J. N. Taylor, who farms five miles north of Bronte, and is a member of the Fort Chadbourne conservation group, has completed a soil and water conservation plan. The plan was developed to treat each acre of his place according to its needs. The plan included constructing channel type terraces, controlling outside water, seeding and farming on contour, seeding cover crops and seeding pasture grasses.

A 4,000 cubic yard ranch pond was staked last week on W. C. Shamblin's ranch, located three miles southwest of Blackwell. The pond was designed to give Shamblin permanent livestock water. It was lo cated to give better distribution f grazing of his livestock and prevent trampling and soil erosion around the watering places.

Three miles of level broad base terraces were completed on D. K. Glenn's farm, one and one-half miles south of Bronte. The terraces system is a part of Glenn's soil and water conservation program.






