## BIG FREEZE IS HARD ON LOCAL WATER SYSTEM

In regard to the current water shortage, Mayor H. O. Whitt said Thursday that most of the trouble is being caused by leaks and breaks in the water lines around private homes. He said that several of the city's pipes developed leaks during last week's record cold spell but that they had all been repaired.

Whitt said plenty of water is being pumped into town, about 2500 gallons an hour, and that it is evident the water is going out around private property. When everyone has broken pipes repaired and lines fixed, plenty of water should be available again, he said.

## Former Bronte Resident Buried At Fort Worth

Franklin Marion Woullard, 72, former citizen of Bronte, died Friday in a Fort Worth hospital after an illness of about a year. Funeral services were held Monday from the Guardian Funeral Home chapel there and interment was in the Greenwood cemetery.

Woullard, born in Gatesville, moved to Fort Worth in 1915 from Bronte where he had been in the ranching business. He was an oil lease broker in Fort Worth for his remaining years. Before railroads had spread over Texas, he drove cattle from Pecos county to Kansas. He walked with a limp caused from a bullet wound received in stopping a stampede, relatives said. He was one of the first men to promote oil activity in Breckenridge about 1918.

He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Mmes. Herbert D. Horton of Fort Worth and C. E. Jones of Houston, one brother, Ollie Woullard of Bronte; two sisters, Mrs. Nannie Keese and Miss Ada Woullard, both of Bronte; two grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

## Bluestem and Grama Are Favorite Grasses

Grass, man's best tool for anchoring soil against erosion, was given a sound vote of confidence during 1950 by Texas farmers and ranchers.

Increased respect for this weapon against soil and water waste is reflected by last year's seed harvest, which shows 746,599 pounds of native grass seed harvested by Texas farmers and ranchers, it was pointed out today by Louis P. Merrill, Soil Conservation Service regional director in Fort Worth.

Leading the native grass seed harvest parade in Texas were little Bluestem (400,325 pounds), and Blue Grama (202,410 pounds), both warm season forage plants.

The 1950 seed harvest figures, Merrill said, also reflect widely increased use of King Ranch Bluestem by conservation-wise farmers and ranchers. It is a deep-rooted introduced perennial grass known for its erosion-resisting and forage qualities and its adaptation to wide extremes of rainfall.

Throughout Texas, a total of 506,537 pounds of King Ranch Bluestem seed was harvested.

Harris, county chairman.

Mrs. Boecking said that all the pin-on banks and miniature iron lungs had been collected except one

On the east side of the county last reports gave \$1,038.70 on deposit. Of this amount, \$193 was netted at the March of Dimes dance given last Saturday night at Tad Richards. Workers expressed appreciation to B. R. McGarley for his fine handling of arrangements and publicity for the dance.

The Mother's March brought in the largest single amount — \$260; the

school donations totaled \$109; a special offering at the Methodist church was \$8.37 and special collections at the Texas Theatre totaled \$55.41. The Lions club canvass of the business district netted over \$200 with some contributions still to come in.

## Boy Scouts Mark 41st Anniversary

President Truman will greet 12 outstanding Boy Scouts in the White House on Feb. 6 opening the 41st anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America. Boy Scout Week will be observed Feb. 6 to 12 in every part of the nation by more than 2,750,000 boys and adult leaders. "Strengthen Liberty" is the birthday theme.

At "birthday parties" during Boy Scout Week throughout the nation each member will pledge himself to the Scout Oath or Promise. In each community representatives of the churches, schools, government and business will observe the anniversary with their Scouts. At Unit "open house" parties, parents, relatives and members of the chartering institutions will hear a review of the year's program features, service projects and membership gains.

During Boy Scout Week members of the organization will develop window displays and demonstrations on civil defense and conservation. Each member will inspect his home to make certain no hazards exist. Surprise mobilizations will test Scout efficiency should emergencies arise.

Since 1910 more than 17,500,000 boys and men have been identified with the Boy Scouts of America.

# No. 1 Glenn Well Extends Field

Humble No. 1 D. K. Glenn has been completed in the Bronte Field for a daily flow of 74.71 barrels of 46.9 gravity oil plus 1-10 of one per cent water.

Completion of this well extends the Bronte Field a half mile to the east. Gas-oil ratio was 333-1. Flow pressures were 280 pounds on the casing, 50 pounds on the tubing.

## FULLERS HOST METHODIST WSCS

Rev. and Mrs. Fuller were hosts to the WSCS when it met at 2:30 p.m. Monday in the home of Mrs. B. E. Modgling.

Mrs. Buddy Kirkland presided over the business meeting. The group voted to send five dollars to the Holden school. Miss Lottie Ivey, a guest, opened the meeting with prayer.

Mrs. R. C. Lasswell was in charge of the program and reviewed the first three chapters of "Near East Panorama."

Twenty-two members and two visitors, Eddie Glenn and Miss Ivey, were present. A salad plate, carrying out a valentine motif, was served.

Production was from open hole below 4,326 feet where casing was set.

Union No. 4 Jim McCutchen, latest completed well in the McCutchen Field, flowed at a rate estimated at 30 to 35 barrels per hour on a drillstem test. Gas came to the surface in nine minutes and oil in 66 minutes. No water was found.

Burdell Oil Co. No. 4 Sowell has been finished for a daily flow of 146.72 barrels of 43 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 785-1.

G. W. Strake No. 7 Elo Michaelis, also in the Fort Chadbourne Field, was preparing to complete early this week after encountering the pay section at 5,322 feet.

Strake No. 1 Michaelis-Nelson had acidized the Odum lime section with 5,000 gallons and was trying to complete. On a drillstem test, 120 feet of oil and gas cut mud were recovered.

Humble-Strake No. 1 Gentry, wildcat east of Bronte, was drilling Wednesday at 3,600 feet in lime and shale.

Humble No. 29-B Sallie Odum has been completed for a 24 hour flow of 197.20 barrels of 46 gravity oil plus a small amount of water.

## School Enrollment At All Time High

School enrollment now is at the highest peak in many years, Supt. J. L. Carroll said Wednesday. There are now 351 students enrolled in the local schools.

## THEO BLUE IS HONOR STUDENT AT SCHOOL

Theo Blue of Bronte was one of thirty-nine honor students at Schreiner Institute in Kerrville who won places on the First Semester honor roll, according to Acting Dean W. C. Weir.

Of this number, only nine were on the college division honor roll. The remainder of the thirty-nine were on the high school honor roll and on the honorable mention lists.

In order to be listed on the honor roll, a student must carry a minimum of 15 semester hours and make at least a 3.6 grade average.

The average daily attendance is low, however, Carroll said, mostly due to pink eye, colds and influenza. Only 321 students were present in school Wednesday.

Carroll gave some pointers for parents to follow to help prevent colds among school children. They are: See that children have coats when they leave home in the morning; encourage children not to eat or drink after other persons; see that they are not allowed to cool off too fast after work or exercise and to see that they get the proper amount of rest and sleep.

As for the pink eye, Carroll urged all parents to take the children to a doctor for medication at the least sign of sticky eyes in the morning, and to see that those infected with sore eyes do not use the same towels, handkerchiefs or clothing as others. The disease is conveyed to the eyes by hand or clothing.
