Union No. 4-B McCutchen Flows 54 Barrels of Oil Hourly

Interest in the oil play around Bronte was on the increase this week, with one new completion in the McCutchen Field west of town and two in the Fort Chadbourne Field, northeast of Bronte. Another rig has also been moved into the Bronte Field by McQueen and Stroud.

Union Oil Co. No. 4-B Daisy McCutchen, on a three hour test through a one inch choke, averaged 54 1/2 barrels of oil per hour. On another test through a smaller choke it averaged slightly less than this amount. Union has staked location for No. 5-B McCutchen and drilling was expected to begin Thursday. It is located on the south side of the Bronte-Robert Lee highway, 1,420 feet from the same operator's No. 1-B McCutchen.

A rig was set up and scheduled to break tower Thursday on another test on the J. L. Brunson place, southwest of here. It is scheduled to test the Palo Pinto pay section of the Bronte Field.

Humble No. 8 Sallie Odom, in the west part of the Fort Chadbourne

Field, has been completed for a daily flow of 264.05 barrels of 47.2 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,204-1.

Fred M. Manning No. 12 S. L. McNay, in the Runnels County sector of the field, was completed this week for a 24 hour potential of 144 barrels of 46 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 784-1.

King No. 1 Brookshier Estate, five miles east of Bronte, recovered ap-

proximately 1,000 feet of salt water Wednesday on a test of the Palo Pinto. Some gas cut mud was also found on breaking down the drill pipe. Gas came to the surface in 26 minutes. Drilling continued.

Activity was picking up in the Fort Chadbourne area, particularly in the southwest part, nearest to Bronte. Several rigs have moved in that area in the past week or so.

LORRAINE BULLDOGS TO BATTLE BRONTE LONGHORNS TONIGHT

Tonight's combatants have each won only one game during the 1950 season while both have lost five. Loraine has a decided advantage in weight as they average about 165 pounds, which is about 20 pounds per man heavier than the Longhorns' starting lineup.

All local fans are reminded that this is the last home game of the year. Let's all turn out tonight at 8 o'clock and boost the Longhorns as they attempt to win this District 6-B conference battle against the Loraine Bulldogs.

Spooks and goblins will run rampant in Bronte next Tuesday night—October 31—which is Hallowe'en. The Parent-Teacher association here will sponsor a carnival at the school building that night. Plenty of fun for everybody is promised by the PTA members.

The climax of the evening will be at 6:15 o'clock when the queen of the carnival will be announced and crowned. Each grade in both grade and high school has named a duke and duchess which are seeking the honor of ruling the night of festivities. The one receiving the most votes will be crowned Tuesday evening.

Immediately after the coronation the booths in the gym and the Spanish room will be opened. Stands for the entertainment of the crowd will

include bingo, large and small card stands, a fish pond, a fortune teller.



There will also be a side show, with Mrs. Jack Price in charge of arranging the program. A refreshment bar where cold drinks, candy, etc., will be sold will also be set up in the gym.

Bronte Streets Get Sweeping

The two main streets of Bronte, in the downtown business district, got a good sweeping Tuesday morning when the State Highway Department brought their streetsweeper into town and put it to work.

OZONA LIONS CRUSH LONGHORNS IN GAME THERE LAST FRIDAY

District 6-B got a bad name when the Ozona Lions, doormats to district 10-B, walloped the Bronte Longhorns, 47-6.

The game had plenty of offensive action, Ozona rolled up 22 first downs to 14 for Bronte. The Lion offense totaled 412 yards to 269 for Bronte. The Ozonians completed 6 of 11 passes and Bronte 1 of 3, and had 1 intercepted. The Longhorns lost possession of the ball five times on fumbles.

Gerald Sandusky was the Coko countians' only bright spot. He packed the leather 25 times for 248 yards, a small fraction under an average of 10 yards per carry. He also caught pass number 22 for the season, a fourth quarter heave from Bobby Lasswell.

Sandusky now has gained 773 yards this season for an average of 6.5 yards per carry.

Ozona kicked to Bronte to open play in the first quarter. Sandusky

fumbled and five plays later, Ozona led 7-0. The Lions had 20-0 half-time advantage and a 33-6 third quarter lead.

The best run of the night came in the third quarter when Sandusky started off tackle on the left side, found no hole, cut sharply to his right, ran parallel with the line of scrimmage for about 10 yards, cut inside right end and broke away from the defending halfbacks and safety man to get into the open. He was untouched all the way on this beautiful 60 yard touchdown scamper.

Sandusky, a vicious tackler, was a big rock in the road for Lion ball carriers, while J. W. Candler and John Rusk turned in an expert defensive job.

Billy Jack Gentry did some fancy stepping with the ball and a lot of fans are hoping that he will see more offensive duty against Loraine tonight. Marlin McCutchen will be back in the lineup tonight after a week's layoff because of injuries.

COTTON CROP BRINGING IN CASH TO FARMERS OVER COKE COUNTY

The 1950 cotton crop in Coke county is turning out better than most people thought it would a few months ago. Estimates are that the yield will run from a quarter to a half a bale to the acre. Most all of the cotton which has been ginned here has brought the farmer better than \$200 per bale. The lint is selling at around 40 cents a pound and seed is bringing \$90 a ton.

J. D. Luttrell, manager of the local gin owned by the Farmers Marketing Association, reported Wednesday that he has ginned 390 bales, so far this season.

Fred McDonald, Jr., of Robert Lee, said Wednesday that the gin at the Coke County seat had processed 800 bales, and that the cotton was turning out good.

Weather conditions have been exceptionally good for harvesting the crop and most of the farmers are busy
