Two Tests Located Near Here Recently

Humble Oil & Refining Co. has moved in a rig for its No. 1 C. C. Holder. The test will be located 740 feet from the northwest and 4,500 feet from the southwest line of section 446.

Spartan Drilling Co. of Dallas has scheduled a wildcat four miles west and two and one-half miles north of Tennyson. Projected to 6,300 feet with rotary, the firm's No. 1 L. E. Smith will be 665 feet from the south and 1,964 feet from the west line of section 2, D. K. Glenn survey. It will be one mile due east of Seaboard and Southern Minerals No. 1 M. G. Reed, which has produced some oil from the Ellenburger.

Union No. 5-B Daisy McCutchen was nearing completion this week and was drilling below 3,500 feet. The pay section is between 3,900 and 4,000 feet. No. 5-B McCutchen is about seven miles west of Bronte on the south side of the highway.

Humble No. 1 E. H. Schuch, wildcat near the Tom Green County line, was swabbing two barrels of fluid early this week. It was estimated that 15 per cent of the fluid was oil and the remainder basic sediment and acid water with perhaps a small

amount of formation water. The testing was being done in the Strawn formation, which had been treated with 1,000 gallons of acid.

In the Fort Chadbourne Field, northeast of here, Fred M. Manning No. 16 S. L. McNay has been located and 3,400 feet from the southwest line of M. C. Zuniga survey 298.

G. W. Strake No. 2 Elo Michaelis has been completed for a daily flow of 1,226 barrels of 41.5 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,270-1.

Strake No. 2 Mary L. Stubblefield made 74.52 barrels of 42.6 gravity oil 42.6 gravity pipeline oil. Gas-oil ratio was 1,350-1.

Burdell Oil Co. has located No. 3 Z. Sowell twelve miles northeast of Bronte.

National Associated Petroleum Co. No. 1 Mary Earwood, wildcat eight miles northeast of Blackwell, has been plugged and abandoned at 6,150 feet in Ellenburger lime.

Luttrell said that the local gin has processed 453 bales so far this season.

HERMLEIGH HOST TO LONGHORNS IN TONIGHT'S DISTRICT GAME

The Bronte Longhorns will go after their third win of the 1950 season tonight when they travel to Scurry County to meet the Hermleigh Cardinals in a District 6-B encounter.

The Cardinals, coached by J. N. Williams, were last years district champs and may be hard to stop. They boast an average weight of 162 pounds, which is about 15 pounds heavier per man than the Longhorns. However, the Longhorns can't be rated out because they have at various times during the season displayed a brilliant aerial game that the opponents couldn't stop. In Marlin McCutchen, Lyndon Waldrop, Gerald Sandusky and Billy Jack Gentry, the Longhorns have a backfield that is capable of putting up a stubborn fight even when badly outweighed and out-classed.

RUNNELS COUNTY ATTORNEY IS GUEST SPEAKER AT LIONS MEET

Jack Moore, newly elected county attorney of Runnels County, spoke to members of the Bronte Lions Club Wednesday on what Armistice should mean to the American people.

Moore said that Armistice should be at time for paying honor to all

those who have died to build and preserve the democratic system of government in this country.

This country is threatened from without and from within, Moore believes, with communism on the outside and socialism on the inside. He said Americans should pledge themselves to working harder at being better citizens. People of this country should always take advantage of their right and privilege to vote in all elections. They should not shirk their duty of serving on juries and they should work continually toward making their community and country a better place in which to live, he said.

Moore concluded his talk by saying the best way he knew to preserve the democratic system was for all Americans to turn to Christianity and follow the teachings set forth by this great religion.

WINTER COMES TO BRONTE

Old man winter came breezing in Wednesday night with plenty of zip.

A wind of gale intensity brought the cold spell which local people had been hearing about all day. It arrived about 7 p.m. Thermometers down town dropped 16 degrees in about one and one-half hours, from 78 when the north hit to 62 degrees.

A slight touch of winter visited the area earlier in the week when a heavy frost killed most of the vegetation in the area. This earlier spell was short-lived, however, and the usual summer weather prevailed Tuesday and Wednesday.

Local service stations reported a booming anti-freeze business throughout the week. Likewise, dealers in heating stoves said their sales were on the increase.

Prospects for Bronte-Winters Road Bright

Prospects for an all-weather road from Bronte to Winters appeared brighter this week than ever before. State highway officials told the Coke County commissioners court they would recommend that the Coke section of the road be included in this county's program of farm to market road building during the next two years.

