

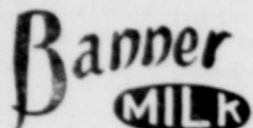

SCS District News

Foster S. Price, rancher in the Coke County Soil Conservation District, completed a range conservation plan on his ranches last week. The plan was developed to treat each acre according to its needs. The plan included a system of deferred and rotation grazing. This allows the better grasses such as side oats grama, little bluestem, Indian grass, switch grass, tall dropseed, blue grama and black grama to grow and increase in plant vigor, mature a seed crop, and build up a grass litter.

The plan also included seeding and farming on contour, development of livestock water, terracing of cropland, protecting crop stubble and maintaining on or near the surface of the soil, eradication of cedar and mesquite, seeding of cover crops and seeding of native and introduced grasses. Personnel of Soil Conservation Service assisted Price with the development of the plan.

Several district cooperators completed the seeding of their winter cover crops last week. W. C. Shambelin, C. N. Webb, B. B. Pierce, W. C. Cresap, Bryan Gartman, D. M. Milligan and James Allen are some of the land owners who completed seeding of their winter cover crop. Land owners are seeding winter cover crops to tie down the soil, add nitrogen and build up the organic content of the soil. Rye and vetch, and Dixie wonder winter peas are the legumes being used by the district cooperators.

Rosa Langford Enrolls For Last Year at SCW

Miss Rosa Lee Langford, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Langford, who is a senior library science major, is enrolled for the fall term at Texas State College for Women. One hundred and eighty-four out of 254 Texas counties are represented in the registration figure as well as 19 foreign students, from 10 foreign countries and 284 registrants from 30 other states.

4-H MEMBERS SHOW TURKEYS

Coke County 4-H boys and girls showed market turkeys at the West Texas Fair last week.

Byron Russell exhibited the Grand Champion pen and Marlene Arrott had the Reserve Champion pen of turkeys. Other exhibitors were Morgan Russell and Melba Gartman. Altogether they won besides the two championships, four blue ribbons, three red ribbons and one white ribbon. Their total prize money amounts to \$31.37.

