LONGHORN ELEVEN LOSES TO SUPERIOR STANTON TEAM, 37-13

Coach Jack Price's Bronte Longhorns were outweighed, outmanned, and outscored but not out-hustled here last Friday night. The always tough Stanton Buffaloes stamped into town and carried home a 37-13 decision over the Bronte Longhorns in a District 6-B encounter.

The fans seemed well pleased with the underdog Longhorns hitting pay dirt twice against the big bad Buffaloes.

Only after Stanton tallied two touchdowns on long sustained drives, did Bronte begin to click offensively. Stanton drove 57 yards for the first one with Earl Koonce going over from the 1-foot line. LeRoy Gibson ended a 78 yard drive by scoring, again from the 1-foot line, to give Stanton a 12-0 advantage.

The Longhorns took the kickoff on the 20 and 8 plays later had pierced the Buffalo goal. Leading off from the 20, Marlin McCutchen's toss to Lyndon Waldrop was incomplete. Gerald Sandusky skirted right end for 33 yards, then tossed to McCutchen for 47 more yards. He was down on the 1-foot line. Then McCutchen scored but backfield in motion was ruled to set the Longhorns back 5.

Sandusky went for 1 yard, then powered within inches of the goal. Gerald carried twice more, scoring on the second carry. McCutchen climbed off tackle to make it Stanton 12, Bronte 7.

The oil news in the Bronte area was comparatively quiet this week, with no new completions, except in the Fort Chadbourne area, north-east of here.

Union Oil Co. No. 4-B Daisy McCutchen was drilling below 3,600 feet this week when equipment broke down. Completion is expected soon,

as the pay section, the Cisco sand, is between 3,900 and 4,000 feet.

Stekoll Petroleum Co. and Marx Bros. No. 1 J. B. Glenn, wildcat south of Bronte, was drilling at 5,290 feet. This wildcat is located in Mrs. C. C. Hudson subdivision 14 of HE&WT Ry. Co. survey. A report late last week said that this test was running about 25 feet high to Barnsdall No. 1 Findlater-Webb, an Ellenburger failure three miles to the southwest.

SCS DISTRICT NEWS COLUMN

Mrs. Helen Harris Weaver, B. St. George Tucker and H. G. Wendland, who farm and ranch a total of 32,000 acres of land in the Coke County SCS district, have made application for planning and technical assistance to the board of supervisors of the soil conservation district. C. N. Webb, chairman of the board, has announced. The planning and technical assistance will be rendered by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service, Webb added.

Two miles of level terrace lines were run last week on B. R. McCortley's farm, located seven miles southwest of Blackwell. Construction of level broad base terraces is a part of a complete soil and water conservation plan that McCortley is applying on his farm.

A ranch pond was staked on C. N. Webb's farm and ranch located two miles south of Tennyson. The pond was staked to provide better livestock water distribution.

McQueen and Clevenger Rig Moving from Here

The rig of the McQueen & Clevenger Drilling Co., which has been drilling near Bronte for the past two years, was moved this week to a new location between Big Spring and Lamesa.

The rig was moved in October, 1948 and drilled the Humble No. 1 R. E. Hickman, the well which showed the Bronte Field to be of considerable magnitude.

Since that time about twenty wells have been drilled in the field by the McQueen and Clevenger Co.

Members of the crew and their families have become a part of the community here and much regret was expressed this week by old-timers because they are leaving.

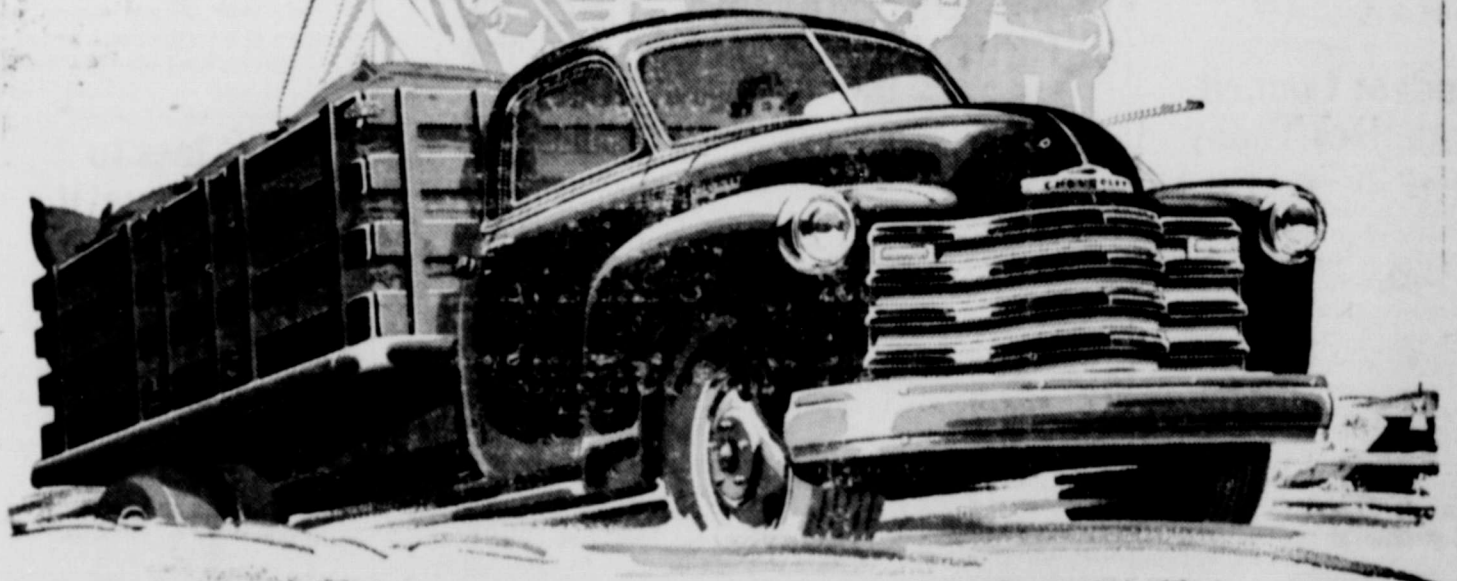