A group from Bronte and from the area which will be served by the road met with a civic group at Winters last week to discuss the possibilities of building the road. The group from

Winters was heartily in favor of the project. Those present were Judge Jeff Dean, Commissioner Otis Smith, C. E. Bruton, Tad Richards, Sid Evans, Osno Black and Runnels County Precinct 3 Commissioner Bill Harmon. Hosts were John Q. McAdams, Fred Bedford, W. H. Rappy, Floyd Sims, C. L. Green and Dr. J. W. Dixon, all of Winters.

In a special meeting of the Commissioners court Monday, Highway District Engineer T. J. Kelly of San Angelo and resident engineers of San Angelo and Ballinger told the com-

missioners they would recommend to the state department that the three and one-half miles from Bronte to the Runnels County line be placed in the road program which will be set up soon for the next two years.

The highway officials said Coke County has been extremely fortunate in securing \$713,000 which has been spent in the county during the past six years for farm to market roads. This figure is much more than was spent proportionately in other counties of the area, they said.

The state men also brought out that approximately \$70,000 will be available for Coke County during the coming two year period. In addition to the section of the Bronte-Winters highway, the officials recommended that the two miles of road from the highway up through Silver be paved. They estimated these two projects will cost about \$55,000, leaving \$15,000. It was recommended that this money be used to replace two weak bridges between Robert Lee and San Angelo.

If the Coke County section of the Bronte-Winters road is built, Coke County will have to supply the right of way and fencing. Judge Dean said that county officials are hopeful they can obtain the right of way at a reasonable cost, so this matter will not stand in the way of building the road if it is approved by the state.

Judge Dean also said it is unlikely that the Runnels County section of the road will be built during the coming two year period, but that officials feel if the Coke County part of the road is completed, it will speed up completion of the Runnels County section.

The gas company's crew has been busy the past several weeks tying gas users on to the mains, Buelow said. Quite a large number of Bronte people are already using gas, he added.

Ranchers and farmers in the Bronte area are wondering if a rain is going to fall in time to save their small grains. It seems that even cotton farmers, in spite of the fact that they are always glad to see pretty weather in the fall feel that this dry weather deal is being carried a bit too far.

Santa Fe reports that the wheat in the Panhandle and South Plains is off to a good start and that considerable wheat pasture is available from County cotton crop will reach 30,000 ghum harvesting in the Plains section is going at full speed now.