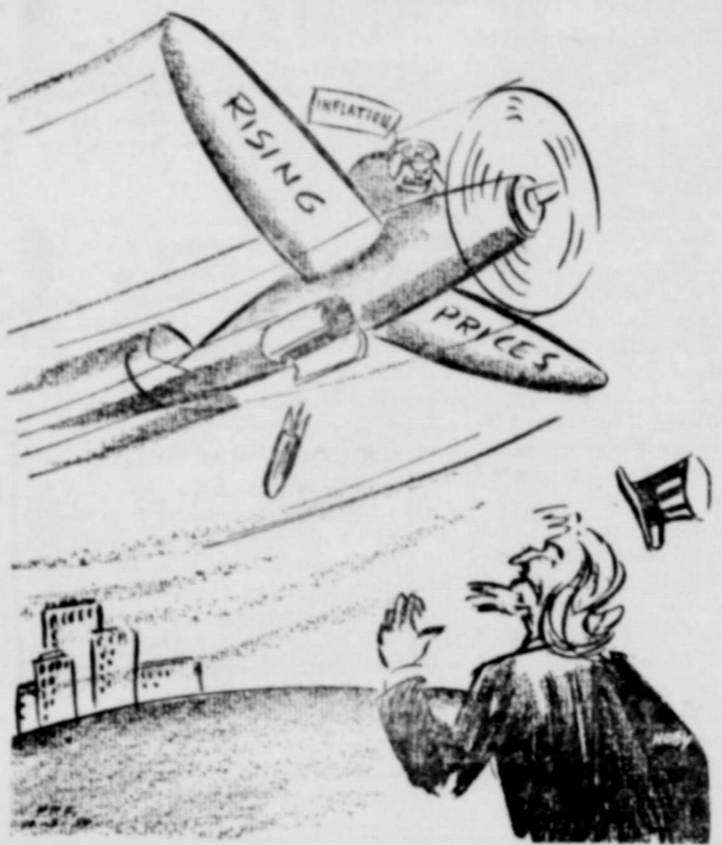

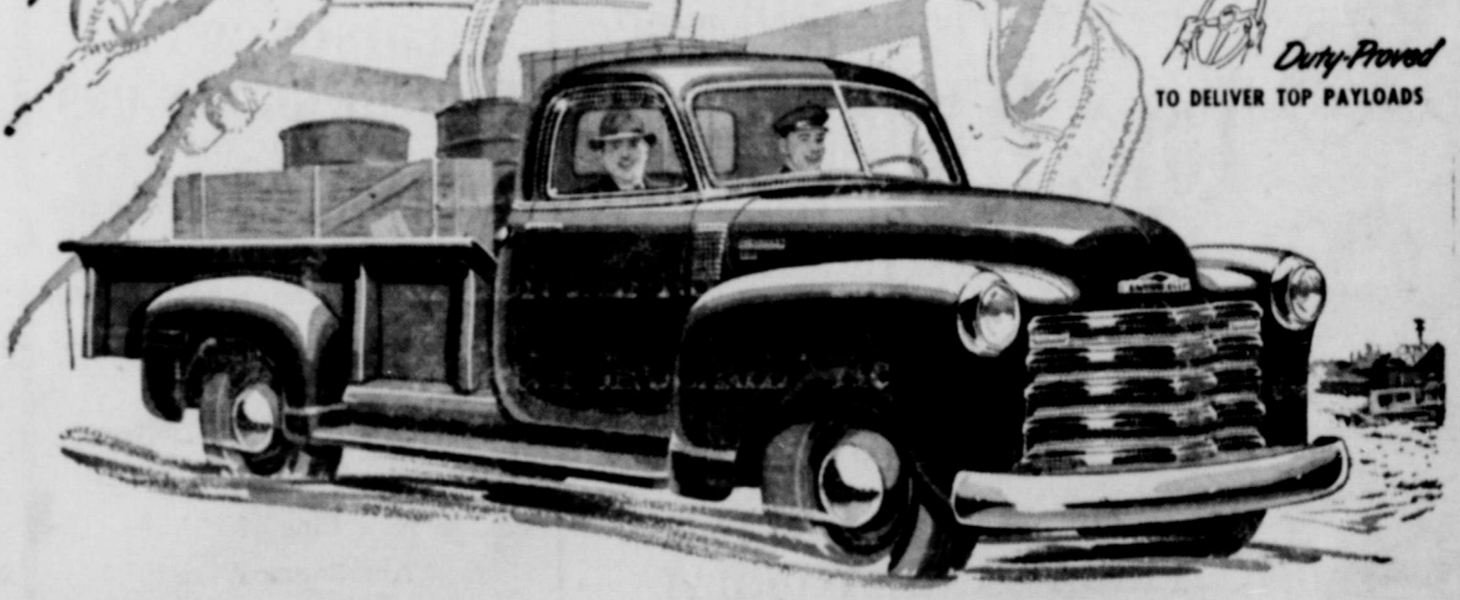

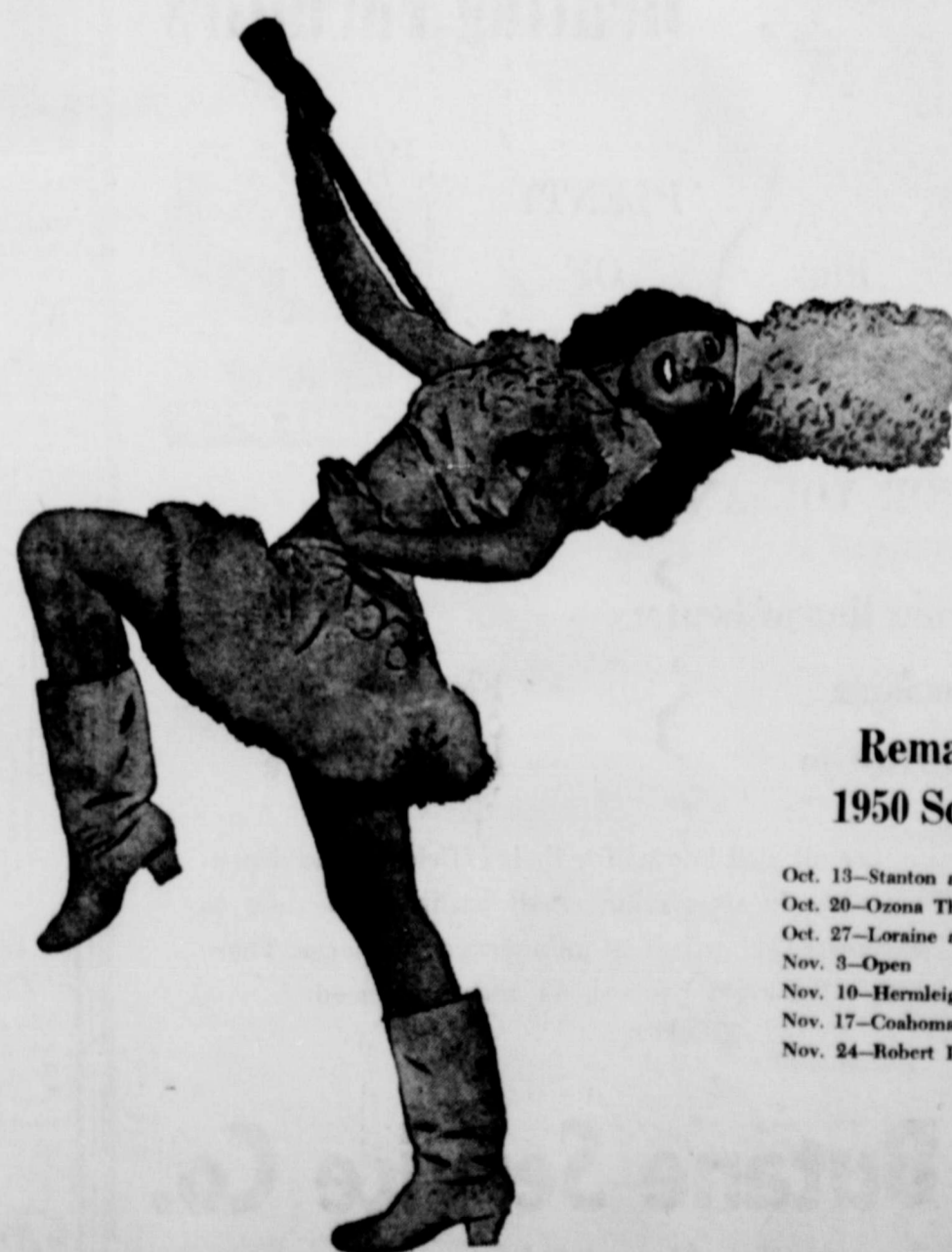
