolin is located 222 feet from the southeast and 616 feet from the northeast lines of W. R. Reed survey. It is a west offset to Sunray No. 2 Harris Davenport and

a southeast offset to Humble No. 4 Sallie Odom, both producers.

Humble No. 1 Odom-State swabbed 36.64 barrels of oil and 46.52 barrels of water in 12 hours. It was continuing testing from 5,700-06 feet in the Ellenburger. It was treated with 500 gallons of mud acid.

In the Runnels County part of the Fort Chadbourne Field, Humble has completed No. 20-B Sallie Odom for a daily flow of 358.48 barrels of 43.9 gravity oil. The gauge was taken through a quarter-inch choke from perforations from 5,286 to 5,328 feet.

Fred M. Manning No. 9 S. L. McNay has been finished for 208 barrels of 46 gravity oil in 24 hours. Production was from 5,360-96 feet. Manning No. 11 McNay has been located 4,670 feet from the southwesterly and 660 feet from the southeasterly line of M. C. Zuniga survey 298. It is projected to 6,000 feet with rotary.

George W. Strake No. 1 Elo Michaels, south outpost to the Fort Chadbourne Field, recovered 12 feet of mud on a drillstem test from 5,046-60 feet. Drilling was being continued. Strake No. 1 Stultfield, located in the southwestern part of the field, was drilling at 1,450 feet in lime and shale.

Progress Is Shown by Conservation Practices

Farmers and ranchers cooperating with the 148 operating soil conservation districts of Texas applied major conservation practices to 3,947-

319 acres in the fiscal year ending June 30. The year's work brought the accumulated total to 17,713,089 acres. Soil Conservation Districts cover 89 per cent of Texas.

The planting of cover crops to protect and enrich the soil totalled \$15,901 acres, an increase of almost 34 per cent over the total of 609,948 acres in the previous year. This increase showed up largely in the Plains area where farmers planted extensive acreages to grain sorghums and sudan grass to overcome a serious wind erosion threat.

There were increases in the planting of cover crops in other parts of Texas where wind erosion was a threat, especially the sandy areas around Dublin, DeLeon, Jacksboro and Vernon.

Contour farming increased five per cent to 710,310 acres. Improvement of range was another major practice that received much attention, total

for the year being 2,584,060 acres, a gain of 83 per cent over the 1949 total. Pasture improvement was up six per cent to 227,911 acres. Seeding pasture land to good forage grasses and legumes totalled 211,681 acres, an increase of 49 per cent.

The same number of farm and ranch ponds was built each year, 2,983. Building of terraces also was almost the same each year, the 20,731 miles in 1950 comparing with 20,668 the year before. Field diversions that carry water safely around cropland totalled 1,096 miles, a gain of almost 25 per cent.