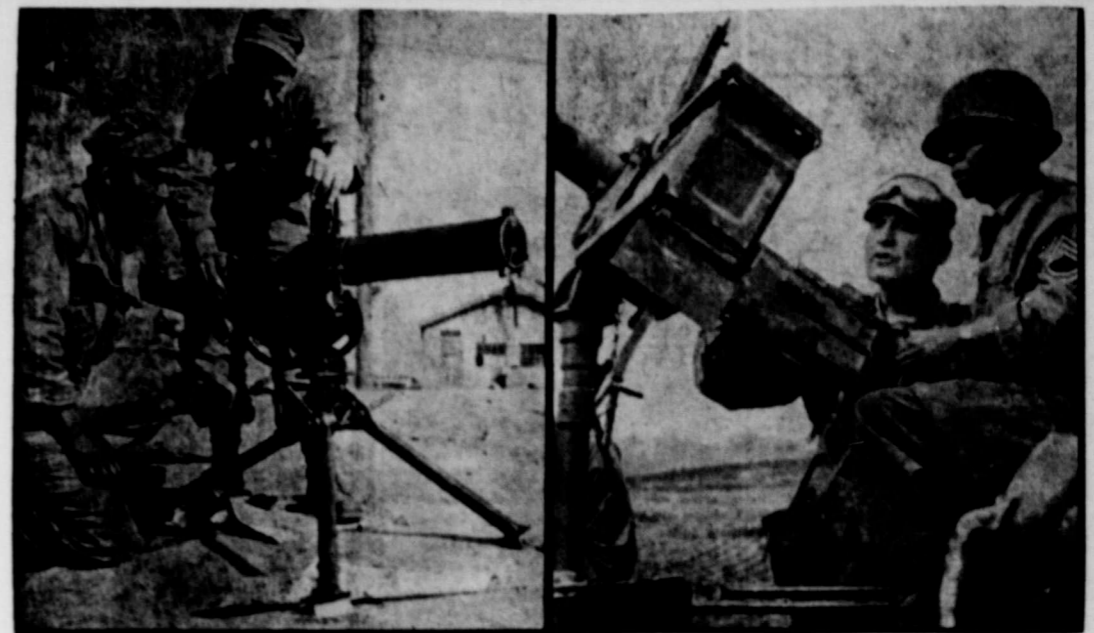

MEMBERS OF WSCS HAVE THANKSGIVING PROGRAM MONDAY

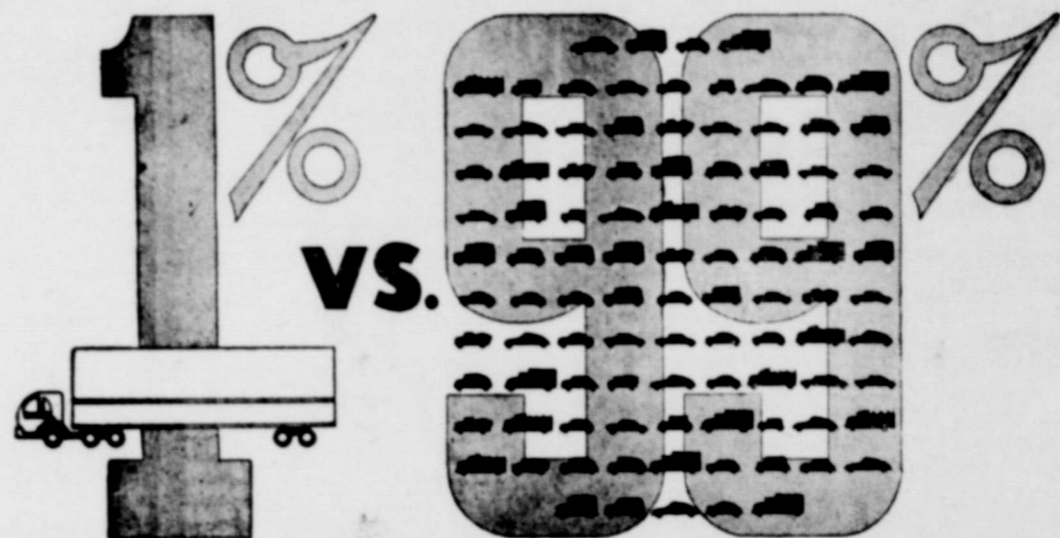
Members of the Methodist WSCS enjoyed a Thanksgiving program of poems and songs when they met Monday in the home of Mrs. A. N. Rawlings.

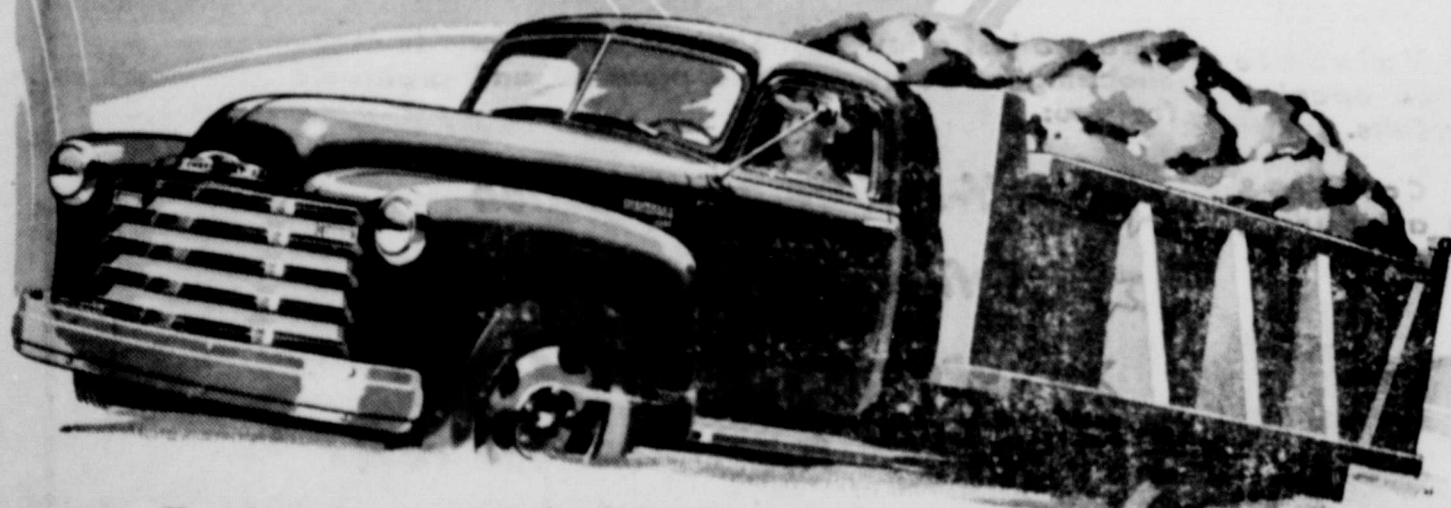
