## Youth Problem Cited by Mayor

Mayor H. O. Whitt said this week that the problem of local youths roaming the streets of Bronte at night has reached the point where something must be done about it.

City officials are seeking the cooperation of parents of the children in keeping them off the streets after 10 p.m. unless they are with parents.

Whitt said that he hopes the problem will be taken care of by parents, so that city officials will not be forced to pass ordinances making the offense punishable by law.

Several cases of minor misdemeanors, such as petty thefts, have been reported in the last few weeks and citizens have asked that the city council do something to get all children

of 14 years of age or younger off the streets late at night.

"We are primarily interested in the welfare of the children when we request that they be under a parent's care after 10 o'clock at night," the mayor stressed. "If they are allowed to roam the streets, unfortunate things can occur and we would rather these things didn't happen in Bronte."

## Funeral Services Held Wednesday For Mrs. Roberts

Funeral services for Mrs. Agnes Roberts, 23, of Ballinger were held at Fort Chadbourne Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. Roberts died as a result of an automobile accident Monday night north of Robert Lee.

Mrs. Roberts was born at Fort Chadbourne on Feb. 27, 1927. She died Sept. 25 at Robert Lee.

She is survived by two children, Margie Darline, age 6, and James Eugene, age 5; four brothers, Roy Lee of Phoenix, Ariz., Albert of Nosh, Mo., Delco of Big Spring and T. H., who is serving in the armed forces; seven sisters, Mrs. Lillie May Bradshaw, California, Mrs. Lorene Smith of Junction, Mrs. Elena Chapman of Brownwood, Mrs. Elizabeth Bramblett of Ballinger, Mrs. Opal Barker of Junction, Mrs. Ruby Fae Dunn of California, and Miss Alice Inez of Ballinger.

## Lions to Provide Rides for Players

## Rules Announced For Annual Wool Mohair Contest

Rules and regulations for the fourth annual "Make It Yourself with Wool" contest were announced this week. The annual contest is sponsored by the Auxiliary of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and the Wool Bureau. In general, the contest is open to girls between the ages of 14 and 22 years of age and is divided into three classes—the junior, senior and original design classes.

Garments entered must be classified as a suit, dress or coat. The garments must be made for the contest and must not be worn prior to the state contests. The garments must be made of 100 per cent virgin wool or 50 per cent wool and 50 per cent mohair. A girl may enter as many as four different classifications in area contests but only one of the garments may be entered in the state and national contests.

Each contestant must fill out and mail the state and national entry blanks to be found in the wool bureau brochure and the area entry blank may be secured from the home demonstration agent, homemaking teachers or the area chairman, Mrs. William B. Wilson of San Angelo. More information on the contest regulations may also be secured from the above sources.

## Foundation Poured Wednesday for New First Baptist Church at Bronte

The foundation for the new Baptist Church here in Bronte was poured Wednesday afternoon and construction is to begin on the building itself just as soon as possible.

Rev. V. D. Price, pastor of the church, said that the ditches for the foundation were ready at noon Wednesday and that work will proceed just as rapidly as possible.

The new structure is estimated to

cost about \$30,000. It will house an auditorium 36 by 59 feet and a two-story education building 36 by 70 feet. The building will be L-shaped. The auditorium will seat about 400 persons.

The church is buying the materials for the new building and hiring the work done, rather than contracting it. Some voluntary labor by the members will be used, also, cutting the construction costs.

Dewey Horton, architect employed by the Texas Baptist association, drew the plans for the church.

While the new building is under construction, services will be held in the tabernacle, north of the building site.

## ROBERT LEE STEERS SMOTHER LONGHORNS FRIDAY NIGHT, 33-0

In last Friday night's fray, Bronte went down to the Robert Lee Steers by a score of 33-0. The score, itself, is an injustice to the game since the "breaks" in the game belonged to Robert Lee. A fumble on the 11 yard line and four intercepted passes were among the Steers' good fortunes.

Bronte took the opening kickoff, Sandusky reeled off 20 yards around right end, McCutchen picked up 2 and 8 yards to net another first down. Then Ronnie Baker intercepted a pass by the Longhorns to halt the drive. The Steers then started a goalward march, with Bronte's Jay Lee Ensor intercepting a pass to halt the drive, after the Steers had made four first downs.

The Steers took over again after a punt and drove 45 yards to pay dirt with Donald Hamilton scoring from 17 yards out. Donnie Duncan placekicked the point. Sandusky returned the kickoff to the 37, then hit McCutchen with a flat-zone pass that netted 42 yards, McCutchen traveling most of this distance on foot. Then Gerald picked up 6 and 8 yards. Mr. two tries for a first down on the Steer 11. McCutchen let the ball slip through his hands, bound off his shoulder pad and was recovered by a Robert Lee lineman.

After an exchange of punts the Steers scored again. Donnie Duncan clinaxed a 68 yard drive with a quarterback sneak from the 1 yard line.

The first play from scrimmage after the second half began netted the Steers touchdown number 3. It was a three-lateral play, Duncan to Baker to Hamilton that traveled 75 yards.

After receiving the kickoff following the Steer score, the Longhorns could not move and were forced to punt. Robert Lee then marched 66 yards to another tally, Hamilton doing the scoring from the 12 yard line on this one. Duncan's quarterback sneak netted the extra point.

The Steers clinaxed the scoring on a 58 yard drive. Ronnie Baker went over from the 1 yard line. Bobby Hood walked untouched for the extra point.

## FRIENDS "KEEP THINGS GOING" WHILE ED RATLIFF IN HOSPITAL

Neighbors and friends of Ed Ratliff did a wonderful job of running his ranch while he was in the hospital here the past four weeks. "They gathered eggs, sowed oats, doctored sheep and everything there was to be done," Mrs. Ratliff said Wednesday.

Ratliff, who underwent major surgery September 1, was scheduled to be dismissed from the Karen-Gay hospital Thursday. Mrs. Ratliff said that she sincerely believed that the kind words and wishes of their many friends helped her husband pull through his critical illness. She said that she wanted to thank everybody who did anything to assist them while Mr. Ratliff was ill.

She said they were particularly grateful to Dr. John R. Harris and the entire staff of the hospital for the care which has been given him.

"One of our neighbors loaded our cow and a pig up and took them over

to his place to look after them while Ed was sick," she said. "They gathered the eggs, crated them, took them to town and sold them, and turned the money over to me."

During Mr. Ratliff's illness, neighbors also gathered and sowed his oat fields for him. One young neighbor, Bobby Duncan, waited all day for one of the older hands to get off one of the drills, so he could sow some oats for his neighbor.

"I'd like to mention everyone who did anything for us during Ed's illness, but it would take up too much space in your paper," Mrs. Ratliff said, "but we do want everybody to know that we're sincerely thankful for all they did, whether it was looking after things out at the place, sending a card or flowers, saying an encouraging word to us or a prayer for us."

Mr. and Mrs. Ratliff live about four miles south of Bronte, just south of the river. They raise registered Rambouillet sheep.

In the Bronte Field, Hickok & Reynolds No. 1 McQueen-Forman was drilling Wednesday at 2,520 feet. It is being drilled by D. L. Rose & Son of Albany. Location is east of the same operator's No. 1 McQueen and west of the Placid No. 1 Forman, a gasser.

West of Bronte seven miles, Union No. 3-B Daisy McCutchen was coring after reaching the Cisco pay section at around 3,900 feet. Reports said that it was running six feet high to the No. 2-B McCutchen, which flowed 1,320 barrels on a 24-hour test. Completion is expected in the next few days.

## 68 BALES OF COTTON ARE GINNED HERE

Sixty-eight bales of the 1950 cotton crop have been ginned in Bronte this season, according to J. D. Luttrell, local manager of the Farmers Marketing Association. Luttrell said that the cotton is turning out good and that farmers around here will average about one-third of a bale to the acre. He said that frequent rains were holding up the harvesting of the crop, however.

Luttrell said that his gin has been processing about 12 or 15 bales per day so far this season and that the cotton is grading middling to strict low middling. The Farmers Marketing association is buying most of the cotton which is being ginned at the local plant.

Both Bronte and Robert Lee cotton are being shipped from here via Santa Fe, Luttrell said.

## JACK McELROY CALLS BELVA; YEAR "GIVEN TO LIVE" IS PAST

Jack McElroy, master of ceremonies on the "Welcome to Hollywood" show on the American Broadcasting system, took time out September 22 to call little Belva Rippetoe on the telephone. Belva, who is suffering from an incurable form of cancer, also received a tiny tears doll with suitcase and wardrobe from the famous radio MC. In return, Belva wrote to McElroy, thanking him for the doll and telling him how she loves "fat men." By airmail she received a picture of McElroy signed "with love from your fat man."

McElroy first heard of Belva when Rev. Bob Beamer wrote a letter to Belva and read it over the program. Rev. and Mrs. Bob Beamer, who read of Belva's illness a year ago, came to see her and have become fast friends of the little girl and her parents.

Belva was given one year to live by specialists at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, on September 26, 1949. That year is past and Belva is still alive, but just barely, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Rippetoe, said, even though the little girl is putting up a brave fight.

Mrs. Rippetoe said this week that the fact that she is still alive is attributable to God's Will that she stay with them longer than the best medical authorities thought possible. She also said that the child's strong courage and determination to live must take some of the credit for her still being alive.

Belva, her parents said, suffers intensely all the time now, unless she is under the influence of a narcotic. Her mother said that she knows she is going to die and speaks of it constantly. Mrs. Rippetoe said that she says she is ready to die and is convinced that her suffering is the will of God. She seems to be well reconciled to her fate.

People all over the country have sent gifts, words of encouragement, and letters to the little Bronte girl during the past year. Among her heroes is Roy Rogers, radio and screen star, who called her a few months ago and has sent her several gifts.

Belva's eighth birthday is coming up October 9 and her parents and many friends are hoping she will be here to enjoy it. The birthday party will be shared with her sister, Nona,

South of Bronte, Stekoll Drilling Co. No. 1-B J. B. Glenn was drilling Wednesday at 1,520 feet. This wildcat, which is partially owned by the famous Marx Brothers of Hollywood, is about six miles southeast of Bronte.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field Fred M. Manning No. 10 S. L. McNay has been completed for a daily flow of 202.86 barrels of oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1.252-1. Production was from open hole from 5,332-64 feet.

N. F. Powell No. 6-A Sallie Odom has been located 330 feet from the south and 1,425 feet from the west of the 363 acre lease in section 286, G. Carroll survey. It will be 1,375 feet southeast of the No. 5-A Odom, a producer.

Lion Oil Co. No. 1 Runie Waldrop, wildcat northwest of Bronte and in the Hayrick community, has been running numerous tests this week, but at last report had recovered no commercial production.

Humble No. 1 Noah Pruitt, wildcat northeast of Bronte, has been plugged and abandoned after drilling to the Ellenburger. A small show was encountered in the Palo Pinto at around 4,300 feet.

## County SCS to Elect Supervisor

An election to name a landowner to serve for a five year term as a member of the board of supervisors of the Coke County Soil Conservation district will be held Oct. 3 at 8 p.m. at the Bronte school building. W. C. Shamblin, secretary of the board, announced the coming election.

The landowner elected will represent the landowners living in Zone II of the district which is all of commissioner's precinct No. 2 of Coke County.

The board of supervisors is the governing body of the Coke County Soil Conservation District. They set the policies and administer the affairs of the district.

They approve landowners' and operators' applications for assistance in the development of a complete conservation plan. When the plan has been completed by the landowner, the board enters into an agreement with him to render on site assistance in applying and maintaining the plan, Shamblin pointed out.

The district has received about \$4,800 from the Soil Conservation bill passed by the 51st session of the Texas Legislature. This is the district's share of the first of two installments. The Coke district has made application for its share of the second installment. It is the responsibility of the board of supervisors to spend this money for equipment to assist landowners with their soil conservation efforts, Shamblin explained.

All landowners in Zone 2 are urged to be present at the Bronte school building at 8 p.m., Tuesday, Oct. 3.
